You will also be provided with updates in reference to our personnel and responsibility within the department.

2024-2025 marked 60 years of the Riceville Volunteer Fire Department's (RVFD) continued dedication to serving our community with the following core values: Family, Professionalism, Compassion, Community and Dedication. The department strives to deliver exemplary customer service to the 6,000 plus residents who call Riceville home and the numerous visitors to our wonderful community. We continue to be a full-service fire department comprised of 50 with members including the support staff of the Fire Department's Auxiliary and Board of Directors.



Last year, RVFD crews were challenged to more than 400 incidents as a result of Hurricane Helene in addition to remaining resolute on emergency preparedness 6 months after the devastation to our community. We remained focused our fire prevention and education through our Fire Prevention Programs, and we supported our emergency services delivery through our Training and Administrative Divisions.

The Riceville Community continues to progress, which allows us to seek new opportunities and leads us to strengthen our relationships with our new partner agencies. Our dedicated personnel are highly trained professionals who proudly serve this community with conviction and honor, which is why I am so proud of each member of this great organization.


We hope you enjoy the 2024-2025 Riceville Volunteer Fire Department Annual Report as it highlights our accomplishments over the past year.

### Hurricane Helene


#### Riceville Volunteer Fire Department

Hurricane Helene was an epic storm that no matter how well we planned, we were not prepared for the outcome.


Each year we review our emergency response plan for snow, wildfires, and other common occurring events. On September 25, 2024, Riceville Volunteer Fire Department activated an emergency station coverage with three to five inches of rain expected along with high winds. Crews were embedded ready to go. The rain came as predicted and then the Fire Station took a lightening strike and lost the amplifier for communications beyond pagers and handheld radios. Shortly after trees began falling, taking out internet access leaving us without the ability to obtain data on Hurricane Helene.

#### September 27, 2024

Crews were mobilized at 3 am to begin warning residents along the Swannanoa River to evacuate to higher ground. "Engine 11-3 to Command, Go ahead E11-3, we are on Moffit Road with water coming into the cab of the truck, Command to E11-3 abort the mission and return to the Station." Water in the cab was at least 3 feet high. Radio traffic across the county began to pick up and Emergency Management advised they were going to hand deliver the updated flood maps since we had no way to connect with them.

The flood maps were never delivered, Chief II met Illinois Swift Water Team on Tunnel Rd to bring them to Station II for assignment. RVFD crews were evacuating and rescuing families in low lying areas off Willow Creek Rd. Then came the most horrifying command came from ES2 "All units cease operations and seek higher ground immediately due to dangerous conditions".

The next 10 days crews from RVFD worked to locate missing people reported by Emergency Management. Support from across North Carolina came once the access corridors were cleared. First South Stokes Volunteer Fire Department arrived and were welcomed by the RVFD crew. Then more were assigned to help over the next 3 months. Ambulance Strike Teams were assigned, UTV Rescue Teams were assigned, Law Enforcement teams were assigned, the 101st Airborne was assigned, the Department of Interior was assigned, and most importantly Hearts with Hands volunteered feeding our crews daily 3 meals. Helicopters began to land next to the station delivering supplies for both RVFD and private citizens in distress. We began tracking the location of our Board of Directors to make sure they were safe and secure as they too were members of the Riceville Community. After 5 days the 1st Starlink was flown in and delivered to us by an anonymous member of the community. We were devasted but not defeated!



# Department Overview

#### 2024-2025: 60 years & counting

In 1964 the Riceville Men's Club, which consisted of members from the surrounding churches within the Riceville Community, realized a need for fire protection in the small area of eastern Buncombe County. The only way to afford such a service was to ask for volunteers from the community, the Riceville Volunteer Fire Department was born. We have come a long way through the years. A single engine station has developed into a department with 3 engines, I tanker, I wildland truck, 2 ambulances, I QRV, and 3 support vehicles. With our 50 members, we are proud of the women & men who serve protecting property & safeguarding the lives of residents & visitors.

Over the years RVFD has maintained & expanded its commitment to family tradition. Not long ago a young man could not wait until he reached the age to join the Cadet Program & start training to one day join their fathers & mother in the ranks of firefighting. In recent years we have grown to include sons. daughters, husbands, wives, brothers, & sisters. When you look at the big picture, the Riceville Volunteer Fire Department is one big family with all the traditions.

