Lashay Alexander Class of 2012

Less than one per cent of all of high school graduates can say they were a four-year, three-sport athlete; and at the same time maintain a straight A average in an honors level program. To be a member of this elite group of athletes/academicians requires discipline, dedication, and commitment; and clearly, Lashay possessed all of these and more. Her coaches describe Lashay as one of those rare athletes who always gave 110% and was committed to helping the team more than she was herself. In track, for example, most athletes specialize in either the sprints and jumps or weight events or long distance events. But Lashay trained and competed in events that would earn team points. Her marks are not record-setting but the scale of her athletic endeavors are rare: 100m 13:44 (2nd Dual Meet); 200m 30:44 (2nd Dual Meet); Shot Put 35' (1st Dual Meet); Discus 98'8" (1st SEYL/SYL Meet); Long Jump 14'6" (2nd Dual Meet); and Relays-weight man- 4x100, Medley. Additionally, as a three-year starter on the varsity volleyball team.



she chalked up an impressive list of accolades her senior year: 1st Team All-League, MVP, Team Captain, and 95 Kills/46 Blocks. Perhaps basketball was her most accomplished sport: 1st Team All-Area (senior); All-Area Honorable Mention (jr/senior); 3x's 1st All-League (JV, Varsity); 4x's MVP, Captain (All 4 Years); school record for combined scoring and rebounding; as a senior CIF Stats 22nd in CA w/15.3 rebounds/game; and 33rd in CA w/21.9 points/game. Highlights of her athletic accomplishments include winning the 2011 Garces Christmas Classic Tournament; Coach Preston's inspirational talk after a tough loss to BHS which resulted in not losing another game the rest of the season; receiving the Outstanding Female Athlete of the Year Award her senior year; and graduating high school with a 4.45 GPA. After high school, Lashay attended University of California Santa Cruz, playing basketball all four years. After university, she taught special education for two years and is currently a FFA Social Worker and is pursuing a Masters in Social Work at CSUB.

Pamela Swearingen-Gates Class of 1966

Her senior year, Pam Swearingen-Gates was Helen of Troy, Foothill's Queen at the Football Carnival held at Bakersfield College Memorial Stadium, and president and concert master of the Foothill High School Orchestra under the fabulous Mr. Miller. She went on to a career as a professional studio violinist, performing in over 500 television and motion picture scores, including the Margot Robbie movie Bablyon, Star Trek, Spider Man, 12 years for the Simpsons TV show and many others. She was on camera and performed in the final episode of Happy Days. She played on records with Michael Jackson, Justin Timberlake, Prince, James Brown, Smokey Robinson, Earth Wind and Fire, Barbara Streisand, Trisha Yearwood, Michael Buble, and Frank Sinatra, among others.


She continues to play on tour with Andrea Bocelli. One of the stand out events of her career was performing in the opening and closing ceremonies of the 1984 Olympics,



along with playing 12 years in the Academy Awards orchestra; add to the list the Emmys, Grammys, Tonight Show, American Idol, and The Voice; as well as 30 years with the Hollywood Bowl Orchestra and the Pasadena Symphony. Pam continues to serve on the Board of Directors for the American Federation of Musicians Union, working for the past 20 years to insure that LA musicians receive good wages and working conditions. And for the past 10 years, Pam has been a member of LA's Harmony Project, teaching underserved inner city children.

Gary Woolfolk Class of 1982

In a recent survey of more than three-hundred collegiate basketball coaches, seventyseven per cent chose "shooting the ball" as the number one skill they look for when recruiting a player- "shooting off the catch, at midrange, off the dribble, and free throws." By all indicators Gary possessed all those skills; so it should come as no surprise that his coaches and teammates remember him first as an excellent shooter; in fact, his statistics show him to be one of the all-time best shooters in the history of Foothill High School. From his first days on the court as a freshman, he was determined to make the varsity squad—a feat he not only accomplished but also enhanced by earning the Most Valuable Player Award that year. For the next four years, he would continue to add to his basketball resume a long list of impressive accomplishments: four year varsity starter; named MPV 3/4 seasons; twice named 1st Team All-League and All-City (junior/ senior); 2x's Valley scoring champion with 24 point/11 rebounds (junior) and 25 points/10



