In addition to board members stepping down, the GEHS suffered a great loss with the passing of longtime board member Jim Manak, who will be greatly missed. The board welcomed new board members Jane Rio, Hal Hothan, Tim Loftus, Nancy Sternik and Kirk Burger. The board elected Dan Anderson president, and Hal Hothan treasurer. Maureen Shekleton will continue as vice-president and Mark Pfefferman will continue as secretary.

The beginning of 2023 was a difficult time as the GEHS lost both its Executive Director and Assistant Director. We are very thankful to Kathy Becker, Manager of Stacy's Corners Store, who allowed us to keep the GEHS History Center open while the board conducted a search for a new Executive Director. The GEHS is happy to announce their search for a new Executive Director resulted in the selection of Jeffrey Anderson as the new Executive Director. Jeffrey joins the GEHS after spending 18 years at Cantigny Park in Wheaton in various museum roles at the McCormick House Museum and the First Division Museum. The GEHS is also happy to have Brandon Trupp take over the role of Assistant Director. Brandon joins us after working at Naper Settlement as an educator and he brings with him a wealth of knowledge of collections care earned at other local area museums.

Along with the new faces, we have some changes happening in both Stacy's Tavern and the History Center. We are excited to be adding a buttery at the tavern that should be finished this spring. We also have a new temporary exhibit on display at the History Center, "Glen Ellyn in Stitches." The exhibit consists of nine quilts made and used by Glen Ellyn residents between 1840-2000. New Temporary Exhibit: Glen Ellyn In Stitches

The Glen Ellyn Historical Society would like to invite the public to a new temporary exhibit, "Glen Ellyn In Stitches," located inside the History Center. The exhibit features quilts of different styles from 1840-2000 that have a strong connection to the Glen Ellyn area or its residents.

The idea for a quilt exhibit came about when the GEHS received a donation from the Grace Lutheran Church of a sesquicentennial quilt created in 1984 by members of the Glen Ellyn senior center. This quilt was made in honor of Glen Ellyn's 150th anniversary, and includes hand embroidered renderings of Glen Ellyn's past based on photographs from Lee Hesterman's personal collection. Hesterman was a local historian and member of the GEHS. The June 27, 1984, issue of the Glen Ellyn News included a picture of the quilt being presented to former Village President Michael Formento. The quilt was hung up in the Civic Center Council Chamber for a number of years before it was given to Grace Lutheran Church. I am sure there are many long-time Glen Ellyn residents who have fond memories of the sesquicentennial celebrations. Perhaps some of you even remember seeing it on display in the Civic Center.

The rest of the exhibit features eight other quilts that are a part of the GEHS's collection. There were over 25 quilts to choose from, but the ones that are on display were chosen based on their condition and the information that was provided or found through research. Some of the quilts have important historic ties to founding families of Glen Ellyn, while others belonged to Glen Ellyn residents and have interesting stories about who made them, or how they came into possession of them. This quilt exhibit will be on display now through the end of August.





Pick Up The Phone, History Is Calling By Jeffrey Anderson, Executive Director

The Glen Ellyn Historical Society recently received a call from Kathleen "Kathy" Mary Fell Baird of Colorado, who wanted to donate items related to her father, Edward Fell. After a few lovely conversations, it became clear that not only did her father play a historically significant role in Glen Ellyn's history, but also how much Kathy cherishes her memories of her father.


Edward Fell was born on May 19, 1901, in Lytham Lancs, England, and worked as a linotype operator before moving to Chicago in July 1923, with a letter of recommendation from the Rev. John Sinker (which Kathy donated to the GEHS). Edward worked at R.H. Donnelly Company for a short time before deciding to move to Glen Ellyn, where he worked for the Glen Ellyn News for the next 41 years before retiring as their superintendent in 1966. Edward was very active in the Glen Ellyn community as a member of the Masons. He was politically active, winning election as Glen Ellyn Constable before being appointed Glen Ellyn Police Magistrate in 1954 and 1957, (certificates Kathy donated to the GEHS). As Magistrate, Edward oversaw small criminal cases, including a case where he fined a young man for speeding, unaware that young man was his future son-in-law.

Edward married Dorothy Anna Bolms of Glen Ellyn on August 24, 1926 (Kathy donated their marriage certificate to the GEHS). Dorothy worked for over 20 years for the Illinois Bell Phone Company, including during WWII and was fondly referred to as Rosie the Riveter. Together they had two daughters, Kathy and Mary Ellen Fell Marocchi of Wheaton, who passed away on June 26, 2018.


When I asked Kathy of her experiences growing up in Glen Ellyn, she said, "Growing up in Glen Ellyn was wonderful!" Kathy recalled that her family lived in a home on Anthony Street, the Arcadia Apartments, and in a home on Smith Street. Kathy graduated from Glenbard High School, (now Glenbard West), before working with her mother at the Illinois Bell Phone Company until 1957, when she moved to Westminster, Colorado, where she currently resides.

When her parents retired in 1966, they decided to move to Colorado, as well. Edward Fell passed away on July 23, 1981, and Dorothy Fell passed away on September 12, 2000. During my conversations with Kathy about her father, one of her stories struck a chord with me. When her dad would take her fishing, he would tell her that she couldn't talk otherwise it would scare away the fish. As she grew older, she realized it was just a myth and just a way for her father to keep her quiet.

The Glen Ellyn Historical Society is honored to be entrusted by Kathy with these documents that we will preserve for generations to come.

Saving Lake Ellyn: The 14-Year Odyssey to Save Lake Ellyn






