### **Local Artist Spreads Kindness**

Hampton artist Sal Greco has a backstory that includes an eclectic mix of experiences, from a career working with large mainframe computers to a 1990's television role on "His Place," with a short stint as a stand-up comedian in-between. Today, Sal follows a very different passion, as he spends his time creating art out of salvaged pieces of wood.

Sal has always been a salvager of sorts, finding new uses for discarded items; with that upcycle mindset, he spent countless happy hours repurposing old furniture. Today, he is gaining a reputation for a different type of wood work, reclaiming pieces to create one-of-a-kind works of art that he uses as part of his mission to blanket the world in kindness.

As a child, Sal enjoyed sketching, but it was not until he took an acrylic painting class ten years ago that he rediscovered a love of art. Initially working on canvas, Sal soon switched to primarily painting on reclaimed wood, aiming to create some-

thing beautiful out of something destined for the trash.

In the summer of 2021, he began cutting the wood into smaller pieces. "I thought it would be nice to start giving them away," he shares. "I always carry some with me in my car, so I would leave them at places like Panera. I realized that it took away any interac-

tion with the person who received it. So instead," he



explains, "I started to reward kindness wherever I saw it. If someone holds the door for me, greets me, gives me a smile, delivers great customer service, is a great waiter...really just any small kindness, then I offer them a piece of my art."

Sal has given away more than 400 pieces of his art since he began this kindness crusade, and his hope is that the recipients will think about why he gave it to them. "It's the multiplier effect," he says with a smile. "Now they have a story to tell! If someone notices the art and comments on it, then they can say, 'Let me tell you the story about this!""

As he enjoys the hobby that has morphed into a mission, Sal continues to experiment with color, shapes, and media, spending hours focused on the work that brings such joy. The smile on the kind face of Sal Greco unveils the happiness in his heart, and, as he so wisely notes, happiness is meant to be shared.

### Forensics Team Takes Diocese Championship

Blessed Trinity Academy's Forensics Team came into the season in the fall with high expectations for the year. The team, consisting of students in 5th through 8th grades, felt confident they could do well this season, especially due to the veteran leadership of their 8th graders and having finished in 2nd place last year.

During the regular season, which runs from November through February, they compete in three meets against 8 teams from schools in the Diocese of Pittsburgh. All teams finish the season at the Finals Meet which also consists of an All-Star Tournament for individual recognition. This year BTA's team finished 1st place out of 16 teams with 333 total points and were crowned the season's overall winner, plus they had two All-Star Tournament winners, Erika Mitchell, 8th grade, for poetry, and their Group Read, Claire Banduski, Ella Shapiro, Savannah Vogel, and Sara Pomeitto, all in 6th grade. Typically, it is very rare to have even one winner in the All-Star Tournament let alone two, so this was quite an accomplishment for the team.

### Outstanding Season for Hampton's Joey O'Donnell

he Hampton golf team capped off a well-played season, with one senior departing this summer. Joey O'Donnell, Hampton senior and WPIAL qualifier, led the golf team with strong showings and was recognized at the HHS board meeting for his great performances.

Joey's journey to WPIALs took an unlikely path. After not making varsity in his first three years at Hampton, O'Donnell worked his way up from JV to one of the top golfers on the team. He hit a 79 at Saxon Golf Course on Sep. 20 at the Section 8-3A qualifiers to place 10th and become the only Hampton golfer to hit below the target score of 82, reaching the WPIAL Class 3A semifinal. At the semifinals, Joey placed a disappointing 69th out of 77 golfers, but was proud of the progress he made throughout



the season.

Outside of golfing, Joey has excelled at A.W. Beattie Career Center in addition to his studies at Hampton. He will attend Pennsylvania College of Technology (Penn College) in Williamsport, Pennsylvania to pursue a rewarding and in-demand career in HVAC.

Hampton will return its top golfers next year, including junior Peter Kramer, who averaged a team-best 39 per nine holes. Kramer was ruled ineligible for the postseason after transferring from Shady Side Academy following his sophomore year. A standout basketball player, Kramer lost his appeal to the PIAA in September and had to sit out for the basketball playoffs this past season, with Joe Lafko's basketball squad not the same without him.

Others expected to return for golf are sophomore Tyler Schmitt, who averaged 40, and juniors Matt Erka and Robert Coll, with 42 and 44 respectively. The current varsity and JV rosters include 11 juniors, and because seniors are not allowed to play JV, some talented golfers are going to face cuts next season, but that's a good problem to have to field a competitive team.

Elk started diving three years ago when an unfortunate back

injury led her away from gymnastics. But due to Covid and other factors, she did not start competing until this season. At the start of the year, her goal was just to qualify for WPIAL's, but as the season progressed, her aspirations grew. "I started to see States as a possibility," said Elk.