rebounds (senior); selected Jockey Club Athlete of the Month (senior); twice named KBAK Player of the Week (both junior and senior); selected All-Kern County Association team (junior); and was on three Foothill High teams that reached the Valley Playoffs. Additionally, Gary was SYL All-Time Leading scorer from 1982-1992; All-Time Leading Scorer at Foothill until the 3 point line (1985); he was #1 All Time Career Points with 2,000+; #1 Highest Average per game (1980-81/25.5 pts); #2 Highest points in single game (1980-81/ 39pts); #2 All Time Field Goal percentage (1980-81/63%); #2 and #3 Most Points in a season (1980-81/574pts) & (1981-82/560pts); and named to the Silver Anniversary All-Time Team. After graduating from Foothill High School in 1982, Gary continued his education at Bakersfield College, where he played two seasons for the Renegades, averaging 15 points and 11 rebounds both years. His coaches and teammates all agree that he had a deadly accurate mid-range shot; when he had his back to the basket and within 15 feet, he rarely, if ever, missed a shot; and, he was a gentleman on and off the court. After college Gary joined Spectrum Communications, where he has worked for the past 36 years. Gary and his wife Ashlyn, along with their three daughters, Ashlyn, Jaslyn, and Sanai live in Bakersfield.

Connie St. John-Preston Class of 1975

Before 1972, California high schools did not offer the panoply of competitive sports for girls that exist today, but during Connie's four years of high school, the landscape for girls sports began to change. When Connie tried out for and made the boys junior varsity basketball team, not only did she demonstrate a tremendous desire to play competitive basketball, but also that she had a wide range of athletic skills that put her in a "league of her own." With that level of desire as her cornerstone, she went on to build an impressive high school athletic resume. As a sophomore she joined the swim team; as a junior she competed against 30 boys to earn a spot on a 13-player basketball squad; and she finished the year with an impressive set of track numbers: competing in the high jump (Fosbury Flop 5'10"), long jump (16'8"), the 440 yard dash (60.1 seconds), and the 880 yard run (1:27). Her senior year she excelled at volleyball, (also selected captain by her teammates); she was the statistician for Coach Caffee's varsity basketball team; and she ran track. For her extraordinary athletic performance, she was presented with the



prestigious Pepsi-Cola Athlete of the Year Award (the first female athlete to be given this award); and after previously serving as sophomore class secretary, she was elected Student Body President that year. To this day, Connie is still remembered as one of the best all-around athletes to ever wear the Trojan black and gold.

Her love of sports continued in the years after high school: she played Women's Open-League fast-pitch softball, played on a traveling softball team, kept statistics for Coach Permenter's football team, and she was the first female high school baseball umpire in Bakersfield. During her 37 years as an educator, she worked as a special education teacher at Foothill High School; served as special education department head as well as program specialist at Bakersfield High School; served as department head at Shafter High School; co-developed Special Education Girls Summer Camping Program "The Explorers"; and she served as North High School's Dean of Students. For 32 of these years Connie coached a variety of sports: girls varsity basketball, winning the SYL title in 1987-88; frosh-soph volleyball, basketball and softball,

She holds a BA and MA in Special Education from CSUB and is a founding member of the Foothill High School Alumni Association. She retired from teaching in 2018.

Christy Houston Porter

Class of 1994


During her years at Foothill High School, Christy was a three-year member of Student Council, a four-year member of the basketball team (three years varsity), and a three-year member of the track team. After high school, she attended Bakersfield College before transferring to Southwestern Oklahoma State, graduating with a degree in Special Education. A few years later, when Christy was a young mom living in Bakersfield, she discovered that Bakersfield lacked an educational pre-school program for autistic children. Desiring to fill that void, not just for her own daughter, but for other young children with autism, Christy opened the Jasmine Nyree Day Care Center in 2003, for children with special needs. Within weeks the facility reached its capacity. In her own words, Christy recalls those early days of seeking a program, "After calling almost every childcare center in Bakersfield and being told 'sorry we can't accept your child' I began to put together my plans of opening a quality childcare center for children with disabilities."



