Teri Christopher will set up a meeting with the Planning Board regarding DR Horton development (Victoria Oaks), since no response was received to Jon Freeburg's April letter to Mike Holmes. Discussion points with the Planning Board should be:

- 1. When and how was retention pond approved.
- 2. Long Leaf property values.
- Nuisance of emergency vehicles driving through Long Leaf neighborhood.
- 4. Developer taking advantage of Long Leaf regarding emergency access through pump house.
- 5. Other vehicles driving through our neighborhood.
- 6. Incline of pump house.

Suzy Smith will put together a collection of acceptable color options to help residents when it is time to paint. There will be a wide variety of colors to choose from .

Marilyn Olmstead contacted Duke Energy regarding a street light outage on Torchwood Dr.

There was a discussion of covenant violations regarding a trailer parked in a driveway, a painted metal roof on a shed, chain link fencing, and plain metal mailboxes.

In April the Association sent two letters to the City of DeLand expressing our concerns regarding DR Horton's proposed Victoria Oaks development that will abut our subdivision. In May we received a constructive response stating our concerns had been noted, and that copies of our letters had been distributed to both the City Planning Board and City Commission. On August 28th three Long Leaf Plantation Board members met with DeLand's Community Development Director, Director of Planning, and a Senior Planner. The meeting was cordial, informative, and set the stage for our concerns to be included in the planning process when an actual plan is submitted by the developer.

The best news was that a third entrance from Victoria Oaks onto Taylor Road close to Long Leaf is expected to remove the need for an emergency access road through the city's pumphouse property on Torchwood. Nothing is final, however, until an actual plan is

submitted and approved. Your Association will remain vigilant and make sure our concerns are addressed at the appropriate time.

Covenant enforcement is always a topic in the Chairman's letter, and I would like to remind homeowners that Architectural Control Board approval is always required when you paint your house, trim, garage door, shed, etc. Even if you are repainting with the same color. This is because the current color on the house many not have received approval when it was initially painted. So please make sure you obtain proper Architectural Control Board approval when you paint.

I am really looking forward to Oktoberfest this year, it's our annual block party, and a whole lot of fun. I'll be there early and hope to see you there,

Joyce asked the Beacon to feature her friend, who has been sewing teddy bears for foster care children for over 20 years. There were colorful photos of some of the bears and the 2 pals. Florence told the Beacon that her friend Joyce also was an amazing woman, who has been playing in a band and plays piano at nursing homes each week. The friends both enjoy being active and helping others. Hats off to Joyce and Florence! They are both great role models.

LONG LEAF PET OWNERS BEWARE!

With the abundance of development surrounding us, as D.R. Horton builds new neighborhoods and encroaches on the habitats of wild animals, these animals may be escaping to our community, and can endanger our beloved pets.

Nikki Bridegroom, our neighbor on Black Ironwood, shared her harrowing story of the near loss of her 10 lb poodle, Lucy. Lucy had gone out at 1:30AM, for a bathroom break, and was attacked by a predatory bird, believed to be an owl. The owl sank its talons into Lucy's sides, all the way into muscle. Thanks to the vet's care, flushing wounds to avoid infection, and many stitches later, the prognosis is that Lucy will be OK. But this was a really close call!

These wild animals have no choice but to evacuate their homes, as D. R. Horton rips out all the trees, and builds homes at our back doors. This was a heartbreaking event for Nikki and her sweet pup, Lucy, and she does not want anyone else to experience this tragedy. We must be aware now of the repercussions of all this development and become extra vigilant when we take our dogs or cats outside.
