# The Royal Automobile Club

# Awards Background

The Royal Automobile Club was founded in 1897 and its distinguished history parallels that of motoring itself. In 1907, the Club was awarded its Royal title by King Edward VII, sealing its status as Britain's oldest and most influential motoring organisation.

The Club's early years were focused on promoting the motor car and its place in society, which developed into motoring events such as the 1000 Mile Trial, first held in 1900. In 1905 the Club held the first Tourist Trophy, which remains the oldest motorsport trophy still being competed for today. It promoted the first British Grand Prix at Brooklands in 1926 and the first modern Formula 1 Grand Prix at Silverstone in 1950, while continuing to campaign for the rights of the motorist, including the introduction of the first driving licences.

Today, the Club develops and supports automobilism through representation on the Fédération Internationale de l'Automobile (FIA) and the RAC Foundation while promoting its own motoring events including the Summer Veteran Car Run, the RM Sotheby's London to Brighton Veteran Car Run, and London Motor Week. Its membership includes racing drivers, industry leaders, car designers and countless enthusiasts of every different type of car and motorcycle.

The Club also awards a series of internationally recognised trophies and medals celebrating motoring achievements in racing, engineering, personal endeavour and motoring publishing. Some of these include the Segrave Trophy, the Torrens Trophy, the Simms Medal, the Dewar Trophy, the Motoring Book of the Year Awards, The Diamond Jubilee Trophy, the Hawthorn Trophy and the Tourist Trophy.

The Royal Automobile Club has been at the heart of the motoring and motorsport world for 126 years and the Awards continue its rich pedigree in celebrating motoring accomplishments. Underpinned by the Club's authority and integrity, they reward achievement and innovation by highlighting and celebrating the wide range of companies, clubs, events, associations and individuals responsible for influencing and driving the British historic motoring movement. The Historic Awards add to the Club's current extensive motoring activities as described in the history of the Club opposite, but also complement some of its motorsport involvements in events and races such as the coveted Historic Tourist Trophy, Woodcote Trophy and the Royal Automobile Club TT Celebration, the jewel in the crown of the Goodwood Revival.

Angus MacKenzie's quick and direct writing style is perfect for describing the life and times of Mercedes' infamous 'flying' sports racer whose wayward aerodynamics launched Mark Webber twice into the air and came close to killing him. MacKenzie fascinatingly links the CLR near-disaster to the much more serious Le Mans accident of 1955.

Richard Porter Against Type. *The Road Rat* 



In this beautifully written piece Richard Porter contends that "people have been getting the Jaguar XJ-S wrong all these years" and proceeds to argue cogently that, despite a lifetime of being denigrated and passed over, the car was one of the most far-sighted and adventurous to wear the Jaguar badge.


## Personal Endeavour

The combined age of each crew could be no more than 70 years and entry was free, plus crews were offered a tank of Coryton's biofuel.

#### **REVS Restore**



Rather than shying away from mental-health challenges, this encourages people to come together via a shared passion: classic cars. Without judgement, whatever your age, gender or background, whether you have lots of experience or none, together the group restored a Series III Land Rover, a process which also proved restorative for many participants.

VHRA members the world over spend months, even years, building their Hot Rods with meticulous detail and craftsmanship, all for a few minutes of high speed thrills and a chance to enter the esteemed 100mph club.

This award recognises the stunning range of classic and historic car events that take place around the UK throughout the year. Potential nominees must have no element of timed competition. Eligible events include concours d'elegance, tours, classic vehicle shows and club gatherings. The judges look for events – big or small – that have displayed a true sense of spectacle. Eligible events must have taken place within the UK, or have had a significant part of the event take place within the UK.

Collaboration is becoming increasingly important in the historic vehicle world, and this event united two arch rivals, MG and Triumph, as they came together at Silverstone to celebrate their centenary. That in itself is worthy of applause, but the two-day event the clubs put on at the home of British motorsport was also fantastic.

Historic vehicle collections come in many forms, from those amassed by private individuals to those curated by museums large and small or by internationally-renowned margues. The award is presented to a British-based collection which makes a significant contribution to the historic motoring movement in the UK or internationally. Examples include public-facing activities held in a museum or through sharing the vehicles from the collection at public events, or creative virtual events/seminars etc. that have allowed a wider audience to participate online.

#### British Motor Museum





The British Motor Museum celebrated its 30th anniversary with an exciting and thought-provoking exhibition, Transitions: The Impact of Innovation, which covered the changing face of car design and motoring. There were special displays and talks around the work the museum has done, a host of single-marque events and an Auto Art gallery.

#### The Dunsfold Collection



The largest collection of Land Rovers in the world became a permanent museum in 2023, in the year that the Land Rover celebrated its 75th anniversary. The Dunsfold Collection has expanded to include not only prototype and pre-production vehicles but examples of almost every model made by Land Rover from 1947 to the present day.

### **Haynes Motor Museum**



After nearly 50 years the Haynes Museum continues to grow and has now received Arts Council accreditation. It houses almost 400 vehicles, a large number of which can be started and driven at special visitor events. The museum's determination to reach the next generation of car enthusiasts has resulted in over 2500 visits annually by school and college students.