Years later, after the Porter's had relocated to Pittsburg, PA, and as Jasmine was now about to turn 22, the age at which federal law ends educational provisions for students with disabilities, Christy once again answered the challenge of creating a program for students with special needs. She first bought an abandoned Catholic Church and then had it completely renovated. Months later, this newly revived 60,000 square foot structure was transformed into a state-of-the arts community center, dedicated to creating educational opportunities for all. Under Christy's leadership, the Dr. Phillip Birdine Center, named after Christy's mother's brother, opened in June of 2021. Because of Christy's vision and determination, the larger Pittsburg community enthusiastically supported this project: the Mayor of Pittsburg, Pittsburg Steelers' Organization, Gateway Health, Urban Redevelopment Authority, Pittsburg City Council members, the artist August Vernon, and many more. In 2013-14, Bakersfield College celebrated its 100-Year Anniversary by acknowledging 100 individuals who made a difference and who had a connection with Bakersfield College: Christy was named as one of these individuals. Christy continues to devote her life to helping others improve the quality of their lives by opening doors for success.

Clint Hunt Class of 1981

By the time Clint graduated from high school in 1981, he had accumulated a treasure trove of athletic accomplishments. During his four years at Foothill, Clint earned seven varsity letters across three sports, and after 42 years his pole vault jump of 14'6" still stands as the school record. Based on performance, it would be difficult to say which of the three sports he liked most. His four years in a football uniform (2 years varsity) proved to be no less impressive than basketball or track; and, by the time he completed his senior year he had established himself as one of the premier go-to wide receivers in the SYL. In the first game his senior year, he scored a TD and was 4 for 4 on PATs. As the season moved along he continued to churn out an impressive football resume. He ended his senior year as the 3rd top receiver in the City, with 23 catches/465 yards and 5 TDs and his 20.2 yards per catch was 2nd best in the SYL. His efforts earned him All City 2nd Team Wide-Receiver recognition, and the Most Outstanding Player award for 1980.



Looking back on his 4 years as a varsity basketball player, perhaps his freshman year was his most memorable: not many high school freshmen can claim the honor of making the varsity basketball team, especially on a team that not only would go on to win the 1978 SYL Championship, but also end the season as the second best team in the Valley. Arguably his four years on the track and field team provided him the greatest opportunity to shine: as a sophomore Clint won a SYL gold medal in the pole vault, with a record of 13'3," as well as helping his team win the SYL Championship that year. As a junior he continued to improve in the pole vault, earning 2nd place and a silver medal in the Valley with a record of 14'6," and earning 1st place and a gold medal at the Junior Olympics. His senior year he placed 2nd (silver medalist) at Valley in the pole vault, 2nd place at State (silver medalist) in pole vault, and 6th place State in decathlon. He completed his senior year as a Baccalaureate Award recipient. Clint continued to collect an impressive list of athletic accomplishments throughout his collegiate career: he was a member of the Bakersfield College Renegade football team that won the Potato Bowl Championship in 1981; he played strong safety and punted for the 1983-84 Azusa Pacific football team and helped the 1983 team win the NAIA Championship; he was a member of the 1982-84 track teams; he won the Silver medal in the Pole Vault in 1982; and was a member of USA Men's Track Team (World Games in Mexico City).

Lanette Covington-Hopkins Class of 1980

Lanette's list of accomplishments in track are legendary. In 1979-80 she was acknowledged as one of the top female sprinters in California; she earned six varsity letters in volleyball and track; and she set several track records, some are still standing today. While earning a varsity letter in track both her freshman and sophomore years, Lanette's best years were still in front of her. Her junior year she set a 200 meter record (26.1), placing 4th in the Valley; she placed 1st at the Valley Championship in the 440 yard dash (62.0); she was a Silver medalist at the State in the 100 yard dash (11.8 seconds); and she placed 1st in the 440 yard dash at the State Championship. Her senior year, she continued in the same trajectory: in 1980 she was Valley Champion in 100 meters (12.4 seconds) and set a school record in qualifying time of 12.2 seconds; she was Valley Champion in 400 meters (58.4 seconds), setting another school record in qualifying (58.2 seconds); she was 2nd in Valley (Silver medalist) as anchor of the 400 meter relay (48.7



