James Tuborg is a reminder that every pet has a story, and every story can inspire others. We're proud to have him as a part of our SoHo Pet-izens family!



#### Congratulations to Our Returning MPPs!

We extend our heartfelt congratulations to Terence Kernaghan and Teresa Armstrong on their successful re-election as Members of Provincial Parliament (MPPs), ensuring that the voices of Londoners continue to be represented at Queen's Park.

Terence Kernaghan has been serving as the MPP for London North Centre since 2018. Before entering politics, Terence was an elementary school teacherlibrarian, focusing on critical literacy, digital citizenship, media literacy, and social justice. Prior to her political career, Teresa was actively involved in the community, contributing to organisations such as the Argyle Resource Centre, East London Lioness Club, LUSO Centre, and the East London Optimist Club. In her legislative role, she has been a strong advocate for her constituents, focusing on issues like affordability and pensions. Her dedication to public service and community involvement has made a significant impact on our region.
