# MARY BEE JENSEN



Founder and director of the International Folk Dancers of Brigham Young University, Mary Bee Jensen began the folk dance program in 1956 when she was requested to enlist some dancers to perform at a local ward. Born and raised in Provo, she graduated from Park College in Missouri, received her M.A. from BYU, and is a member of Phi Kappa Phi. Today, she is a professor in the College of Physical Education's Department of Dance. > She has lived an exciting life realizing her dream to give young people opportunities for folk dancing and travel. Her eyes are always on the brightest stars in the sky and she likes to reach higher and higher to achieve what often seems impossible. > Mary Bee is the United States official delegate to the Confederation International of Organizers of Folklore Festivals (CIOFF). Chosen to accompany the American Arts Educators tour in 1976 to Romania and in 1978 to Poland, she was also an official member of the jury of judges for an international folk festival held in Zakopane, Poland. > Although recognized throughout the world for her work with the International Folk Dancers, closer to home she's best known for directing twenty-six years of "Christmas Around the World." Listed in Outstanding Educators of America, she is the recipient of KSL's Outstanding Teacher Award, BYU's Outstanding Woman Award, the Alumni Distinguished Service Award, and the Karl G. Maeser Distinguished Teaching Award.

#### AMERICAN CLOGGING

Clogging can be traced back to our English, Irish and Scottish forefathers who predominately settled the Appalachian region of the United States. With the additional influence from the large inflow of Blacks settling on the plantations, American clogging has evolved into an extremely energetic and exciting dance form unique to this country. Its foot-stomping and hand-clapping rhythms grasp and hold audiences spellbound.

## A TRIBUTE TO THE MANY CULTURES OF THE WORLD . . .

## LATIN FIESTA

Dancing and music play a vital role in the Christmas festivities of Latin America. Here we bring a combination of dancers and costumes representing different regions in Mexico, Argentina, Jamaica, and Peru together for this Latin Fiesta.

#### ARGENTINA

Malambo: A "gaucho" is a mix of Spanish and Indian blood who is always ready to display his skills of horsemanship and manly conduct. This dance, done to music and the beat of a drum, displays the precision of the dancers' footwork.

#### MEXICO

La Bruja: "Bruja," meaning "witch" in Spanish, has brought about numerous theories in reference to its background. One such theory recalls a woman being labeled as a witch because of the careless death of her son. She spent the rest of her life searching for his soul, which was to dwell in purgatory until she released it. The candles on the women's heads in the dance "La Bruja" are a representation of the light she used at night to search for her son's soul.

Imperio de Puebla: This dance, a combination of Indian and Spanish influence, has impressive march and waltz rhythms. It depicts those influences that were left by Maximilian and his government. The steps in this dance, simplistic in form, do not take away from this striking presentation of color and style.

Huateque: The music and dances of the Jarochos, the people of Veracruz, combines different styles and rhythms. Using intricate footwork, both men and women join together in a celebration of life.

Los Machetes: The land of charros, chinas, and mariachis, the state of Jalisco has become a symbol of Mexican nationality. The charros of Jalisco are known for their high spirits and joyous grasp of life. The dancers close this suite with the popular "Los Machetes."

#### ITALY

Sbandieratori Flags: The movements of the flags and costumes represent the regions of the country or family crests in a colorful display of ancient heraldry. The most skilled men were chosen for their expertise in wielding the sword and the spear.

Sicilian Tarantella: Legend tells that the tarantella with its wild turns was done to relieve the maddening pain of the tarantula's sting. This is just one of the numerous versions that depict this legend through the shaking of the tambourines.

#### GERMANY

Waltz Landler: A flirtatious dance using the arms to form small and large windows for the dancers to exchange glances.

Kruez Koenig: Utilizes the dance movements to form the cross of the king.

## SPAIN

Spanish Flamenco: The fascinating rhythms of the castanets make it an art to perform the "Flamenco." The men dance "zapateado" and "furruca" movements while the women contrast those with "paso doble" movements of their hips and shoulders.

#### ISRAEL

Israeli Suite: A suite of dances reflecting the moods and life of the Israeli people sings a song of joy and dances a dance without end. This medley of Israeli dances is a modern adaptation of ancient steps and rhythms.

## BULGARIA

Kopanica: Originating in the Shope region of western Bulgaria, the dance begins as a line dance and develops into a display of steps executed by the men. As they demonstrate their powers before the women, they are also testing the women's strength, for they are expected to maintain equal stamina throughout the dance.

#### HUNGARY

Kolachai Suite: The quick musical accompaniment puts the dancers "on their toes" to perform this unique and lively medley of dances. The Hungarians often enjoy singing as they dance.

#### CZECHOSLOVAKIA

Vrtak: With a wonderful variety of turning movements found in western Czechoslovakia, where couple dances predominate, the turning dances usually work up to a tremendous speed, particularly in the mountain villages of that country.

#### ROMANIA

Dama-sirba: From the Romanian plain, these dances are performed in circles and lines. Their rhythmical arm balance is binary and their movement lively, with cross steps in place and through space.

Calussari: This dance, nearly 1000 years old, is known to be the most dynamic Romanian dance. A southern Romanian men's dance performed with sticks, stamping, and clicks of unusual virtuosity, it is performed during religious holidays for the fertility of the land and as a protection against crop disease.

#### POLAND

Krakowiak: Though it originated in the southern part of Poland in the "Krakow" region, the "Krakowiak" is now known in every region of Poland and has become its most vibrant and exciting dance.

#### CHINA

Red Ribbon Dance: A favorite of the Chinese people, the origins of the red ribbon dance reach back more than 1000 years to the grottos of Kung Whong where you can still see ancient cave paintings that depict the earliest known ribbon dance.

## PHILIPPINES

Tinikling: From the beautiful land of the Philippines comes the vivacious and lively "Tinikling." This dance depicts attempts by the farmers in the field to catch the "Tinikling bird" by hitting its legs with long poles.

#### KOREA

Pukch'e-chum: This is one of the most appealing formation dances of Korea because of the combination of the colorful costumes and fascinating geometric designs created by the fans.

## RUSSIA

Dance of the Birch Tree: A women's dance with graceful, gliding movements tells a story of waiting for the spring to come. The women reverence the sleeping birch tree with a smooth and uninterrupted continuity of illusion.

#### UKRAINE

Cossak: The hearty athletic enthusiasm of the Cossak nomad fighter is kept alive in this dance where the dance movements represent the warring nature of the Cossak people. The young Cossaks revel in performing this delightful character dance.

Hopak: Reflecting the pulse of the Ukrainian people, vibrant with a love of life, this dance is one of strength, skill, and emotion. Many people call this the national dance of the Ukraine.