The Restoration award is presented to the restoration that results from impressive technical expertise, significant research and sensitivity to the vehicle and its history. The judges look for evidence of a dedication and determination to learn as much as possible about the subject's provenance, and for an immaculately-documented research and restoration process, combined with world-class skills.

#### 1926 Amilcar CO

(Walter Heale, Historic Motor Car Workshops for Micah Lazarus)



This diminutive Amilcar can be termed a genuine 'barnfind' though, more accurately. it was discovered in a lock-up in Hastings in terrible shape. Painstaking research revealed that it was one of circa 12 Works CO chassis. with a Le Mans racing history. The Amilcar's original coachwork was recreated and the car restored to exacting period specification.

### 1937 Bugatti Type 57S by Corsica

(Clark & Carter Restorations and Ivan Dutton Ltd. for Lord Bamford)



This Bugatti has a strong early racing history and had been out of the public eye for decades; it's said to have been the world's last remaining 'lost' pre-war 57S, with a possible link to the legendary 'Tank' Le Mans cars. Its new owner, Lord Bamford. commissioned a full restoration of the car to the highest standard.

### 1972 Lancia Fulvia 1600 Zagato Sport

(Harry Metcalfe, Day & Whites and Prestige Refinishing)



As a schoolboy, Harry Metcalfe once came home to discover a Fulvia Zagato parked outside the family home. Decades later, searching for a Fulvia, he discovered the very same car. It had been restored previously, but it became clear that it needed complete restoration due to the poor quality of the previous work. Harry documented the process on his YouTube channel, Harry's Garage.

## Doug Hill



Shortly after the National Motor Museum was opened at Beaulieu in 1972, a quiet young fellow started work at the gleaming new complex in the New Forest. Some 50 years later, he is still there and is now in overall charge of a collection of motor vehicles acknowledged as one of the world's best

Doug Hill grew up in Orpington, Kent and was training as a Fleet Street photographer when his father spotted the vacancy for a trainee apprentice at Beaulieu. He joined the Museum aged 16 with a passion for vintage Morgans and an eagerness to learn more about its treasures from Louis Giron, the legendary ex-Bugatti team engineer.

Many of the historic cars had been donated to the newly-established Museum Trust by Lord Edward Montagu, son of pioneer motorist John Montagu. In its previous guise as the Montagu Motor Museum at Beaulieu, the collection had been a private endeavour added to randomly.

In the 1970s, though, Doug Hill was part of a professional team of curators and experts in charge of displaying, maintaining and conserving a world-class collection. And through his sympathetic experience of everything from a humble Austin Seven to humdinging land speed record cars, he gathered a unique expertise.

The job became more than just workshop mastery; to promote the Museum, Doug frequently accompanied Edward Montagu on rallies and events all over the world, in vintage icons from a Rolls-Royce Silver Ghost to a Bentley 4.5-litre Blower. No matter how much preparation was involved, these trips often did not go as planned, and called for a level of mechanical problem-solving few could match. This has, of course, included countless forays on the London to Brighton Veteran Car Run in some of the Museum's oldest and least dependable machines.

As a consequence, his knowledge of technical innovations in the context of motoring history is unparalleled, and his title of Museum Manager & Chief Engineer at Beaulieu relays a uniquely knowledgeable status. There is no better human guide to the vehicles themselves. Doug is constantly leading delegations around the collection, being interviewed by media, and hosting a series of compelling 'Under The Bonnet' live evenings and filmed YouTube videos. Even the least technically-minded will know how to crank-start a Ford Model T after his good-natured explanation.

His skill in passing on knowledge to new generations has become a true asset to the historic car movement. This is also evident in keeping vital skills alive and building a team of what he proudly calls "mavericks", including talented senior engineer lan 'Stan' Stanfield, to maintain and overhaul almost 300 hugely diverse cars.

Working with the Trustees, Doug has been central to several key acquisitions. One of the most significant was the 1903 Napier, Britain's first purpose-built racing car and first wearer of British Racing Green paintwork, which returned to this country in 2013.

In recent years, Doug has been closely involved in projects to put the fire back into unique competition cars that have, for years, been simply static exhibits. These have included both Sir Malcolm Campbell's Sunbeam 350hp 'Bluebird' land speed record car – he and 'Mr Sunbeam' Stan installed and modified a contemporary Bentley gearbox to make it function – and the incredible BRM V16 Formula 1 racer. They will soon be joined by the anticipated roar from the Sunbeam V12 1000HP record car whose rejuvenation has been masterminded by Doug and his team, including making exhaust pipes and wheel spats from scratch. In all cases Doug has planned the painstaking work involved and undertaken the early test-driving... no matter how daunting.



Doug Hill's name is synonymous with the National Motor Museum and is recognised internationally within the historic motoring movement. He is unwaveringly supportive of vehicle owners and fellow enthusiasts. "True 'legacy' and succession is a passion of mine," he has said, "as I believe we have to look to the future and pass knowledge on."

In 2015 the Guild of Motoring Writers recognised this in him with its prestigious President's Trophy right here in this room. Earlier this year, Beaulieu itself marked his 50 years of service with its own accolade. Tonight we are delighted to make this a hat-trick.
