



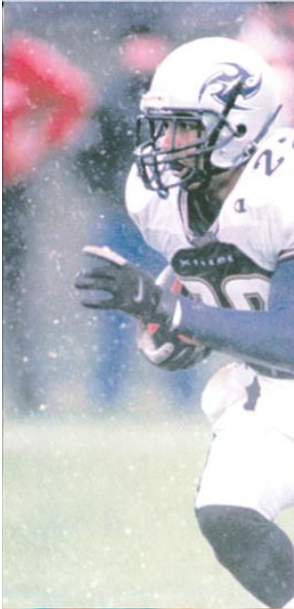

The Australian team had a chance to tie the contest late in the fourth period but another 40-yard penalty kick went wide.

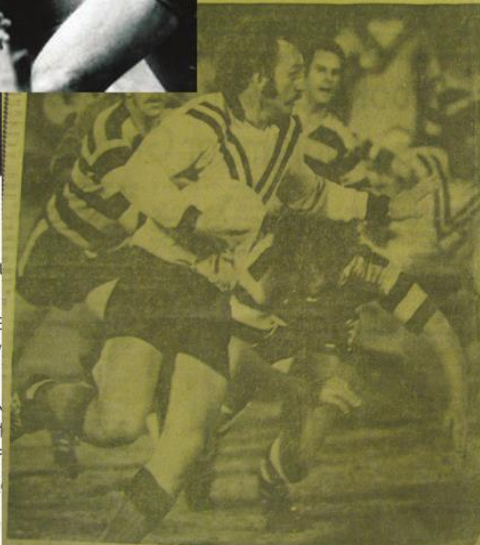
The game wasn't as close as the score indicated as Kern County had seven stopped right at the goal line.

The Aussies handled the ball better than the set play.

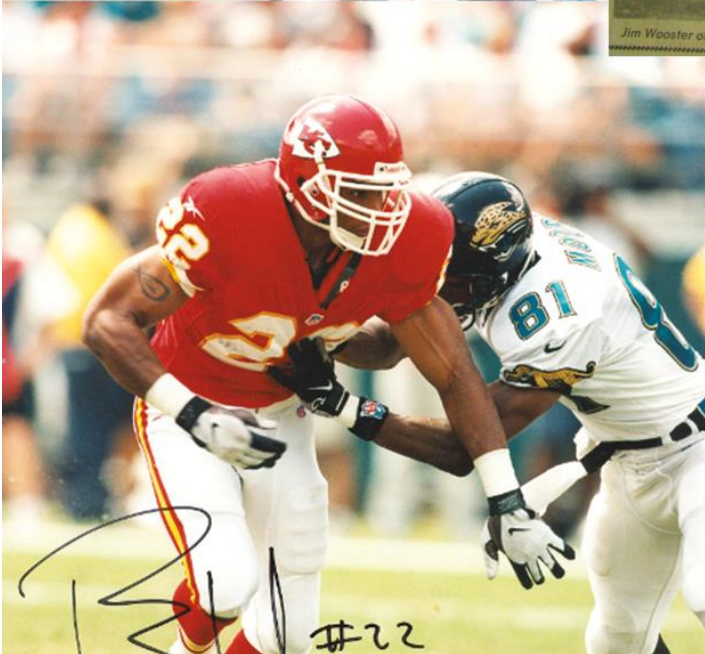
Steve Lindsay and Regis Coyle did jobs as forwards and set up many of the local club. Backs Jim Wooster and Groefsema also put in outstanding effort.

Eagle Rock will provide the location for Kern County Sunday at West games are scheduled with the first at 5 p.m.

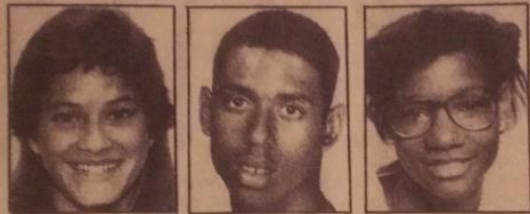

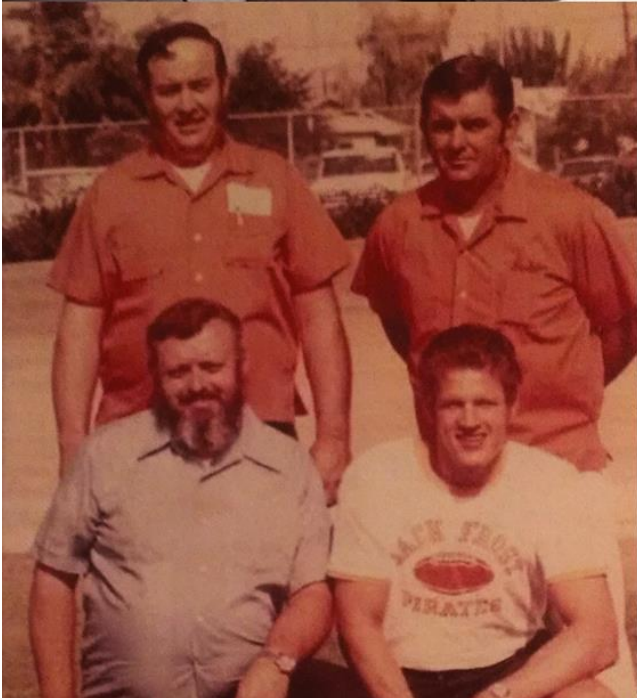

A MESSAGE FROM THE VP

As vice president of the Foothill Hall of Fame, one of my tasks is to chair the Nominating Committee. It is the responsibility of the Nominating Committee to review inductee submissions for compliance with Hall of Fame standards and to validate their achievements. The Committee then selects the specified number of nominees to create a ballot, which is presented to the Board of Directors for the subsequent vote of the membership.

Where does the selection process begin? First, the nominee must be a FHS graduate of at least 10 years and the individual initiating the nomination must be either an alumnus of Foothill High School, a participant on the Hall of Fame Board of Directors, an previous inductee and member of the Hall of Fame, or a current or former Foothill faculty member or administrator. The nomination form may be obtained through the Foothill High School Athletic Director's Office or online at www.foothillhalloffame.org.

