RESIDENTIAL REAL ESTATE UPDATE

Houston Real Estate Market Crashes!!! Not so fast guys; the current Houston area average days-on-market for houses for sale is 55 days. In January 2015, it was 52 days. This is NOT a crash of the market by any measure. The most recent statistics for months of inventory for Harris County is 3.2 months. This means that it would take 3.2 months for all the houses currently on the market in Harris county to sell, indicating it is still a "seller's market", which Houstonians should welcome because it indicates a strong economy.

As for our local Spring Branch Civic Association neighborhoods, we are experiencing a respective softening. In January and February of 2015, we had 5 properties sold compared to this year's 4 sold in the same months. Today we have an average of 71 days-on-market, whereas last year we were at 61. Again, an extra 10 days is not a huge drop, but a mere softening of our local market. The area, where my calculations are showing a significant reduction, is in our price per square footage. Last year this time, we had an average selling price of \$201 per sq.ft. and this year, it has dropped to \$171 per sq.ft. Keep in mind that these calculations are based on a small number of homes sold in January and February, and factor in the remodels due to the May 2015 flood versus some homes sold at lot value. This does not mean that all local active listings are calculated at \$171 per sq.ft. A detailed discussion with your realtor will determine the right price for your home.

Our immediate area has some room to grow and as a community we should embrace this growth. If you are considering selling your home within the next one to two years, now would be a great time to list and if you have considered an investment property, then over the next year should be a great time to invest.

In summary, single-family home sales dropped from 6,507 a year ago to 5,879 today. This 9.6% slowdown allowed for inventory to grow just enough to give a little breathing room to home buyers. We all witnessed the oh-so-stressful multiple offer situations that existed in so many home sales over the last couple of years. I listed a house in the third week of February of this year that had multiple offers within 48hours of hitting the market, so we still see it but as it stands today, the market is in a much healthier place.

Cosmetic Restorative Dentistry

Cosmetic restorative dentistry does not have to be expensive. Veneers and crowns are not always necessary in achieving a nice smile. There are other types of materials available for this type of treatment. Restorative treatment refers to restoring a tooth back to a healthy state. If a tooth is decayed, there are two common types of fillings that can be used. One is a silver or amalgam filling which is metal, and the other is a durable space age plastic which is tooth colored (also known as a composite or bonded filling). I use metal fillings on posterior or back teeth when necessary, but most often a tooth-colored filling is used. Tooth colored fillings are a less expensive way to achieve a cosmetic enhancement since it matches the shade of your teeth. This type of restoration can be done to close the gaps between teeth (as seen below), to reshape teeth and repair teeth undermined with decay. This material, when properly done and well polished, looks like a natural tooth.