This was not going to be an easy task, with only sixteen girls making the second round of dives, and only seven qualifying to States.

But despite this being

her first year, she did it! With 450 points, Elk was able to finish in 3<sup>rd</sup> place behind one sophomore and one senior from North Catholic. Her solid performance, along with that of her teammates, Sophie Shelkey and Megan Baker, helped the Hampton girls finish as the Section Champions.

Entering the competition, Elk was nervous but more excited. "Most of the divers know each other and it was a really positive atmosphere," she said. Plus, Elk had learned a valuable technique in order to stay focused: "I tried to only pay attention to what I needed to do and my own dives, rather than wondering or getting distracted with how the others were doing."

It was a promising first season for Elk, who trains three to four days a week with the Pitt Club diving team in order to reach her goals. "I hope to be a Division I diver someday," she said. And with her talent, her work ethic, and her skills, it is possible to predict this dream turning to a reality.





### Local Couple Honor Son By Helping Others

Melanie Finnigan and her husband Chris, a Hampton Township police officer for the last 17 years, spent three months in the NICU (Neonatal Intensive Care Unit) at UPMC Magee-Womens Hospital when their son Liam was born prematurely on Nov. 21, 2008. That experience became the catalyst for the Liam Finnigan Music Program, a way to honor their son.

At birth, weighing 1 lb, 9 oz., Liam's lungs were not fully developed and he breathed with the assistance of a ventilator. A developmental therapist at Magee suggested playing music for Liam since it has been shown to have positive effects on healing. Melanie brought a CD player to the hospital and would play classical music for him; especially when they stepped out of the room to sleep or shower so he wouldn't feel alone. "Liam loved it. It made him feel better, his numbers got better," said Melanie. Over the course of his three months of life, Liam fought his way up to six pounds but was not able to breathe unassisted before he

passed away.

After a couple of years, Melanie and Chris wanted to do something in Liam's honor and to help other babies. "We refocused the pain and heartache to try to do something positive," said Melanie.

They started buying CD players informally for Magee's NICU but wanted to do something more permanent. What began as a letter writing campaign to family and friends, The Liam Finnigan Music Program was established and approved by the board at Magee. They now provide soothers shaped like whales to babies in the Magee NICU that project lights onto the ceiling, play music, and record voices. Parents can take the soothers home if they choose to.



The soothers were especially important during Covid. Only one adult was allowed in the hospital room, so other family members could not visit. Siblings recorded their voices talking or reading stories and parents recorded messages to be played when they were not able to be there in person. After the babies went home, they recognized the voices of their family members that they hadn't met.


"That just touched my heart so much," explained Melanie. She reached out to V-tech, the maker of the soother, in search of a partnership. V-tech came on board and provides the Liam Finnigan Music Program with an ongoing discount.

"Those doctors and nurses at Magee are so fabulous and gave us as much time as we had with Liam," said Melanie. Some of them still reach out to her each year on Liam's birthday.

#### A bit about Hannah

If you know Hannah and have followed her journey, you know that every single day is a blessing.  $\frac{\text{#onedayonehourone-minuteatatime}}{\text{minuteatatime}}$  is how we roll  $\sim$  it's a must to learn how to live this way when you have intractable epilepsy. Hannah has had over 100,000 seizures in her 20 years and currently has anywhere between 20 to 70 seizures a month.

#### So why am I telling you all of this?

I'm hoping by creating this Milk Chocolate Pretzel Rod fundraiser, it will help me in my quest to create Hannah's outdoor tranquil retreat as quickly as possible. Although I would love to accomplish this goal quickly, I know that all good things come with time. I'm typically not one to ask for help but thought that by giving something in return such as yummy chocolate covered pretzel rods, it's a win-win!

Last year something really cool happened. #### Noteworthy incidents and events:

them gain a deeper appreciation for our community," Eyerman said.

The Rachel Carson Trails Conservancy (RCTS) is a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization where volunteers dedicate themselves to the protection and development of the trail, while also promoting activities. The Conservancy's goals help community members to "experience the beauty of the natural world" according to Kathleen Ganster, a volunteer for the organization.



As it promotes uniting communities, the Rachel Carson Trails Conservancy seeks public help to connect individual neighborhoods to the trail via spur trails, providing residents access to the trail system. Building new trails is a time consuming, multi-year process.

The conservancy seeks homeowners to provide easements through private

land to reach public roads. Studies indicate nearby trail access and greenways not only improve property values, but increase outdoor recreation.

RCTS will assume the expense of procuring the easements and trail construction. Neighborhoods closest to the Rachel Carson Trail would be the easiest to connect, however communities further away have opportunities to connect via the 'Many Trails One Community Program,' a collaborative effort to build a network of trails throughout Western Pennsylvania.