The nomination package must include the completed "long" nomination form, a letter of recommendation from the individual making the nomination, and a list of the nominee's achievements during and after his time at Foothill High School. Copies of any newspaper clippings or photographs are both helpful and appreciated.

There are many outstanding, deserving individuals who have worn the Black and Gold and selection for induction in the Hall of Fame is a great honor, an honor worth waiting for. We hope your favorite Trojan will soon join this elite group of athletes, coaches, and contributors.

In 1965, Foothill offered only a varsity football team, and was limited by league rules to only 45 players and 3 coaches. It was the first year Ned Permenter served as Head Football Coach, with Bob Ezell and Elmer Scritchfield assisting. Foothill was only 4 years old, and this team fielded its first four year graduating class. Foothill's stadium had no lights, so all home games had to be played on the field of another school.

Up to this point, Bakersfield High School competed "at large" and was not allowed into any league because the school was so large, and the program had been so successful. To call themselves champions, which they had been declared many times, they had to have the best record in the valley, which usually meant going undefeated. The last game of the season featured FHS versus BHS, both unbeaten in league play. Accordingly, there was a huge demand for tickets surpassing the maximum capacity of the South High stadium originally scheduled as the venue for the game. North and South were scheduled to play that Friday evening at Memorial Stadium, and when asked, neither would agree to move their game to another site.

A compromise was reached allowing for the NHS/SHS game to start a little early, after the conclusion of which FHS and BHS would play. Almost 13,000 tickets were sold for the unique double header, but when all the other games in town ended and the FHS/BHS game was still underway, fans flocked from all the other games traveled up to Memorial Stadium to see the second half of the game, before what quickly became a packed house.

BHS had a 27 game win streak (only 9 game seasons then with no playoffs) and an all-star lineup featuring Back of the year Pat Skrable, Lineman of the year Pat Preston and future Minnesota Viking all pro Jeff Siemon, plus numerous other future Division I players. Foothill featured a backfield of Jim Thompson, John Ackerley (went on to play at both BC and UNLV) Mike Reber (went on to play at the University of Hawaii), Charlie Harris (went on to play at Washington State University), and lineman Mark Hultgran (went on to play at the University of California), plus many other future college players.

As the game wound down, BHS had the ball on the 9 yard line with 6 seconds remaining. On the last play of the game, Steve Johnson intercepted a BHS pass in the end zone as the gun went off allowing Foothill to win 12-9.

This game was heralded as of the most exciting games in the history of Kern County football. Not only did this victory put the Foothill football program on the map, but it also set the stage for an arch rivalry with BHS for decades to come. The historic victory caused Foothill to be ranked the Number One team not only in Kern County, but also in the Valley.

This miracle season, first championship and historic victory over overwhelming odds, distinguishes the 1965 Trojan Football team from all others and deservedly qualifies them as the first Foothill football team to be inducted into the Foothill Athletic Hall of Fame.

NEIL AGNES

CLASS OF 1968

Despite being unable to play sports his sophomore year due to state funding issues, Neil Agnes still managed to establish himself as one of the most feared linemen in the school's history. He was a two-way starter his junior and senior years and was selected to the All-City team his senior year. Additionally, Neil was a three year member of the wrestling team, winning the heavyweight SYL Championship his senior year. After wrestling season each year, he continued to add to his athletic resume by participating in track and field in the shot put and discus events.

After graduating, he continued to add to his athletic accomplishments. As a member of the Bakersfield College football team, he was named First Team All-League; Outstanding Lineman for the Metro Conference; the team's Most Valuable Player; and J.C. All-American. During his two years as a B.C. Renegade, Neil created the reputation as one of the toughest players in the school's history.

As a junior transfer to U.C. Berkeley, Neil played for the Golden Bears on both the football and rugby teams. As a three year member of the rugby team, he had the honor of helping his team win a NCAA National Championship. After his collegiate career, he played for Hawaii in the World Football League, as well as eleven years in organized rugby. Neil currently lives in Bakersfield and owns his own business.

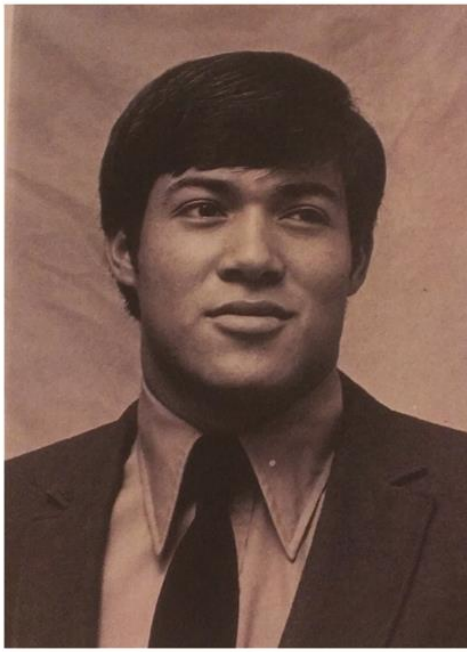


BOLANLE ALADE

CLASS OF 1998

In her four years at Foothill High School, Bo Alade set numerous track records, was an outstanding basketball player, earned a 4.0 GPA, and still found time to participate in numerous community activities and events. As a four-year Captain of the team, her stellar track record includes being a four-time first place winner in the 4X100 Relay (League, Area, Valley); a three-time first place winner in the 100 Meters winner (League, Area, Valley); a four-time first place winner in the 200 Meters (League, Area, Valley); a member of the Foothill Girls League Championship team ('95, '96, '97, '98); and Valley Champion in 200 Meters in '95 and '96. She also set a Kern Relays record in the 100 Meters ('97); set two Foothill records in the 4X100 and 4X400 relays; participated in the California State Meet in the 100 and 200 Meters and 4X100 relay; and in 1997 was ranked number 13 in the country in the 100 Meters by Track and Field Magazine. She was named Jockey Club Athlete of the Month for four years ('95, '96, '97, '98); named the Bakersfield Californian Athlete of the Week for four years and All Area Athlete for four years; and, she was awarded the MVP Award as well as the Highest GPA Award for track in '95, '96, '97 and '98. While Bo is primarily known for her exceptional track performance, she also was an outstanding basketball player. Her junior year she was twice recognized as Player of the Week, selected to the All-League Team, and was given the highest GPA Award for Basketball.

