

Come to Christmas Around the World December 3 and 4 and ... "CELEBRATE!" Evening performances begin at 7:30pm and the Saturday Matinee, 2pm. Join us as we begin our next 50 years of *Christmas Around the World*. This year we will premiere an exciting new women's classical Indian Bharata Natyam, choreographed by Divya Narayanan, a new Hungarian Szatmar suite of Uveges and Botolo by Jeanette Geslison, and revisit an old clogging number, "Buckin' Appalachia—the Next Generation," revised by Ed Austin, Michael Steele, and Greg Tucker. This American classic will culminate in a frenzy of precision clog figures with almost 100 cloggers from the community directed by Greg and Maria Tucker.

In addition, Living Legends will light up our stage in a special guest performance of music and dance

from Mexico and New Zealand.

There will be a reception in the Cougar Room in the Marriott Center directly after the matinee performance on Saturday, December 4 (at about 3:45pm). We hope you will join us either after the show or before attending the evening show.

PAC in Nauvoo

Since 2004, the Missionary Department has invited BYU performing groups to provide entertainment each summer in Nauvoo to create new bonds and outreach opportunities with communities in the surrounding area. This year the Performing Arts Company spent two glorious weeks performing in Nauvoo and in surrounding

areas August 1-14.

The first week of the visit of the International Folk Dance Ensemble in Nauvoo went very well. The group had very large audiences of close to 800 people each night while performing on the Nauvoo outdoor stage.

The dance and music of the Folk Dancers really struck a chord with audience members who thoroughly enjoyed the performances, so much so that during one performance they actually began dancing through the aisles. The excitement was electrifying.

The early days of Nauvoo would have seen many immigrants from some of the countries that the Folk Dancers represented both in music and dance. Our early-American songs and fiddle



tunes that you can hear in the show may have been heard in the celebrations of Nauvoo as well. For these reasons, this group of musicians and dancers brought a fitting spirit to this historic city.

Unique to this tour in Nauvoo, Mountain Strings (the live bluegrass band for the group) also had the opportunity to add their musical flavor to Nauvoo and the surrounding communities. They performed on their own several times including in the Carthage City Center Park as well as at the Bentensport Pavilion in Fairfield, Iowa. The weekend ended strongly with a nearly sold out audience for a full 90-minute show in the Sondheim Center for the Performing Arts in Fairfield, Iowa. This was a unique and special performance because many of the audience members had either ties to the countries represented in the performance or work with dance groups who specialize in dances from these countries represented. In each case, they were impressed with the

Katie Harmon, one of the folk dancers, visited with a woman who moved to the USA ten years ago from Bulgaria. Katie reports, "The woman was so impressed with the group's accent as we sang 'Sto Mi E Milo I Drago', that she had to check the program to make sure we were not Bulgarian."

Justin Kelly, another folk dancer, told of his conversation with a woman who directs the dance

group, Kudrinka, in Moscow, Russia. She said, "We are very proud of what we do in Moscow,

but if you ever come to Moscow, you would do well performing alongside our group. You would look like you belong there, and could hold your heads up high."

While teaching at BYU she has received such awards as the" Karl G. Maesar Distinguished Teacher of the Year", "Alcuin Fellow in General Education" and the College of Health and Human Performance "Faculty Teaching Excellence Award."

On September 23, 2010, Susanne was able to share with us her "last lecture" entitled *The World is our Campus...It's True.* It was delightful to hear from her one last time.

She is actually still working this semester on the monumental project of gathering historical information for the entire Dance Department. Thank you Susanne for all you have done for the Folk Dance Division.


World Dance Showcase
