February 28th found the dancers performing at the Fine Arts Ball held each year in the Harris Fine Arts Center. The floor show followed the theme of the Sesquicentenniel. March 4th once again found the ensemble participating in the BYU devotional presented by the Department of Dance. This has turned into a wonderful experience for the dancers, and the university at large as they view dance in a more spiritual perspective. This year the devotional incorporated Lloyd Newell and The Spoken Word (see page 3 for the entire text) to highlight a special message focusing on dance delivered in a broadcast earlier this year. The final concert of the season for the general public, *International Folk Dance Ensemble IN CONCERT* will be presented in the BYU Dance Studio Theater on April 12th at 4:00 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. Tickets

June 23rd-August 17th will be the dates for this year's European tour and plans are moving right along, promising many exciting experiences. The itinerary includes festivals in Czech Republic, Slovakia, Poland, and France as well as performances in Germany, Ukraine, and Switzerland. This is a longer trip than usual in order to accept a special invitation to the 40th anniversary of the Confolens Festival in France. It will be thrilling for students to dance with the elite dance groups of Brazil, Bulgaria, South Korea. Ecuador, France, Mexico, Moldava, Peru, Turkey, Ukraine, and Yugoslavia at this special 40th celebration.

### The Spoken Word "PRAISE HIS NAME IN THE DANCE"

Given by Lloyd D. Newell September 22, 1996

Sometimes, as we consider the goodness of God, the joy of His creation fills us with immeasurable delight and with the urge to express that joy by rising to our feet and dancing. The scripture tells us that King David "danced before the Lord with all his might<sup>-1</sup>, and the Preacher reminds us that "To every thing there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven: a time to mourn, and a time to dance.\*2

An elderly widow sat with her grandchildren, telling stories of a grandfather they had never known, many years gone — affectionate tales filled with the remembered joys of a good marriage. One of her grandchildren looked up at her and asked with the guileless innocence of youth, "Grandma, what do you miss most about Grandpa?" "Ah," said the old woman, "that's easy. What I miss most were the evenings when we'd pull back the table, put on the radio, and dance."

Of all the simple pleasures of mortality, dancing is perhaps one in which we feel most alive. To move in rhythm to a waltz or a foxtrot, to glide in perfect harmony with a partner, to sweep gracefully across a dance floor is to know the pure joy of living. Who can forget the grace of Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers, the amazing athleticism of Mikhail Baryshnikoff, or the explosive exhilaration of Gene Kelly without marveling at the beauty we humans can sometimes create.

Dance can also be a way of worship, of expressing joyfully our delight in the gifts of God. The Psalmist urged his people to "be joyful in their King. Let them praise him in the dance ... for the Lord taketh pleasure in his people." The ancient Greeks danced while singing odes of praise to their gods, and, even today, many churches build dance facilities adjacent to their chapels. We frequently celebrate the union of two people in marriage with dancing, and those couples often mark their most important anniversaries by hiring a band and a dance hall.

Watch small children listening to music, and see them sway and move in time. They seem to know, more than any of us, just how joyous life can be, and their small bodies can't help but express that joy.

Above all, a dance expresses love – love of movement, love of beauty, love of music, love of life itself. Love shared. And so, in the evenings we push back the kitchen table, turn on the radio, hold our sweetheart in our arms, and dance.

We would like to recommend the video "Riverdance", a video of the stage show that blends traditional and modern Irish dance and song with snippets of Spanish, Russian, African-American, and other cultures. The step dancing, performed by an ensemble of world champion Irish dancers, is amazing. It is available in most video/media stores.

For those of you wanting more resources for teaching children, you might want to try Sanna Longden's video "More Favorite Folk Dances of Kids & Teachers". The video contains 12 dances for kindergartners on up, with dances from France, Hawaii, Israel, Russia, U.S.A., and more. \$32.95 (syllabus included) + \$3 shipping; cassette with 6 of the dances, \$8. If you just enjoy listening to folk music, try "The Girl was Planting", featuring songs by the vocal ensemble of the Ethnic Dance Theatre of Minneapolis. CD \$15 from EDT, 2337 Central Ave NE, Minneapolis, MN 55418; Phone (612) 782-3970.