Among her accomplishments her senior year, Bo was ASB President, named Most Outstanding Female Athlete, served on the Mayor's Youth Advisory Council, awarded the Mayor's Trophy, and chosen as the 1998 Jim Tyack Award recipient. After Foothill, Bo graduated from the University of Miami and later the University of Miami Miller School of Medicine. In 2008 Dr. Bo began her Orthopedic Surgery Residency at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center in Dallas, and has been Chief Residence since 2012.



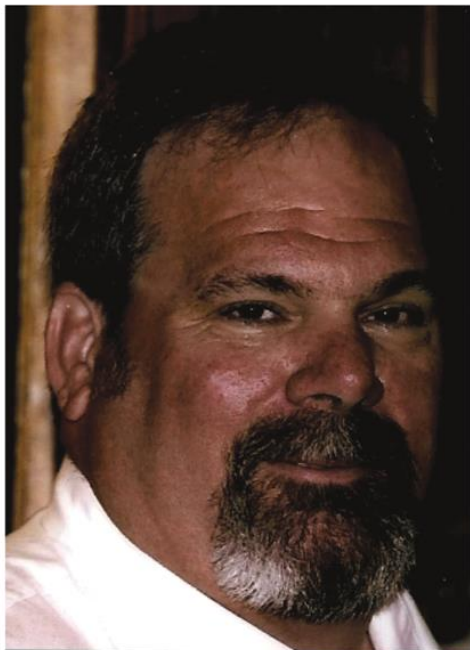
TED ARMIJO
CLASS OF 1968

Ted's freshman year, 1965-66, the district only offered varsity sports, but despite only having the opportunity to play athletics three of his four high school years, Ted more than made up for that lost year. His senior year Ted was a two-way varsity starter and for his efforts he was named All League Defensive Back. In addition to football, Ted also was a three-year member of the track team, competing as a sprinter.

After graduating from Foothill, Ted quickly adjusted to the rigors of junior college football. He was a starting defensive back both years at B.C. His second year he was named All-Metro and All-State defensive back. For these two seasons, the Renegades were also undefeated in Metropolitan Conference play, winning the Metropolitan Championships in 1969 and 1970---a feat that has not been repeated since. Ted also has the honorable distinction of being a member of the Number 1 ranked junior college team in the nation in 1970. Both of these years, B.C. met Fullerton Junior College in hotly contested games for the State Championship.

After B.C., Ted transferred to Long Beach State University, where he not only won a starting defensive back position both years, but also was named All-PCAA defensive back both years. His junior year Long Beach State won the PCAA Championship, making it the third consecutive championship team Ted had played on. As a senior, Ted won national recognition with 11 interceptions, just one behind the National leader, Leroy Keys of Purdue. He ended his collegiate football career being named Associated Press Honorable Mention All-American.

After college, Ted briefly signed and tried out for the San Diego Chargers and the Houston Oilers, before a brief stint with the Portland Storm in the World Football League. After returning to Bakersfield in 1974, Ted began a 36 year coaching and teaching career that included positions at BHS, Bakersfield Adult School, Kern Valley, East High, and Bakersfield College. The last 14 years of his career, he served as the Athletic Director at East High.

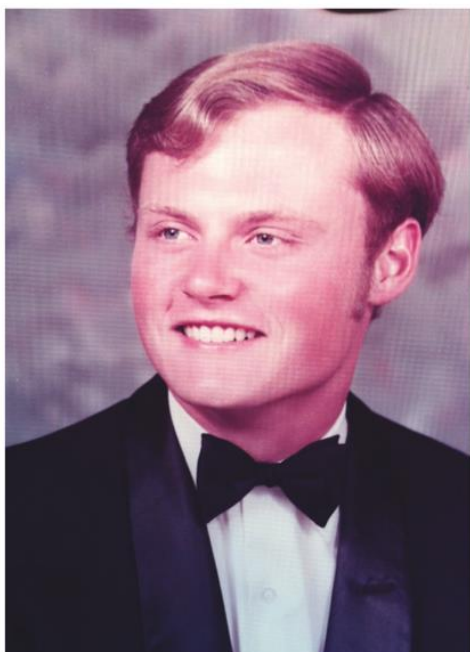


JOHN CLARK
CLASS OF 1974

Because of his competitive spirit and love of athletics, John excelled in football, wrestling, and track. Playing both ways, he was a three year starter on the varsity football team and was named All-League as a center in 1972, and All-City as a tackle in 1973. He had the great distinction of being a member of two SYL Championship Football teams in 1972 (8-3) and 1973 (9-1). Additionally, he wrestled all four years, and as a senior he won the heavyweight SYL League Championship, placing 2nd in the Yosemite Division and 3rd in the CIF Valley. While John did qualify for the State Wrestling Tournament, he was unable to compete due to an injury. He was also a four-year member of the track team, competing in the discus and shot put.

While at Bakersfield College, he was a two-year starter on the football team. Because of his athletic versatility, John played all three interior line positions during his collegiate career. His sophomore year he was named to the All-Metro Conference team. As a Fresno State Bulldog, John was a two-year starter at center, a position that was the heart of the Bulldog offense. Under the guidance of Coach Jim Sweeny, John developed into an excellent football player and an outstanding leader on and off the field.

