


As part of our Lost Letters project with Surrey History Centre, It's Not Your Birthday But... are inviting you to create a Pocket of Hope in the form of a Victorian puzzle purse.

In the current climate of change and uncertainty, share a message of hope or positivity that may bring someone else some comfort or inspire them.

Looking at the archives, we can see that maintaining a sense of hope encouraged many people to get through difficult times. The example here was written in response to a letter sent by Ms Dabbs in 1916 to the King of Spain, Alfonso XIII. King Alfonso helped those searching for loved ones in the chaos of the Great War. Ms Dabbs wrote many letters in hope of receiving information regarding the whereabouts of her missing fiancé Private Edward George Cutt.







"I am ordered by His Majesty the King, my August sovereign to answer your letter petitionning H.M to cause inquiries to be made in Berlin with regard to Mr. Edward George Cutt... His Majesty earnestly hopes that these inquiries may be the means of procuring satisfactory information for you."










A Pocket of Hope





You could choose a more simple origami shape to fold if you wanted to, or even fold a piece of paper in half. Think about who you are sharing your message of hope with. What would be helpful for them to hear? Here is an example:
