Gathering Places

Welcome to BYU's annual *Christmas Around the World* concert, where students honor and celebrate cultures from throughout the world with traditional dance and music.

This concert highlights some of the places in which we gather to celebrate Christmas around the globe, such as churches, town squares, and our own homes. Another special place we think of and honor at this time of year is the stable in Bethlehem where the Christ child was born.

Growing up in Denmark, we would go to our church every December 24 for a special Christmas service where we would sing Christmas hymns and read from the book of Luke. Afterward, we would come home with the family for the Christmas Eve celebrations. It was a very special day, when the warmth of lights on the Christmas tree, on tables, and in windowsills; the specially prepared Christmas foods; and family gatherings filled us with excitement. I know that each one of us has special memories associated with places where we gather with loved ones during this season.

One of the most exciting things about preparing for this concert is welcoming collaborations with guest artists and friends of our program. This year, the students and faculty worked with choreographer Tym Jaddock to set and premiere two new Ukrainian dance pieces: Kupala and Arkan. Michael Malich and Aleksandra Dostanič set our Serbian piece, and Ahmet Lüleci restaged two Turkish dance pieces from Artvin and the Black Sea in Turkey. We also welcomed recent alumni Jillian Iverson as she set a clogging piece, and Efrain Villalobos set a Mexican piece. Our current student Piero Gongora choreographed a new Colombian Cumbia piece. It is inspiring to learn directly from these accomplished dancers, teachers, and choreographers.

I welcome folk dance alumni and longtime friends of our program as guests in this year's concert: the Shelley School of Irish Dance, directed by Tina Shelley, and Harp Irish Dance Company, directed by Aubree Shelley. We honor and celebrate Tina and Aubree's lifelong work and passion as they have built their certified Irish dance programs in the community, sharing their talents and skills while inspiring future generations. I likewise welcome the BYU Scottish Highland Dance Club to the stage, led by graduate student Emmelene Hovey.

It is my hope that each of you will take something away from this concert that will inspire you this Christmas season.

This fast-tempo couple dance derives from the region of Szatmár in northeastern Hungary. It is characterized by a lifted movement quality iconic of this area. The Friss Csárdás is practiced in an improvised manner as a living tradition where couples are seen whirling and men's fast rhythmic slapping is prevalent.

The Grand Mill brings attention to the process of grinding flour for the making of bread! This version of Malunas portrays the arrival of the carts full of grain, the sifting, and then grinding of the grain into flour through the use of gears, turbines, belts, and grindstones until the flour is ready.

This suite of dances represents the traditions of Dimitrovarad, located in the Šop region of eastern Serbia. The suite comprises nine traditional dances: R'čenica. Dilmano Dilbero, Klecka, Bera, Čičovoto Dete, Jove Malaj Mome, Čačak, Na Dva Tanca, and Za Pojas.

Cam i mewn i Gymru, or "Welcome to Wales," provides a glimpse into the music and dance of the Welsh people. After almost 200 years of condemnation by nonconformist ministers, dancing almost vanished from Wales. Today it once again enjoys an enthusiastic following. This suite features "Ffaniglen," "Hoffedd ap Hywel," and "Step y Glocsen."

SCOTLAND: ROYAL HIGHLAND BROADSWORD BYU Scottish Highland Dance Club

Originating in Scotland in the 12th century, Highland dance is rooted in Scottish military culture. Historically, clan chiefs and kings used Highland dance to select their strongest soldiers, develop discipline in their troops, and showcase endurance and agility. Soldiers were also known to dance over their crossed swords before battle or in triumph after victory. Today, this cornerstone of Scottish culture continues to drive the human body and spirit, pushing dancers beyond what they ever believed to be possible.

This piece is a collaboration of local competitive, certified Irish dance schools (Shelley School and Harp Company) and BYU International Folk Dance Ensemble. Depicting a lyrical slip jig, then a yuletide treble jig, followed by a powerful double reel in the tradition of Irish dance hard shoe, the piece will be an exciting jewel to this year's Christmas Around the World!

La Madrugada, "The Dawn," is a song that symbolizes the awakening and yearning of a new relationship. The lyrics describe the longing and anticipation of being with a loved one. The song is also about how love connects humans to nature and spiritual cycles as the Lucero, "morning star," leads the charro to find his beloved in the morning. The excitement of Jalisco dance and its natural coquettish styling will reveal if the charro finds his woman at the end of the piece.

Bollywood is a film industry based in Mumbai, India, and is known for elaborate song-and-dance scenes, extravagant sets and costumes, and melodrama. The Bollywood dance style combines traditional Indian dances with Western contemporary styles such as hip-hop. In our story, a successful warrior returns home to reconnect with a beloved childhood friend. Will his love be returned?

The celebration of Ivana Kupala is a summer solstice pagan tradition where female dancers are ready to find a suitor. They dance Khorovod dances, and couples will leap over the fires and bathe in the river. The young women traditionally floated the wreaths they made down the river while the young men waited downstream to retrieve the wreaths from the water to capture a woman's interest.

Arkan is a traditional men's circle dance of the Hutsul people, an ethnographic community from Ukraine's Carpathian Mountains. Performed shoulder to shoulder around a bonfire, the dance features powerful, rhythmic footwork driven by a lively 2/4 beat. Accompanied by the trembita (alpine horn), sopilka (flute), and drum, Arkan embodies unity, strength, and the enduring spirit of the Ukrainian people.

Mo Li Hua, meaning "Jasmine," is also a famous Chinese folk song. The flower, though not particularly beautiful, gives off a fragrance that gladdens the heart and refreshes the mind—symbolizing internal beauty and humility.

Originating on Colombia's Caribbean coast, Cumbia blends African drums, Indigenous flutes, and Spanish melodies into a vibrant celebration of culture. Its graceful movements and rhythmic beats reflect the harmony and spirit of the Colombian people.

TURKEY: ARTVIN DANSLARITier II Ensemble

"Dances of Artvin" show the close connection between the present culture of Anatolia and an ancient culture of central Asia. The medley contains vignettes from 6 different dances in Horon and Bar styles.

This piece showcases a modern blend of traditional women's and men's dancing originating in the area of Trabzon, a fishing center on the Black Sea. The movements celebrate life familiar to this community, such as the motion of the sea, the handling of nets, and the twisting of caught fish.

One evening after dark, with the moon casting its mysterious light over the proceedings, the air seems to pulsate with the stamping and clapping of folks dancing with breakneck speed at the frolic. Banjo and fiddle—singing, flatfooting, and the rhythm of the "patters" all combine in this celebration of the Appalachian Running Set and Big Set.

A fusion of traditional line clogging and today's latest competition steps, this dance showcases the intricate rhythms and tangible energy of American clogging. Clogging originated in the Appalachian Mountains and was born from the blend of dance traditions brought by immigrants, African slaves, and Native Americans

Ciganocka refers to a young Romani girl who has attracted the attention of a young man. Romani refers to "gypsy" people who moved about in caravans in places such as Bulgaria, Romania, Hungary, Slovakia, and the Czech Republic. We consider the song to be part of the "gypsy jazz" style, which is experiencing a renaissance in the 21st century with many Americans participating in the trend. It was a hot music style in Europe 100 years ago but seemed to disappear with the onset of World War II.

Recognized as the national dance of Ukraine, Hopak was performed exclusively by men in the 15th and 16th centuries during the famous Cossack period. By the 19th century, women had become a regular part of the dance, adding to the vivacious spirit of this Ukrainian hallmark.
