

THE PRESIDENT'S PAGE

This has been the month of watching and waiting. There is some new stuff out, and some of us have managed to obtain some of the new issues, but there is a lot more out which has not yet reached the "outback," as the Australians say. Nevertheless, we continue, hoping that someday, somebody will come out with that fabled BT-13 in 1/72nd...

The Revell Helen is now out, and the copy I received from Japan looks every bit as good as the Frances. Both are Japanese twin engined bombers, and have good detail. The Francis is the smaller of the two, and I've seen it built up, although I cannot vouch for it myself. The Helen looks like a challenge, and with the information available, it should provide a colorful addition to any model display case.

The Hasegawa Beechcraft T-34 "Mentor" is also available now, and I've seen them in several stores. At first glance, it seems highly prices at \$2.00, but this is partially offset by the addition of a small but highly detailed aircraft-tug, the kind of tractor that they use to pull these things around on the ground. On the whole, it looks like it is a worthwhile investment.

Squadron lists a whole lot of new stuff in their catalog. Some interesting things are the new Hasegawa Tojo and Tony in 1/72 scale, and the JoHan ME-262 conversion. Frog also has their Swordfish and Martin Maryland listed, while the Canberra B(I)8 has been available locally for several weeks.

So much for new kits. I'm looking for an accurate set of three-view drawings for a Meyers OTW biplane. This was a civilian pilot training biplane built in Tecunseh, Michigan, during World War II. It was all metal, and several were converted to sprayers after the war. If anybody has a set of drawings, I'd appreciate a chance to copy them.

While on the subject of personal requests, I guess that one of the fringe benefits of being editor is that I get to print anything I want to. Right now, I am in the process of compiling a catalog of my civilian aircraft negatives, which I have been selling prints of for some time. I made up a list of military aircraft last year, which goes for \$1.00 with five sample 616 prints. The photos are mainly entire-plane views in black and white, and most date from 1950 on, although some are much older than that. Most of my side-view drawings that I've published in DP have been made from photos in my files. The military file listing is about 40 pages long, while the civil listing should be about twice that size. Anyone interested in the military list can write to me at P.O. Box 25211, Phoenix, Arizona, 85002, for a copy of the list. The civil list should be out in a month or so.

NEW MEETING DATES ANNOUNCED

Notice that the meeting dates for the next two months are scheduled for Tuesdays instead of Mondays. This will make it more convenient for some of us who are taking (or teaching) evening classes. If this evening does not work out, we can always drop back and punt. It does, however, give a couple of guys a chance to get there when they could not make it on Mondays.

THIS MONTH'S CENTERFOLDS

At the risk of overdoing the Luftwaffe bit, we are including more information on German aircraft, including a self-explanatory drawing showing standard Luftwaffe DF loop antenna systems. Another Heinz Jacobs original is the French NC-900, the version produced for the French Air Force. The information is included in the drawing, except for one fact that we discovered after the drawing was made. The underside of the aircraft was the standard French blue-grey, which is slightly darker than the USAAF neutral grey 43. Spinner was glossy black, and ALL roundels had the yellow surround. The topside color was a semi-gloss deep olive green, similar to the color currently used on Army vehicles. This information was in e letter to me from an English aviation historian, R. C. Jones, dated 1971.

HELL HATH NO FURY. . . BUT RAY SWEET HAS. (MORE HAWKER FURIES)

To built this series, you will need five Matchbox Furry kits and ope Gladiator, as well as some oddments from the spares box. The Persian Fury only needs its nose amputated in the proper place and the Gladiator engine and cowl installed after shortening and smoothing the cowl, of course. The Norwegian Fury is a little more difficult. The basic aircraft is like the Persian, except, of course, the skis, which will have to be scratch built from card stock. The engine also needs replacement. From the few photos I have of the Panther engine, it appears to be a twin-row fourteen cylinded radial unlike any other I've seen, so the Armstrong Siddeley Panther IIIA has to be an original creation.

The Portuguese Fury is done straight from the box. Use markings from Stoppel and you have it. The Yugoslav Fury gets a little bit hairy. Cut the nose off at the panel line forward of the landing gear and turn it upside down. Then glue and green-stuff, where necessary, making sure you have the proper outline. Now take the cylinder head covers from an old Supermarine S-6 kit (if you can find one), cut them to length, and glue them on top of the cowl. The Yugoslav Fury II needs the landing gear and the underwing gun pods from the above Gladiator kit. Notice that the radiator is longer and flatter than standard. The cross section, however, is about the same as standard, though, so I combined the radiators from the Persian and this Fury--in line, then filled with green stuff and cut off 1/8" for the flatter profile. This gives you the intake and exit parts, and makes a good-looking unit. Have fun.

INDIVIDUAL FURY CONVERSIONS.

RAY SWEET

1. PERSIAN FURY Series II, c/n 220.

Bristol Mercury engine, Meherabad, Persia (Iran), 1943. Note: No crown or lion head on side. National roundel on side in spot usually occupied by crown. The sand color on top surfaces is quite dark---almost middle stone. The sides and undersides of the wings are a very light cream, nearly an off-white.

