# Christmas Around the World 2008



Not only did the group perform in all the major cities of these countries but they had the privilege of performing with several of the top professional and amateur folk dance groups of these countries.

Gabor Mihalyi (Mishi), director of the state ensemble was duly impressed with how well our students acquitted themselves performing Szatmar. So much so, that sometime in the near future he has agreed to come to BYU to choreograph for our ensemble. All of this was made possible through the efforts of our good friend Ervin Varga, director of SLUK, the professional state ensemble of Slovakia and choreographer of BYU's Slovakian suite of dances.





Other groups the folk dancers had an opportunity to perform with included, Lucnica from Slovakia, Promni from Warsaw and Jawor from the Agricultural College in Lublin so many of us have associated with in the past at festivals.

Our ensemble also participated in firesides, workshops and receptions as well as other community celebrations. They spent hours waiting at borders, but also saw many wonderful sites and met numerous remarkable people from all these countries. And—everyone stayed healthy! The Philharmonic, our theater in Minsk, Belarus, was filled to overflowing.

This fall semester the group has all ready had the privilege of working with 91 year old Ada Dziewanowska, Polish expert and choreographer from Milwaukee, Wisconsin and her assistant, Michael Malich (an expert in Serbian dance as well). They have also worked with Jiamin Huang, Tina Shelley, and Johanna Lambert. They have successfully performed in World of Dance, collaborated with Men's Chorus in Homecoming Spectacular and participated in the Dance Division Assembly on October 21<sup>st</sup>. All this within seven weeks of school while also preparing for Christmas Around the World!



# **Spring Performing Arts Company**



Wow! What an amazing experience it was this year! We did the impossible and performed 88 shows in 6 weeks. The dancers were hardworking and positive through the whole experience. It was a wonderful group of students both on stage and off. Our shows in Utah ranged from Santaquin to Snowville. Snowville was a very memorable experience where we performed at the local

school with 25 students plus two other schools (one from two hours away) to make a total of 80 children in the

audience. It was obvious that the children had never seen anything quite like our program before. They were enthralled and so excited. Common comments from children all over were: "I didn't want the show to end", "I want to go to BYU when I grow up and be a dancer", "All the dances were my favorite", and from the principals: "This is the best money that we spend all year."



We were in Nauvoo from June 2-13. We performed every evening on the outdoor stage just east of the Visitors Center. Our audience members came from all over—even from abroad. We had about 700 audience members every evening.

The highlight of our Nauvoo trip surrounded the severe flooding they had just before we left. We were summoned to help sandbag the Nauvoo House which belongs to the Community of Christ church. We helped build a 200 yard levee around the historic site. The students sang as they shoveled sand into sandbags, even as the rain poured down in the middle of the project. We all felt it was such a rewarding experience to be able to help preserve a historic site of common interest and to serve the Community of Christ church and the community of Nauvoo.

Our two weeks in Nauvoo were definitely life changing as we learned about church history from scholars such as Susan Easton Black and felt the special spirit that exists in that beautiful city.



## **Backup PAC in Review**

Our Backup Performance Team was privileged to have Mr. Robert DeWarren come and work with them on Thursday, October 16<sup>th</sup>. He put the finishing touches on a Kurdish choreography Delynne created two years ago.

Mr. DeWarren and his wife, Jacqueline, recently retired from his position as the Artistic Director of the Sarasota Ballet Company. Robert (born in Uruguay) and Jacqueline (born in France), met in Amsterdam while dancing with the Royal London Ballet in the 50's and early 60's. He collaborated with Rudolf Nureyev in his early career, and other world-renowned ballet dancers throughout Europe. Because of some serious foot problems, he quit dancing and accepted an invitation from the Shah of Iran to document the folk dance of the various tribes in Iran. They planned to stay in Iran for 2-3 years, but ended up falling in love with the people and culture and extended their stay to 11 years. It was such a treat to have them "Persianize" our suite of three dances and share their talents and expertise with us.