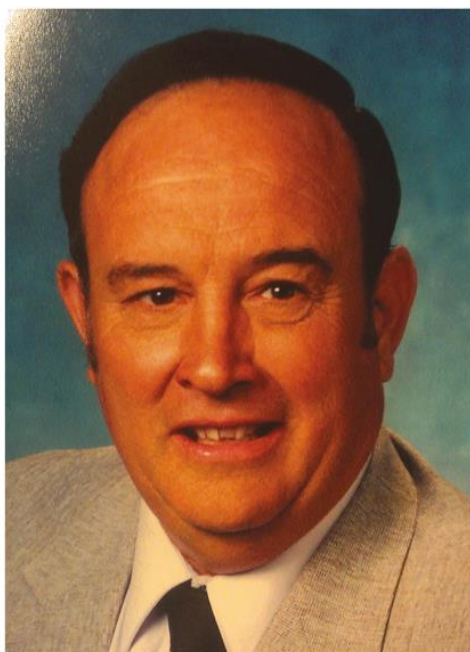
After graduating from Fresno State, John served as an assistant coach at Monache and Madera High Schools before he got his first head coaching job at Hanford High School in 1983. After seven years at Hanford, he left in 1990 and he assumed the head coaching position at Corcoran High School, where his team won the Central Sequoia Division Football Championship in 1995. That same year, the Fresno Bee named John Coach of the Year. Returning to Hanford as the head coach in 2000, John coached for six more years, retiring in 2006, with an overall record at Hanford of 84-74, establishing him as the winningest coach in the school's history. At the conclusion of his career, John had accumulated a total career record of 131-105. Sadly, John's life was cut short at age 50 by leukemia. In 2007, John was posthumously inducted into the Hanford High School's Football Hall of Fame. During his career, John coached at several high schools and several of his players went on to play for Division I colleges and universities. His memory is still revered by his former players, colleagues and parents who knew and worked with him.



JON DES POIS
CLASS OF 1973

As a three year varsity starter going both ways, Jon is recognized as one of the best linemen to ever wear a Trojan uniform. Known for his quickness and agility, Jon gave the opposing teams plenty of reasons to provide additional blockers when traveling to his side of the line. He was not only a member of the '72 and '73 SYL Championship teams, he was also named All-City Lineman of the Year in '72, as well as selected to play in the California Statewide North-South Shrine Game. In addition to football, Jon was an outstanding baseball player; he played varsity for three of his four years.

His senior year, Jon was heavily recruited by some of the top Division I schools in the nation. After selecting Washington State University, it did not take long for him to demonstrate why Coach Sweany and his staff recruited Jon. His freshman year, Jon started at center and for the next three years, he remained in the starting lineup as an interior lineman. In 1976, his senior year, in recognition of his athletic excellence, Jon received the prestigious Laurie Neime Award for Washington State University. After graduating, Jon remained at WSU as the offensive line coach. Because of his love of athletics, for most of his adult life Jon has continued to sponsor and coach baseball, soccer, and basketball.

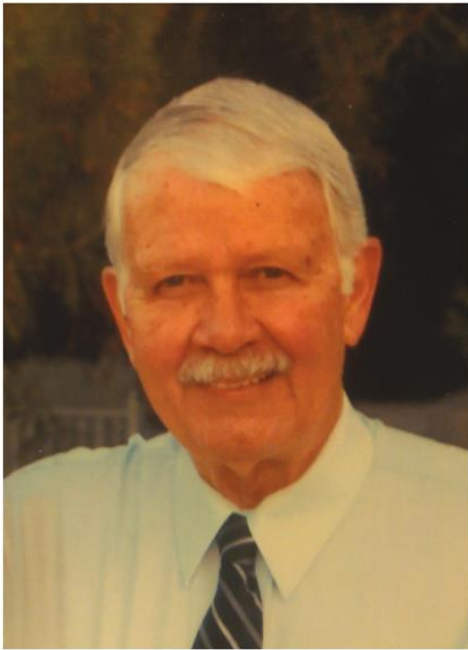


CHUCK HARRIGER
1968 - 1993

Chuck Harriger's contribution to Foothill High School and the Foothill community began in 1968, when he volunteered to coach the Pirates, the Jack Frost football team that was the feeder program to Foothill. For the next 15 years (1968-1983), Chuck and his assistants, Dan Thesman, Auggie Cardiel, and Fred Acosta, were responsible for teaching the fundamentals of football to some of Foothill's most notable performers. Each day after work, Chuck would arrive home to find a gang of 12 and 13 year old boys shooting hoops in his driveway and waiting for a ride to football practice in the back of Chuck's work truck. Assisted by his son, Kevin, Chuck went on to coach Foothill's fro-soph football team from 1986 to 1993. During this time, Chuck developed a profound respect for Foothill's coaching staff and found tremendous gratification in helping to add to the success of school's athletic program. Later, Chuck reached across town and coached softball for Bakersfield High School for 8 years.

The legacy Chuck left on Foothill athletics also includes his leadership of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes (FCA), which he and his wife, Alice, hosted weekly at their home for 18 years (1973-1990). The FCA included male and female athletes from all sports, as they came together to share their experiences, pray for one another, and find guidance in a safe and caring environment.

In his younger days, Chuck played on several Kern County community athletic teams. In addition to running a business, raising a family, and coaching athletics, Chuck also found time to serve on the Fairfax School Board for 44 years. He and Alice raised four children, all of whom graduated from Foothill High School and went on to become teachers. Together they operated Chuck's Appliance Service for 56 years. He and Alice are among the faces of outstanding Foothill parent supporters who provided numerous young people the opportunity to participate in sports. Chuck devoted his time, resources, and heart to the pursuit of encouraging young people through sports

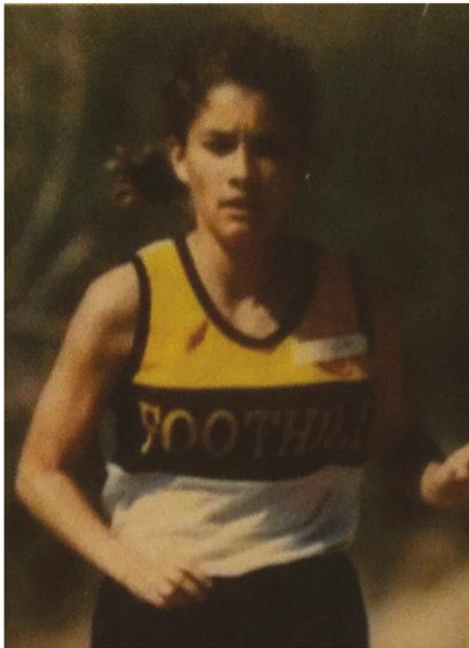


RAY JUHL
1962 - 2010

Ray Juhl began his coaching and teaching career at Foothill High School in 1962, as a drafting instructor and coach. During the next three years, he established himself as an energetic and well-schooled football and wrestling coach. In 1965, Ray was once again given the prestigious distinction of opening a new school when he was named the head wrestling coach at West High School. During the next twelve years, Coach Juhl produced an impressive resume: in 1967, West was 6-0 in Dual Meet Champions and South Sequoia League Champions; in 1974, West went 6-0 in SYL Dual Meet Champions; and in 1975, West was 10-2 in SYL Dual Meet Champions.

