

Retiree Convention Meeting Summary

A MA Retiree meeting was held at the MA State Convention at the Margaritiville Resort in Hyannis. There were 15 MA retired members in attendance, 14 Postmasters and 1 Manager as well as National Retired President Charley Peters and his wife Anita. We were honored that Charley and Anita could join us.

Sec/Treasurer Lorna Edie read the minutes from the fall meeting and went over the Treasurer report.

Hot Topics

- Elections for Retiree President and VP/Membership Chair were held. Kathy Callahan and I were both unopposed so Sec/Treas Lorna cast one ballot for each of us.
- Members are now receiving only four printed issues of The Leader vs ten to save publication costs. Other issues are available on the national website.
- The national UPMA scholarship application is open for until June 20.
- There was much confusion during the transition to the PSHB program last fall. Changes can be made during the 2025 open season if needed. Remember, never cancel your enrollment in the PSHB program, suspend it, or you will lose it forever.

Appreciation

- I expressed appreciation for all those that worked so hard for so many years to get the Social Security Fairness Act passed which eliminated the WEP/GPO provisions. Hopefully everyone with entitlements has already applied and is their receiving benefits.
- Nat'l President Retired Charley Peters was thanked and recognized for his service to the UPMA Retired organization. Especially for his involvement during the transition to the PSHB program. His quick response to members' questions was very much appreciated.
- Rich Hui thanked the retirees for the \$200 donation to the Susan Hui Memorial Scholarship at the fall meeting.
- Laila Lawrence and Charlie Boyle each won \$30 from a raffle drawing.
- At a later gathering of MA
 Retirees it was voted that the MA
 Retirees would donate \$250 to the
 Tunnels to Tower Foundation to be
 made at the national convention in
 Dallas TX 2025.



Voting

There will be national retiree elections in TX. There are two candidates for National Retired President, Kathy Frame, Retired PM from PA and Louise Nix, Retired PM from GA. Statements were read on behalf of each candidate and the MA Chapter voted to endorse Louise Nix. Rosa Gonzales is running unopposed for the position of National VP Retired. Her statement was read and the MA Chapter voted to endorse her. Final results will be announced in TX.

There was much discussion regarding the 2 national bylaw proposals out of 15 that retirees are allowed to vote on at the national convention in TX in August per the active bylaws.

Bylaw Proposal #5: Would allow the national office to temporarily eliminate the provision of Article 1, Section 3b, which states increases in retiree dues is based on the percentage of the annual COLA and replace the language allowing the national office to increase the retiree dues to \$7 per month effective Jan 1, 2026; then to \$8.60 per month effective Jan 1, 2027; and to \$10 per month effective Jan 1, 2028. The previous language regarding increases based on the annual COLA percentage will then be reinstated effective Jan 1, 2029. Currently retirees pay \$5.73 per month.

Bylaw Proposal #7: Pertains to Article 1, Section 3a and would set the dues of associate and PMR members at \$3 per pay period because they are active members and have different issues and as active are not subject to COLA adjustments. The UPMA bylaws include these employees as part of the retirees and they currently pay dues of \$2.65 per pay period.

Pres Charley reported that the national retiree board worked with National Pres Tony and the national board on proposed bylaw #5 to increase the retiree dues over the next three years and then return to the current formula utilizing the COLA. He stated that the national office is looking at all expenses and trying to reduce spending such the reduction in The Leader printed issues, the elimination of a meal one night at the national convention, the reduction of in person meetings required for the national executive board, etc.

There is a proposed bylaw change (#6) that only active members can vote on that require the national retiree organization to reimburse the national office the difference between the discounted rate of 25% that the retirees, associates and their guests pay for national convention registration. The rationale is that the retiree members receive all the same meals and other events as the active members and the loss on this reduced registration fee is significant for the national organization so they are looking for a way to recover these costs. Retirees cannot vote on this bylaw proposal.

The national office is also considering doing away with the free day at the national convention and/or ending the business session early afternoon.



Charity Challenge

The national office of UPMA active and retired members has selected Tunnel to Towers (T2T) Foundation as the **Veterans Project** charity again this year. Last year UPMA members nationally donated almost \$40,000 to T2T to continue their work. In 2024, the MA active members voted and donated \$1,000 and the MA retirees voted and donated \$250. During the 2025 state convention this May, the MA active members and retirees voted to donate the same amounts respectively.

