You will also see many others of our favorites (that may also be new to some of you!).

Plan now to join us. And remember that our Alumni Reception will be held after the Saturday evening performance in the Marriott Center.

Folk Dance Ensemble Tours Scandinavia And Russia

Performing both American and international folk dances, the BYU Folk Dance Ensemble traveled to Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Finland, and Russia in May and June 1996. Their repertoire included choreography from Western and Eastern Europe, Asia, and North America.

The group's programs brought standing ovations at nearly every performance given. The first performance was given in Copenhagen, Denmark, in Tivoli Gardens and though rain dampened the stages it did not dampen the enthusiasm of either the performers or their audiences, which included special guests from the Danish government.

Cecilie Karnil, a BYU Folk Dancer from Odense, Denmark, was delighted to return home and perform for her friends and family. "The people really enjoyed the dancing," she said. "They hadn't had much experience with an American group like this before."

On May 17th, in Stavanger, Norway, the ensemble participated in the Independence Day program, helping to celebrate Norway's Constitution Day. The audience was approximately 800 in size, including the mayor of Stavanger. The folk dancers performed for another 50,000 at the Independence Day parade

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and an estimated television viewing audience of 500,000.

After three concerts in Finland, the group traveled to St. Petersburg, Russia, where an audience of 1,130 gave a standing ovation to the Folk Dancers at the St. Petersburg Music Hall.

"One lady was from Ukraine,"
Karnil said. "She came to me with
tears in her eyes and gave me several
hugs because we had done a
Ukrainian number. Others didn't
speak much English so they
expressed their excitement to us
through their gestures. It was all
very touching."

"The performance was a knockout," said Gail Halvorsen, an American living in St. Petersburg. "The Russian and Ukrainian numbers were remarkable."

Folk Music Ensemble Represents The United States

This year the Folk Music Ensemble represented the United States in Iceland and at the CIOFF first world FOLKLORIADA in Brunssum, Netherlands, in July.

Two performances in Iceland, filled to capacity, brought a tremendous response from the energetic crowds, who couldn't seem to get enough of the musical ensemble.

"In both performances about twothirds of the audience were standing up because the places were so packed," said artistic director Mark Geslison, whose ancestors are from Iceland. "They were packed in the staircases looking over and down at us; they were everywhere. I have never seen such crowds."

In Reykjavik, Iceland, the group gave a short performance on the local radio station during the prime listening hour there.

"At the concert that night, one of the audience members mentioned that she had heard us on the radio earlier," said performer Kyley Jex. "It was so great to know that we had been able to perform for and reach so many people in Iceland."

From there the group traveled to Brunssum, Holland, to the CIOFF World Folkloriada Festival, where they had been invited to represent the United States. Here they performed with 62 different countries. A reported 10,000 were in

the audience nightly.

"We had such a good experience there. It was touted as the world's largest festival, " said artistic director, Mark Geslison. "We were able to play and dance to what seemed like every person in the world, all gathered into that one town -- it was spectacular."

New Folk Music Recordings

The one question we receive more than any other is how to obtain folk dance music. Here are some addresses where music is available and some tips on great new recordings.

For those of you who remember these two popular dances from Romania, Cimpoi and Rustemul, the good news is that they can be ordered through any record store. And they are on CD! (This means high quality recordings.) The title is Folksongs From Rumania, Georghe Zamfir & Friends, Ciocirlia Orchestra, Delta Music Inc.

There is also a wonderful new Bulgarian CD recorded under the supervision of Jaap Leegwater and Yves Moreau called AJDE NA HORO. This must be ordered through a folk music store. It has twenty favorites including Bučimiś, Bavno Horo and Jove Male Mome.

For those who love Israeli dances and music, our latest discovery is a set of 19 CDs under the KEFF series. Each has 20 or more dances and the quality is wonderful. These are available at World Tone Music in New York (address below).

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Two more recordings which were part of this latest find include a CD entitled, ISRAEL, Dennis Music Publishers, which has Hava Naquila, Hora Medura, Erev Ba, Ma Navu and 23 others. And -- a cassette entitled, CELEBRATE, Serenade Productions, includes a beautiful rendition of Dodi Li. Both recordings are available at World Tone Music. (They may also be available at other stores.)

Here are three good sources for folk music. Remember, if you don't know a specific arrangement, there is often more than one version of many of the dances you know. Ask the proprietor for his/her suggestions and try to get the best quality recording available. All of these stores have been very helpful to us in the past and will allow you to order over the phone, and then will send you the recordings and the bill you at the same time.