After a ten year hiatus from teaching, Ray returned to Foothill High School where he once again taught drafting. With the advent of computers, Ray's drafting program became one of the premier programs not only in the District but in the United States. It was not unusual for Ray to have in excess of 50 students in his drafting/CAD lab at any given time. For the next twelve years, projects created by Ray's students consistently placed among the best at the California State Fair in Sacramento.

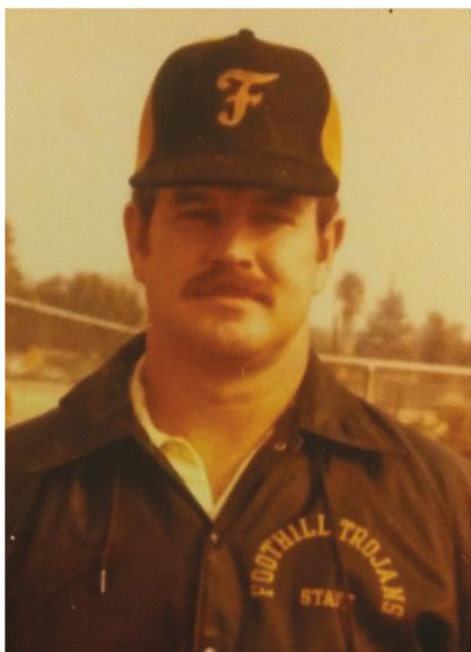
Ray's contagious enthusiasm was not limited to his classroom. Ray is widely known as the Greatest Fundraiser in the history of Foothill. For fifteen years, he headed up the Foothill High School Reverse Drawing and as a long-standing member of the Foothill Foundation, Ray has helped to raise thousands of dollars for academic programs. He also served on Foothill's 50th Gala Committee this past year. Over the years, Ray has been recognized in many ways for his exemplary service: he was recently inducted into the California Wrestling Hall of Fame; as one of over 500 teachers to be nominated, Ray was selected as the Prestigious Exemplary Academy Teacher of the Year by the National Career Academy Coalition; and he won the Beautiful Bakersfield Award twice. Ray's contribution to Foothill High School and the Bakersfield community has improved the lives of countless students and won the admiration and respect of his colleagues and friends.



MARYANN MARTINEZ
CLASS OF 1990

Foothill has long held the reputation as one of the most successful cross country programs in the city. Much of that success is due to runners such as Maryann Martinez. Her accomplishments on the course speak for themselves. She still holds 33 of 38 Foothill Cross Country records; she has a Dual meet record of 41 wins and 1 loss; she won 12 Invitational Championships; she was a three time League Champion; as a freshman she placed 4th in Area and the following year, 1987, she placed 2nd in Area. Continually improving, Maryann placed 2nd in League in 1988, as well as winning the Area Championship in 1988 and 1989. By the time Maryann became a junior, she was the league's dominant runner, winning the Valley Championship in 1988. But this was only a prelude to what was to come her senior year, when she was a repeat Valley Championship winner in 1989; and again, for the fourth year, she qualified for the State Meet, placing 8th in 1989.

Her discipline, determination, and hard work earned her the respect and admiration of her fellow runners, both those on her team and on opposing teams. Among the many honors she received were being named Jockey Club Athlete of the Month four times, as well as being named the Bakersfield Californian athlete of the Year, not once but four times during her high school career. Maryann is a licensed athletic trainer and worked for a number of schools and colleges during her career. She currently lives in Phoenix, Arizona.

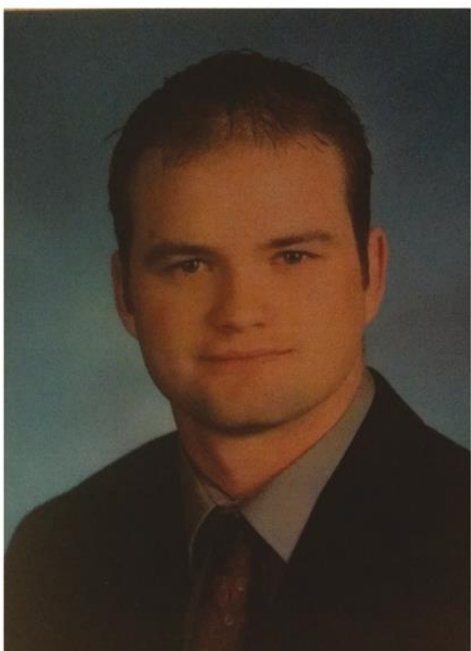


BILL MOORE
1976 - 2010

In 1976 Bill Moore became a member of the Foothill High School Staff, serving as a teacher, coach, and administrator during his 34 year tenure. Prior to joining the Foothill Staff, Bill had a very successful athletic career. As a sophomore at North High School, Bill was a varsity starting guard, a position he held for three years. Later, he was first team starting guard for Bakersfield College and was a member of the 1967 Metro Championship team. He also won the B.C. Coaches Award his sophomore year. In 1969, he transferred to San Diego State, where he played for the highly respected Don Coryell for two years. His senior year he earned the starting guard position on a nationally-ranked team.

After graduating from San Diego State University, Bill returned to Bakersfield and applied for teaching positions. He was soon hired to teach history at Foothill. In addition to his teaching assignment, Bill joined the football coaching staff and for the next 16 years he served as the line coach for Ned Permenter. He also coached the track team, serving as Ted Oliver's assistant for six years and as head coach for two. After a highly successful career as a teacher and coach, Bill began a second career in administration. In 1993, Bill was appointed Athletic Director and a year later was named Dean of Students. He was promoted the following year to the Assistant Principal position, a job he held for the next fifteen years.