THE CHALLENGE

Retired Postmaster Peter Attridge is challenging all MA retirees to match the active members' donation of \$1,000. Peter will personally match the donation of the MA retirees at \$250, bringing the retiree donation to \$500 year to date. The challenge is to all other MA retirees to make a donation towards a goal of another \$500.

HOW TO DONATE

There are a couple of ways to donate which will give credit to the MA retirees.

1) By August 1, 2025, you can mail your check payable to MA UPMA Retired to Retired Sec/ Treasurer Lorna Edie, 47 Oak St, North Billerica 01862. Lorna will deposit all checks to the retirees' checking account and write one check payable to Tunnels to Towers from the MA retirees and send it to Anita Pfiefer, 20576 Kearnev Path, Lakeville MN 55044. Anita is the National Retired Treasurer and is working

directly with T2T to insure the donations are properly designated from MA.

- 2) You can make your check payable to Tunnel to Towers Foundation with a note on the memo line stating MA Retiree donation and mail your check directly to Anita Pfiefer at the address above. This will insure proper tracking for MA.
- 3) You can donate online at https://dogood.T2T.org/UPMAVeteransProject25 and in the comment section indicate you are a UPMA MA Retired Member. These donations go directly to Tunnel to Towers without tracking by the UPMA national office. You can view all UPMA donations on this same webpage. You can also donate using this QR code.



Although this challenge started as a retiree challenge from Peter, active members can also continue to donate using options 2 and 3 above. Be sure to indicate you are an active member, not a retiree.



Another concern is classifying new federal employees as "At Will" employees which would mean they will not have any protections in terms of due process, appeal rights, etc.

I would use one word to describe the current Postal Service situation as "turbulence".

So, friends, control what you can control, stay close to the UPMA daily information, keep your chin up, protect vour image and

continue to provide quality service to the public and your community. Most of all, when it comes to work and family, make the correct choice, your family and your health is most important.

Our most recent chapter meeting, held on March 20, featured two outstanding guest speakers, Rob Leary, UPMA MA President and Rich Hui our National Adverse Action Rep, who provided an insightful overview of pending legislation in Congress, along with updates on key issues emerging across the country. Their presentation sparked thoughtful discussion, and I remain cautiously optimistic about the road ahead.



Time to Step Back, Pause and Reflect on the Future

I have always been an overachiever throughout my life. I have always strived to be the best at what I do. I always loved helping people for the greater good of any organization that I was part of. Not sure if this is the best course moving forward. This is why, after a nice 2-week vacation where I had no responsibilities, no laptops, and no emails I was able to look back at the past.

From the get go, in school, I've always been in the top 5 students in my class. I started studying computers where I learned Cobol and Fortran. Yes, the Graphical user interface we know today did not exist yet. I graduated with high honor in 1984, and I was accepted at the prestigious Royal Military College of Canada as an officer cadet. I wasn't even 16 and required my parent's signature to be able to join the military. My MOS was infantry, and I was enrolled in a computer science program. I was a member of the intramural soccer and football team as well as the varsity hockey team. This was a major adjustment in my life and the schedule was structured and very busy from the moment we woke up in the morning at 5:00 AM until bedtime at 11:00 PM. Believe it or not, my weakest grade was in the French class, my native language. Politics got involved and budget cuts forced the leaders of the school to cut a major part of a class. Great leaders I was looking up to. This affected my performance overall since the best were not necessarily graduating anymore. Why be the best if politics can get you out of the program. In 1986, I became a civilian after turning down an offer from the military to become an air traffic controller in Germany and enrolled in a computer technician class which was supposed to last 9 months. After 6, I was done and started their programming class which they dragged their feet on to not allow me to get too