seconds), setting a school record in the final; she was 2nd in Valley (Silver medalists) 1600 meter relay (3.59), setting a school record in the final; her 4-event medal winning performance contributed to the girls' track team winning the Valley Track Team Championship; and at the close of the season she was selected the West Coast Award Recipient for 1980 (only 1 male and female selected within the West Coast). No doubt she loved and excelled in track, but she also loved the excitement of playing volleyball. Not many high school freshmen have the skills or talent to play varsity volleyball, but Lanette played varsity both her freshman and sophomore years. In addition to earning a varsity letter both years, Lanette was selected team captain her sophomore year. Then in 1978 she became very ill with valley fever and was sidelined from athletic activities for much of that year. But incredibly, as a statement to her immense athletic talent, after 42 years she still holds the Foothill High School 400 meter record at 52.8 seconds. She continued to set records during her tenure at Bakersfield College: she placed 2nd in the 100 meter at the Metropolitan Conference Championships at 12.3 seconds, and she still holds the 40-year record in the One Mile relay (4:05.87), set at B.C. in 1981. She had the fastest leg time of 57.8 seconds (with Kara Davis Ragland, Cathy Wilson and Karie Pitman).

Craig O'Brien Class of 1981


Looking back at his student days at Foothill High School, Craig would agree that nothing he did then would have prepared him for the unimaginable career that was to follow graduation. His four years on the track team, (three SYL Championship teams), his year running cross-country, his two years wrestling JV and one year varsity, taught him the importance of discipline and proper conditioning, but he soon discovered there was a whole new set of skills necessary to succeed as a stuntman/cameraman. With more than 26,000 sky-diving jumps and 29 years of experience to his credit, he easily stands out as one of the world's most successful professional freefall photographer, cinematographer and stuntman. It is not surprising then that Craig's list of accomplishments is stunning: 3x World Champion Skydiver, 6x National Champion Skydiving, Formation Skydiving World Records (2004 & 2006), 2x World Stunt Taurus Award Winner (honors the movie industry's best and brightest stunt professionals for extraordinary performances in feature





films), Best Specialty Stunt (Iron Man 3), Best High Work (Iron Man 3), Screen Actors Guild Award Nominee (2021), and Outstanding Action Performance by a Stunt Ensemble in a Comedy or Drama Series (The Falcon and the Winter Soldier). Additional full length movies that depended on his stunt and skydiving expertise include: Black Widow (2021), xXx Return of Xander Cage (2017), Point Break (2015), Hand Of God (2015), Godzilla (2014), The Hangover Part III (2013), Iron Man 3 (2013), The Bucket List (2007), Jane Austin Book Club (2007), and Charlie's Angels (2000). Perhaps his most challenging and most rewarding work was the Halo jump he photographed in filming the skydiving portion of Mission Impossible—Fallout (2018). During the course of making this movie, Craig made 85 jumps and Tom Cruise made 112 jumps out of the wide-open aft ramp of a C-17 aircraft. On each separate jump, Tom followed Craig, who had a heavy camera mounted on top of his helmet while facing Tom, all the time in a free fall, and transmitting a live feed to technicians in the aircraft above them. Craig's breath-taking aerial cinematography on this Halo jump sequence of the movie earned him high praise from Tom Cruise as well as fellow skydivers around the world. Other movies and documentaries found in Craig's resume as a stuntman/aerial cameraman include: Those Who Wish Me Dead (2021), David Blaine Ascension (2020), Running Wild With the Bear Grylis (2015 & 2020), Medical Police (2019), Kingsman: Secret Service (2014), Godzilla (2014), and The Amazing Race (2005), Behind the Fallout: The Making of 'M:1-6 (2018) to name several.



















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