Bill's contributions and loyalty to Foothill cannot be quantified just in years of service. During his years as a history teacher, athletic coach, and administrator, Bill helped to guide and improve the lives of countless students as well as develop trusting and lasting friendships with parents and colleagues alike

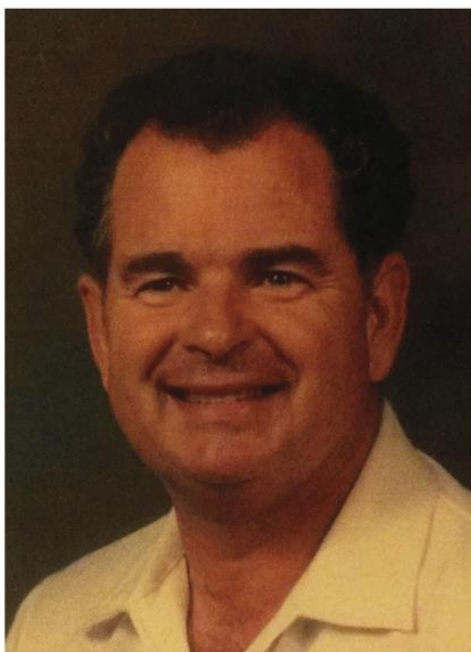


MAX ODOM
CLASS OF 1999

Max wrestled for Foothill from 1996 to 1999, compiling a 173-17 career record with 93 pins and two CIF titles. California is one of the few states in the nation with a single division for the sport of wrestling; with 907 schools participating in the sport, placing at the state tournament as an individual or team is a truly impressive accomplishment. His junior and senior years, Max won the Valley and State Wrestling Championship in the 130 and 145 pound weight classes. As a junior, he defeated a senior and returning state champion from Temecula Valley in the semi-finals to help Foothill earn 93 team points, edging out Temecula with 91, and securing third place as a team. Max was a two-time USAW Freestyle National Champion (cadet and junior), a 1999 National High School Coaches Association (NHSCA) National Champion (One of the few from Bakersfield to do so; Jake Varner, Olympic gold medalist, placed second), National Wrestling Hall of Fame 1999 Dave Schultz High School Excellence Award recipient, and was named the 1999 U.S. Army Reserve National Scholar Athlete. Max was undefeated in his last 80 matches of high school, culminating with a national title.

After graduating from Foothill, Max was awarded a scholarship to Harvard University. His freshman year, he continued to turn in an excellent performance, winning the Ivy League Rookie of the Year Award, the Eastern Intercollegiate Wrestling Association (EIWA) Freshman of the Year Award, and was named to the 2000 All-Ivy League First Team. He placed 3rd at the EIWA championships both his freshman and sophomore years. His freshman year culminated with Max winning the top 16th place at the NCAA Wrestling Nationals. Unfortunately, due to injuries, Max's promising wrestling career came to a close a few matches into his junior year.

Beyond a doubt, on a national level Max is considered one of the all-time greats of high school wrestling. While in high school, he worked diligently to perfect his craft and to execute it with the precision of a highly skilled technician. Continuing his pursuit of wrestling excellence while at Harvard, Max quickly earned the respect and accolades of his own coaches and fellow wrestlers as well as the respect of his opponents. In addition to being an excellent wrestler, he was also an excellent student. During his years at Harvard, he continued to excel on and off the mat, graduating in 2004. Max lives in Chicago where he works in real estate development.



JERRY ROBINSON
1964 - 1998

From a very early age, Jerry knew that he wanted to be a teacher and a coach. While honing his athletic skills on the basketball court at Arvin High School, Jerry also worked hard to prepare himself for college. After graduating in 1957, Jerry enrolled in Bakersfield College where he served as a member of the B.C. cheerleading squad in the fall and played on the basketball team during the winter. In 1959 Jerry transferred to the University of Northern Colorado, Greeley, where he continued his studies and basketball career. In 1961 Jerry graduated with a B.A. degree in Business Education. After teaching in Colorado for two years as well as earning a Master's Degree, Jerry returned to Bakersfield and joined the Foothill High School Staff in 1964. For the next eight years, Jerry taught Business Education and coached a number of athletic teams, including C-Class football, B-Class basketball, and Varsity Basketball for two years. In 1972, Jerry was appointed Athletic/Activities Director, a position he held for 23 years.

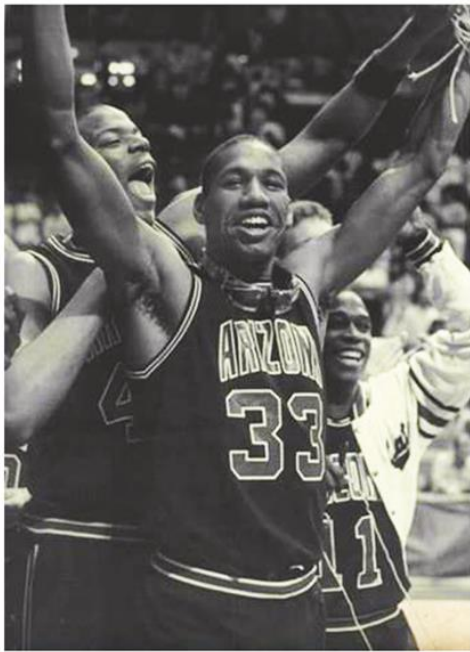
During his long tenure at Foothill, Jerry was a major contributor to Foothill's athletic and activities programs. He was instrumental in the planning and construction of the Foothill High weight room; he helped secure funds necessary to purchase weight room equipment, and he worked tirelessly through Foothill's Bingo Program to raise thousands of dollars each year to supplement the athletic and fine arts programs. Jerry was also a mentor and counselor to coaches and students alike; his advice was eagerly sought and wisely given. His support of faculty, coaches, students, and parents was always first in his heart. He was a true Trojan!



RASHAAN SHEHEE
CLASS OF 1993

When Rashaan attended La Sierra High School, he rushed for over 900 yards, scored 19 TDs, and was named co-MVP his junior year. As a senior transfer, Rashaan suited up in Trojan black and gold in 1993, and quickly established himself as one of the premier running backs in the county. Continuing to add to his high school resume, his senior year he rushed for a staggering 1600 yards and chalked up 30 TDs. Due to his success on the football field, Rashaan was named All-City Back of the Year and was invited to play in the California North-South Shrine Game, culminating in being named Honorable Mention All-American. Rashaan added to his athletic credentials with stellar performances in both basketball and track—all of which earned him the prestigious Tyack Award for the Top Athlete in Kern County Sports. Rashaan completed his high school career by winning the Kern County Bench Press Championship in the 195lb division with a 330 lift.