much done. Yes, I paid for 9 months, and I was guaranteed to get 9 months' worth of schooling. Once I graduated, and failing some entry job interviews as being too qualified, I finally found a job at a field service company fixing terminals, centralized computers, teletypes, printers, etc.... This was great traveling across the province of Quebec daily to service our customers. This went well and eventually Apple computer acquired the company to help with servicing their computer base but eventually I got laid off before Christmas when Apple computers decided to change their strategy and started working through licensed dealers. I got hired at one of them and that worked very well for years. I even helped open a satellite store on the south shore of Montreal. Eventually, this also came to an end but I found a job with Computerland. They specialized in networked hardware maintenance like servers, computers, laptops, printers. This was getting interesting. I got certified on equipment like Compaq, HP, and NEC. The company was acquired by WorldCom to become their field service branch. When they won a contract with one of the largest law firms in Canada, I was assigned to be their field service technician. The Law firm needed more than that and I expanded into the networking and help desk areas. I became a Novell and Microsoft Certified network engineer. One day I was approached by NEC since the firm I worked with had a large inventory of NEC Computers and laptops. I guess I had a good reputation, and they offered me a job as a sales engineer with a territory ranging from Ottawa to the Maritimes region. This went very well. The Canadian government added a new requirement that every product sold to them had to be available in both French and English languages. I started working with the project management team in Boxborough MA and helped develop a full line of products for the Canadian market. In 1999, NEC offered me a job in the US as a project manager for their notebook division. Working with cutting edge technology was awesome. Packard Bell merged with NEC and there goes the next chapter of my career. The company wasn't doing well, the quality of the

product was not as good as it was under NEC Computers and eventually, the company closed in the US. Out of 3,000 employees, I was one of the 50 employees remaining in a spinoff called Vibren Technology. I was now writing contracts to support the sales and engineering groups. Our core business evolved in programming for smaller devices like smartphones. I was assigned to work for one of their subsidiaries and developed a help desk application using Microsoft Access. The application had the ability to page and email people when the cases were closed or escalated. But that ended in 2005 when Vibren Technology was

I started working for a general contractor. We were doing everything from renovations to additions. Name what could be done like windows, doors, roofing, floorings, plumbing, electrical, etc.... A friend of mine worked for the Department of Corrections as a Correctional Officer and I started the process to apply for that job. I passed all the requirements and tests needed to be accepted but for some strange reason, I was removed from the initial list to report to their academy due to not having my citizenship and preventing me from being able to get a license to carry for work. In parallel, his wife worked for the Postal Service as a clerk and convinced me to apply there as well. The rest is history even though a year after I started at the Post Office; I received a letter in the mail to report to the Department of Corrections Academy

My postal career started in 2006 in Ayer as a clerk. I was able to do a mutual exchange 9 months later with a carrier who wanted to become a clerk. I carried mail and was a shop steward for 6 years in Ayer and was introduced to management. I had details in Natick, Maynard, and Leominster. I eventually became a Supervisor in Leominster where I started the first Amazon Hub for the 014 Zip code. After the second year, it grew so much that I was asked to help start a second hub in Fitchburg which are still active today. I became the Postmaster of Shirley where Postmaster Pam Boudreau saw my potential and asked me to do some work to help POOM E and

the district. I started doing office transfers, 552 (IMIP) investigations, and supported my peers with all sorts of questions and issues. I even helped with upgrading many offices to the ACE4 computers. Time



changed and evolved with new technologies and management styles. Reports, dashboards, certifications, etc.... were popping up very quickly. I'm the type of guy who embraces changes but those were coming in fast and furious along with real time reporting and validations requirements. The best tool I had at my disposal "time" vanished. This had a side effect of cutting into my personal time to offset some of those loses.

Last year at the state convention, I decided to meet with retirement consultants who helped validate the numbers I had compiled and maintained over the years, and I started to investigate the possibility for retirement. It's never too early to look at it. There's more to the numbers when looking at retiring. What to do if you retire too young or want to stay active. I started to look at what I am good at and what I could do after retiring from the USPS. Like my wife always said, I'm a pretender for those who have seen the TV show. I can be a mechanic, an electrician, a plumber, a carpenter, etc.... or maybe I wasn't looking close enough.

I always loved the work I did as a Postmaster. Maybe this could be a full circle in my career. I love the people I work with. The demands of the job are frustrating at times, but they are fulfilling. I've always been interested in details to learn about the various departments to see what I could eventually do before retiring. In February 2025, I received a call to see if I was interested in a detail in IT. This seemed to be the perfect opportunity to see if this could be a fit for me and of course, if I am a fit for the company. Maybe this is a crossroad I need to consider. I'm still a long way from it but I need to make a 5-year plan which we should all be doing regularly to focus on our goals. My IT detail started on March 22nd and I will always do my best to support you when you have questions or issues.