2. NORWEGIAN FURY I. c/n 401

Armstrong Siddeley Panther IIIA engine. Oslo, 1933. This aircraft was destroyed in a landing accident during 1934. The metal panels are polished aluminum (oops, aluminium, chappies) and the struts are clive green.

3. PORTUGUESE FURY I. Serial No. 50.


De-rated Rolls Royce Kestrel IIS. All silver, doped, highly polished metal panels. Numbers are black.


4. YUGOSLAV FURY I. SERIAL HF-3


Hispano-Suiza 12 NB engine. One aircraft only was built. Performance was so bad that the engine was switched to a Kestrel and aircraft was delivered as a standard Series I aircraft. Plane was all silver, with polished metal panels. The three round marks on the lower cowl are pipes which protrude from the cowl about 3".(Intakes?)

5. YUGOSLAV FURY II. SERIAL YU-212.


Rolls Royce Kestrel XVI, 745 hp. 5th Puk, Nis, 1941. Note wing guns, cantilever undercarriage, and low drag radiator. The camouflage pattern is very soft, like a spray gun at maximum opening was used. The olive is dark and the earth color is quite light. The undersides are a very light grey. The lettering on the side is probably black, although I have seen it in red, but not on camouflage. The letters "YU" are a guess, as the photo shows only the very top of the letters over the wing, but I have seen "YU" on other aircraft in this position.










I just received a CARE package from Squadron, which contained a few goodies, which I will review briefly. Conspicuous by their absence were a Johan ME-262 and the new Matchbox Corsair, which is supposed to be out now.

The long awaited Hasegawa Tojo and Tony arrived, and at first glance, they look like typical Hasegawa products. The outlines appear to be accurate, and the detail looks good. The Tojo has a nicely detailed engine, and both aircraft are cast in very suitable silver plastic. The panel lines are much better than recent products, since these aircraft were flush rivited, and this detail would not show in 1/72 scale. The only criticism is the fact that the TOJO must be constructed with drop tanks unless the holes are trimmed and filled in, and this would require a little work. At \$2.00 each, these are priced a little steep, but the models are excellent, and certainly up to the high standards that we have come to expect from Hasegawa.

Two new Frog products were also included, the Maryland and the Swordfish, both in 1/72 scale. Glancing inside the box of the Swordfish, the detail looks excellent, although a little heavy. The float version is provided for, and the wing struts are all in one piece, vastly simplifying the job of mounting the upper wings. Note that the lower halves of the upper wings are cuite weak due to the strut fitting slot. Mine was bent silabily, but this can be rebend and glued without trouble. The engine is nicely detailed. Decals are provided for two versions, a pre-war floatplane dating to 1938, and a Swordfish used in ops against the Bismark. This one will definitely go in my "kits to build as soon as I get the one's I'm working on now done" pile.

Last but not least, the Martin Maryland arrived. It has much less surface detail than the Swordfish, but since this was a high-performance aircraft, there was less surface detail on the real article. The engine detail is good, while the cowlings look a little rough—not the sharp edges you'd expect on cowl fiaps. At first glance the decals look very nice, except that the RAF roundels are orange rather than red. This causes a little confusion until one realizes that the Maryland was used by the South African Air Force, and that the model depicts one of these aircraft used in the Western Desert during 1941 and 1942. Basically, this appears to be a good kit, and I'll pile it on top of the Swordfish.

OLDIES BUT GOODIES. THE AIRFIX GRUMMAN J2F "DUCK" B.R. BAKER

This kit has been out for some time, but it does offer some rather interesting conversion possibilities. Since new kit issues have been slow for a while, I decided to fill in some gaps, and a recent addition to the shelves was an old J2F that I'd had around for at least four years.


The kit is basically accurate except for the cabane struts, which are too long. These make the upper wing sit too high on the fuselage, thus pulling the lower wings up at a grotesque dihedral angle. I solved the problem by gluing the wing in place, then snipping off the bottoms of the struts with a small pair of dikes. Then the wing will sit properly, and the whole result is most pleasing.

Good points to the kit include a useful interior, which, however, puts the pilot about where the instrument panel should be. The rudder is also very thin, which is refreshing to see for a change. Most J/72 tailfeathers are much too thick. Bad points include the profusion of boller-plate rivits which are grossly out of scale. The tail struts are also too long, but this is easily rectified.

Backdating the J2F-6 to the earlier versions is relatively simple. The only major changes I can detect are the engine, propeller and mountings, which have to be replaced to depict earlier versions. I back-dated mine to a J2F-1 of the Marine Corps. I revised the forward engine mounting section, filled in the air intake below the cowling, and mounted an engine from a Monogram F110-2 coupled to a cowling from a Monogram Boeing F4B-H, although I suspect that the F110-2 cowling would have worked. The kit prop can be used, and the result is a very colorful model, if you decide to use the standard silver color scheme with yellow wing top.

Microscale Decals have a sheet printed for this kit, but it has to be backdated to the JF-2 model. This looks like an early J2F, except that the float fairing has to be trimmed in considerably to conform to the JF-2 outline. Information on the JF/12F series is relatively scarce, although there were fairly good three view drawings in the Bowers U.S. Navy Aircraft, along with some good photos in Larkins' book, U.S. Marine Corps Aircraft.