Each year RVFD provides service beyond 911 needs by going out to the areas we serve for smoke detector installation, Halloween Safety, Project Santa and so much more. The Riceville Volunteer Fire Department is 1 of 5 Paramedic agencies that transport via 911. Many of our members hold specialized credentials that include Hazardous Materials, specialize rescue, child passenger safety, wildland fire mitigation, incident command, as well as many other national certifications. We serve a population of more than 6,000 as well visitors to the Blue Ridge Parkway covering 10 square miles. We give and receive mutual aid from Asheville, Swannanoa, Reynolds, Fairview, Garren Creek, and Black Mountain Fire Departments for structure fires, wildland fires, searches, and so much more.

Our doors are always open as we are 100% committed to your safety and well-being.



# **Emergency Medical Services**

Emergency Medical Services (EMS) encompasses nearly 80 percent of the annual incidents that are handled by the Riceville Volunteer Fire Department (RVFD) responded to 911 medical emergencies. Our Paramedics, Advanced EMT'S, and EMT's handled each of these calls with pride, professionalism, and compassion.

To ensure that our community receives excellent emergency medical services and outstanding patient care, our Paramedics, AEMT's, and EMT's actively engaged for 8 hours of quarterly EMS training. These comprehensive trainings were designed to enhance patient survivability through rapid assessment and treatment in the areas of cardiac events, stroke emergencies, trauma assessment, pediatric care, and geriatric emergencies. These dynamic training courses were provided through a partnership with AB Tech and other local community colleges as well as Mission Memorial Hospital and MAHEC.

In order to ensure high quality medical care, the Riceville Volunteer Fire Department RVFD attends monthly EMS Peer Review with the local Medical Director to learn from data presented from countywide EMS calls.

RVFD also has 2 Paramedics performing in-house QA and to ensure our community receives optimal EMS delivery. RVFD utilizes the QA findings to develop additional training opportunities to continue to improve our EMS operations. The QA program is a vital component to ensure our members are delivering EMS to the customers we proudly serve.

RVFD continues to provide emergency medical support for Buncombe County as an Eastend backup when ALS ambulances are in demand. In August of 2024 RVFD added our newest 911 Paramedic transport vehicles to our fleet as the current ambulance was approaching 150,000 plus miles. The newest addition has many new required safety features as well enhanced patient care components.

The Riceville Volunteer Fire Department has continued to shape the future of Emergency Medical Services for our community and Buncombe County when called upon. RVFD actively participates with the area community colleges as well as Western North Carolina University for clinical opportunities for both 2- and 4-year Paramedic program for valuable experience under the watchful eyes of the professional Riceville Volunteer Fire Department Paramedic preceptors.

The Riceville Volunteer Fire Department Training Division revolved around new people, new apparatus, and new techniques as well as our seasoned veteran members. RVFD participates with certified and non-certified offerings from our local community college. Our membership trains together for Monday night drills when there are no scheduled business meetings. RVFD also trains with our mutual aid partners to

gain knowledge from other instructors. While certifications are a small part of the tracking of the efficiency of the organization, it is a critical measuring tool. As members advance with education it also prepares them for leadership roles and certainly additional responsibilities.

#### 2025 ANNUAL MEETING TRAINING REPORT

Riceville VFD has had :

2798 total training hours October I, 2024 through September 20, 2025 5743 total training hours October I, 2023, through September 30, 2024 6938 total training hours from October I, 2022, through September 30, 2023

Riceville VFD currently holds 363 NC State and national accredited certifications. 14 new certifications have been acquired since October 1, 2024.

Out of those certifications, Riceville has the following;

- 8 EMT-Basic
- 18- EMT-Intermediate
- 16 EMT-Paramedic
- 27- NC Certified Firefighters

Riceville currently host multiple Continuing Education hours per year for EMS.

- This has been expanded to 96 opportunity hours annually to help members meet their CE requirements.
- The State of NC OEMS has also been in the process of adjusting requirements for EMS providers. We have been working hard to make sure Riceville is ahead and ready for any and all of the changes to EMS

#### Fire Training projects

Working on scheduling required training topics that gain maximum points for the NC
OSFM/DOI Rating system to assist to maximize training points for our next rating. Below is a
breakdown of training hour per category per member annually to achieve maximum points.
These hours are needed per member;

Facility Training – 18 hrs • Company Training – 192 hrs • Haz Mat Training – 6 hrs • Officer – 12 hrs • Drivers Training – 12 hrs




# 2024-2025 FLSE Report by Captain Chris Redden
