Chapter 1:

The Benefits of Reading to Children

- ▶ **Grammar Skills:** Regular reading helps children grasp complex grammatical structures, aiding in more sophisticated language use as they grow.

Improved Focus and Concentration

Children introduced to reading early often develop stronger attention spans and memory retention skills. A study from the American Academy of Pediatrics found that children who were read to from an early age showed more active brain patterns, particularly in areas associated with narrative comprehension and visual imagery.

EMOTIONAL AND SOCIAL BENEFITS

Empathy Development

- Reading stories provides children with an opportunity to identify with characters in various situations, fostering empathy. A 2018 study from the University of Cambridge found that children who read and discussed character emotions showed improved empathy and social understanding.


Strengthening Bonds

- › **Tips:** Encourage interaction by asking questions about pictures; let them turn pages.

3. *PRESCHOOL (3-5 YEARS)*

- › **Focus:** Picture books with more complex stories.

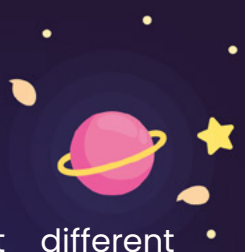

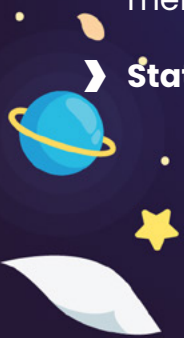

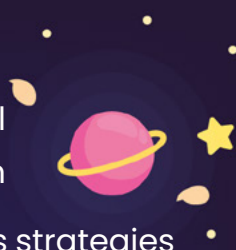