Rashaan gained the attention of numerous Division I football programs across the country, and after much consideration, he decided to attend the University of Washington, where quickly became one of the leading running backs in the PAC-10. For his efforts, he was twice named All Pac-10 Player of the Week and honored by being named captain of the 1997 team. Rashaan later broke the Aloha Bowl rushing record in leading Washington to a victory over Nick Saban's Michigan State team in Hawaii. After an outstanding collegiate football career, it came as no surprise that the Kansas City Chiefs selected Rashaan in the 3rd round of the NFL draft, where he played for the next three years. He completed his professional football career with the XFL. Since retiring from pro football, Rashaan has taught and coached at Bakersfield High School.

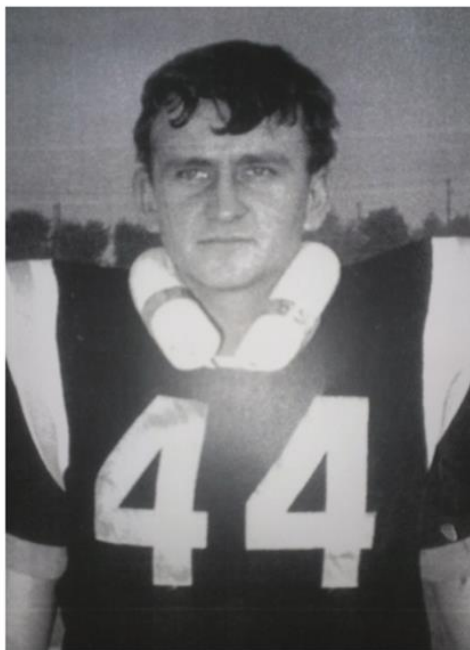


JOE TURNER
CLASS OF 1984

It is well known that Foothill has produced some of the best basketball players in the city, if not the state. Among the best to be recognized is Joe Turner and for good reason. While Joe started his freshman year on the varsity team, seeing limited playing time in pre-season tournaments, he spent league playing with the JV's. But for the next three years, Joe blossomed on varsity, becoming one of the team and league's leading performers. His senior year, Foothill went 23-1, winning the SYL and Valley Championships, and earning the right to play in the Division I State Final 4. For his effort, Joe was named San Joaquin CIF Player of the Year and was given the national recognition of being named McDonald's All-American Honorable Mention. He was also a four-year member of the track team, participating in the triple jump, long jump, and high jump. His senior year he qualified for Valley in the high jump.

When Joe played for Lute Olson at University of Arizona, the nationally ranked Wildcats amassed an amazing four year record: they played in the NCAA Tournament an unprecedented four years in a row, won two PAC-10 Championship ('86 and '88), and made it to the Final 4, during Joe's senior year, before losing a close game to Oklahoma (who then lost to Kansas in the Finals). To this day, Joe is recognized as one of Arizona's all-time greats, right next to Steve Kerr, Sean Elliott, Kenny Lofton, Craig McMillian, and Tom Tolbert.

After graduating, Joe joined Lute Olson's staff as a graduate assistant in 1989. He then spent the next eight years playing professional basketball in New Zealand, Australia, and Europe, before returning home to Bakersfield. Joe is currently a Community Counselor and head varsity basketball coach at his alma mater, Foothill High School.



JIM WOOSTER
CLASS OF 1970

Carrying on the Foothill tradition of playing hard-nosed football, Jim Wooster was one of the most productive power running backs in the school's history. His senior year, in a pre-season game, he led the Trojans to a victory over Anaheim High School, the number 1 team in the state. That same year, 1969, Foothill went on to win the SYL Championship and the opportunity to face Edison High School (Fresno) in the Valley Championship game. Adding to his list of accomplishments, Jim was named to the All-City Team, honored as the All-City Back of the Year, and named to the All-Valley Team. In addition to playing varsity football for two years, Jim played on the basketball and baseball teams, as well as participated in track.

As a member of the Bakersfield College Renegades, Jim was moved to defensive end, where it quickly felt like home. After sustaining an injury his second year, Jim decided to red-shirt a year and return the following year where he continued to excel as a defensive lineman. Along with football, Jim also played rugby, a game he would continue to play the rest of his life. In 1973, Jim transferred to Humboldt State where he earned the starting fullback spot. After a year of football, he decided to focus solely on rugby his senior year. After graduating from Humboldt, Jim transferred to Cal State Bakersfield, where he earned his teaching credential and help start the Kern County Rugby Club. Among his contributions to the community, Jim coached several sports at various schools including East, Garces, Wasco, and Foothill. In 1982, Jim started the Coaches' Choice Track Meet for severely handicapped students, inviting football players from local high schools to assist in this hugely successful event. Because of his love of sports and his competitive spirit, Jim continues to play competitive rugby.



