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1100 11th NOVEMBER 1918

The Armistice was signed and silence fell across the battlefields of WW1 exactly one hundred years ago to the day. Bury town centre memorial was packed with men, women and children from the Borough and surrounds to pay their respects to the fallen and the wounded servicemen and women who served their country in those harrowing times. The Association standard making its debut at this years remembrance service along with many of our members. The parade started from the Council building and marched to the Rock Memorial to the sound of the Fusilier band. Everyone stayed in step (amazingly), the crowds were appreciative to the veterans and groups along the way with their applause. On arrival at the Rock the parade assembled for the silence and wreath laying ceremony, unfortunately the heavens opened and gave everyone a drenching but this seemed to underline the solemnity of the service. Ex Royal Artillery gunner **Owen Dykes** had the honour of placing the Association's wreath alongside many other tributes. On completion of the service the Association members dispersed amongst the hostilities of Bury then to reform in Tottington for the village's Remembrance at 3pm. Owen changed hats and became the parade commander and marched us to the memorial in the village centre. The service conducted by our very own **Padre Hugh Bearn** from St Anne's church Tottington and dignitaries including the Mayor of Bury Jane Black and MP James Frith attended. The Association's wreath this time laid by ex RAF member **Nikki Grey**. On completion the parade reformed and marched back to disperse at the church hall where the villagers had supplied rations of tea, biscuits and cake along with a warming tot of rum. Thanks to all concerned for making our Association very welcome. Big thanks also to member ex RRF **Paul Andrews** who carried our Standard with panache as always.

WW1 INTERESTING FACT

While the war raged on in the mud and trenches, a very different war was taking place beneath the soldiers' feet. A group of miners, operating in total secrecy, dug tunnels up to 100ft underground, to plant and detonate mines beneath the enemy's trenches. Their biggest success was at Messines Ridge in Belgium where over 900,000lbs of explosives were simultaneously detonated in 19 underground tunnels. Much of the German front line was destroyed, and the explosions were heard 140 miles away by the British prime minister in Downing St.

BREW UP WITH A VETERAN. 19th October Mosses centre. As part of the WW1 commemorations being held this year the Association in conjunction with the Armed Forces Covenant Trust held a coffee morning to create a time of reflection to understand the effect and consequences of war. Meeting the many veterans who attended were, in no particular order, the Padre of St Annes, Tottington Hugh Bearn, Tina and Julie from Groundwork, a delegation of ladies from NHS Bury CCG, Kath Hoyle from Bury Council along with Caroline of Community Services, Russ Magnall GMP, SSAFA, Rod Lloyd and his wife, RBL, along with school children and mums and dads. On display were the "There but not there" figures supplied by 'Remembered' and funded by Armed Forces Covenant Fund Trust, also the Association Standard and display board with pull up banners. The display board was the focal attention of our visitors and showed member's photographs and explanations of what good work the Association is doing in the community. Along with tea and coffee were a selection of cakes and biscuits made by our members and voluntary donations that were given were then donated to the RBL Poppy Appeal. A big thanks to our **President Chris Harness MBE** for all his hard work organising the event, Ann McGladdery for the use of the Mosses Centre and Trish for all her efforts in the kitchen.

The Standard (carried by **Paul Andrews**) was on display at Nuttall Park Ramsbottom for the unveiling of a WW1 peace memorial to honour the men and women of Ramsbottom who made the ultimate sacrifice during the First World War. The event was organised by member **Steve Butterworth** with the help of a team from "Rammy Rocks." Hundreds of memorial rocks that had been painted by local children and their families were embedded around a centre stone, under which a time capsule was placed. A short service took place, poems were read and white doves were released to symbolise the hope that future generations could live freely in peace. A dozen Association members came along to support Steve's event, along with Bury MP James Frith, who made a short speech, and leading members of Bury Council. To warm everyone up, tea and very delicious "stickies" were on offer afterwards in the 'Friends of Nuttall Park' tea room.

Normandy Battlefield Tour 14–17 SEP. A really unsocial time to assemble in Bury O445 (sad face), but all who booked managed to get there on time, with passports, for the start of a four day trip to the Normandy Beaches and surrounding areas of the greatest military operation of all time. The trip organised by Civ Div Chair **Shirley Simmons** went to plan without a hitch so a big thanks must go to Shirley for putting in all the hard work. The tour operator “Ledger Holidays” was extremely efficient. A mention has to go to our tour guide Carl Shilleto who definitely knew his stuff - even **Harry Mills** who landed on the beach couldn't fault his knowledge! Carl is a military historian in his own right and has published a couple of books and runs the 'Fallen Heroes of Normandy' website hosting 26,000 memorial pages, one for each of the fallen from the British and Commonwealth forces.

The weather during the trip was exceptional and made the whole experience very enjoyable. The outward and return journeys were pretty gruelling but manageable with plenty of refreshment stops. A couple of boxes of beer bought on the ferry quenched our thirst and lasted a couple of hours! The spectacular sunset as we crossed the Seine estuary over the Pont de Normandie bridge was a sight to behold. The two days of touring were worth every inconvenience of the journey! The first day after a bright and early start, was spent at Pegasus Bridge and Museum and the Commonwealth War Cemetery at Ranville with a visit to Sword, Juno Beach and Museum, Gold Beach and Arromanches and the remains of Mulberry Harbour in the afternoon. **Anthony Dalton-Hughes** left us on the second day to make a journey of his own to St Marie cemetery , Le Havre, to pay his respects at his grandfather's resting place. The rest of us started the day at Omaha Beach and the American Cemetery which features in 'Saving Private Ryan.' We took in the Overlord-Museum and St Mere Eglise for lunch. The afternoon tour focused on the US Airborne forces and took us to the Richard Winters Leadership Memorial (commander of Easy Company 101 Airborne), Utah beach and Museum and finally to the German Military Cemetery at La Cambe. A wonderful trip was had by all and documented by Tom White who made a short video of the trip, thanks Tom. Where are we going next year? Possibly Gibraltar? We are open to suggestions.

The average life expectancy in the trenches was about six weeks. Junior officers and stretcher bearers were some of the people most at risk.