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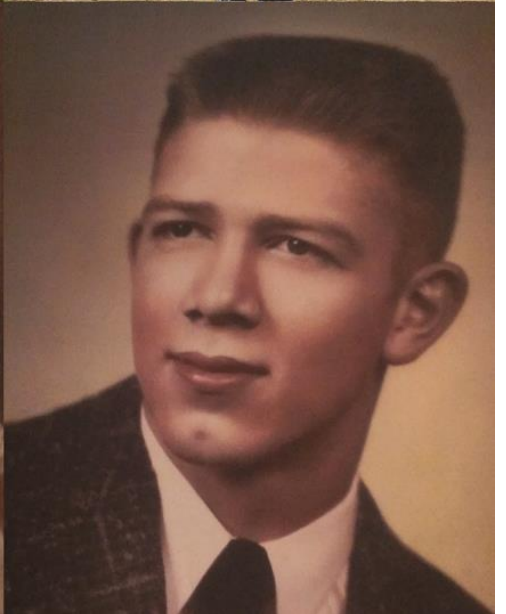
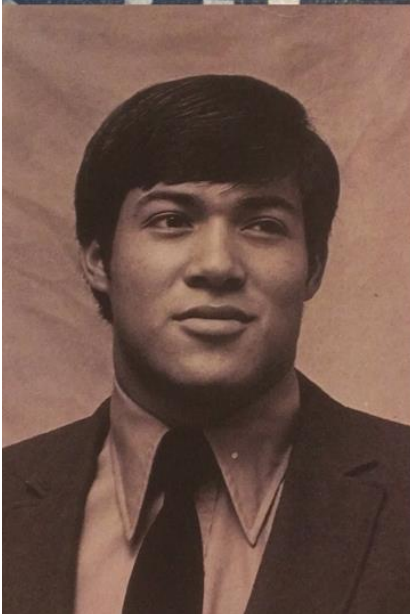
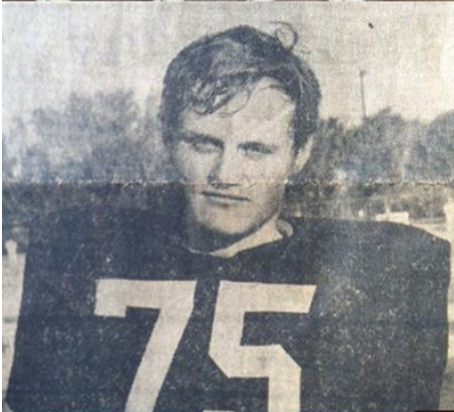
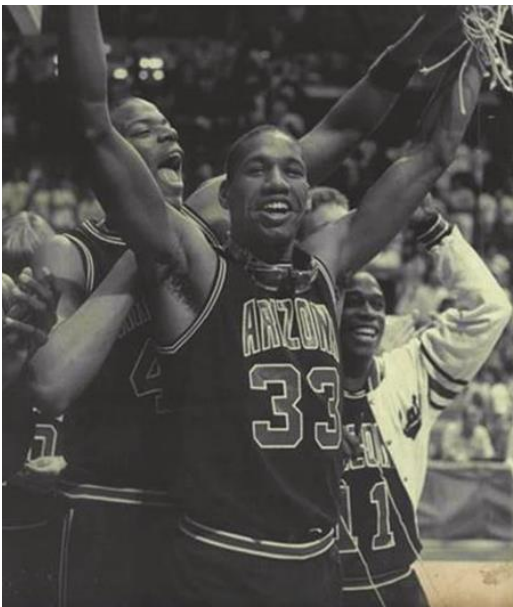
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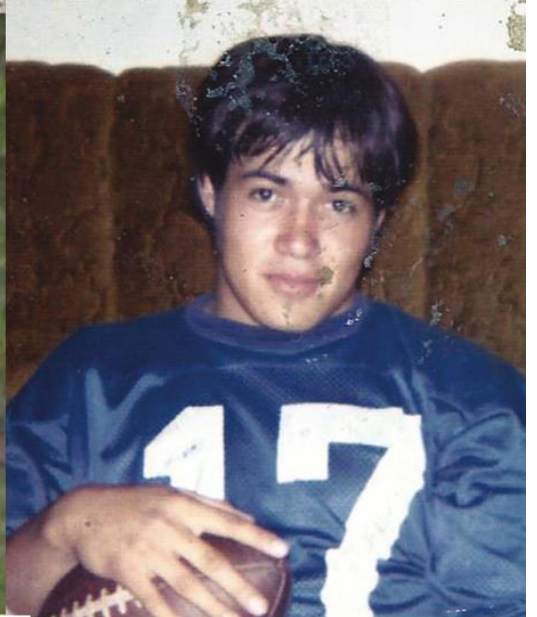
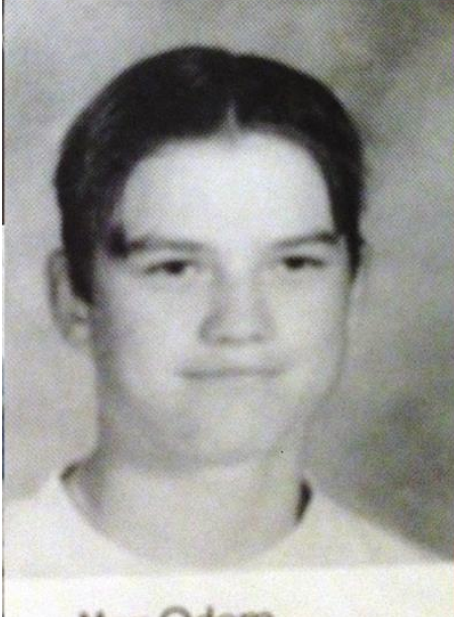
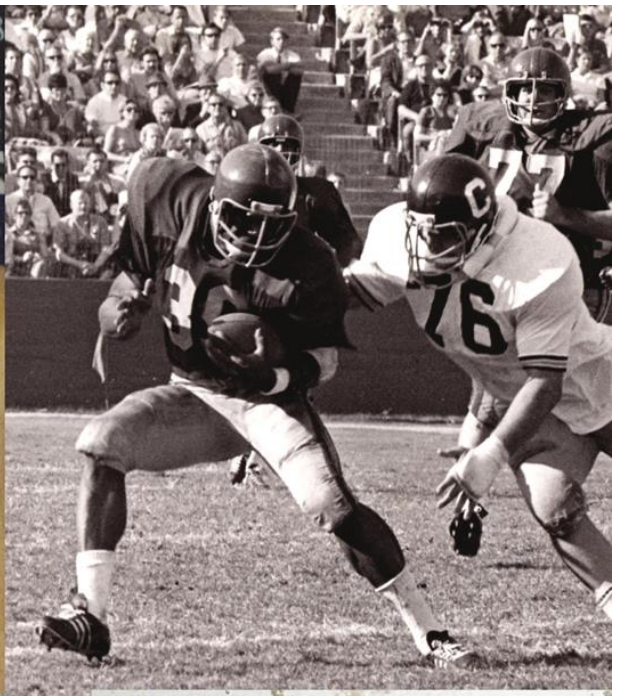
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
