An Overwhelming Response for a Local Hero

There has been an outpouring of support for Hampton Township police officer Sgt. Rob Kirsopp and his family since his cancer diagnosis, but it reached new heights at the It's About the Warrior Foundation (IATW) Cabin Fever Concert, held at Jergels on March 3rd. The benefit concert featured camaraderie, music, food,

raffles and lots of generous people. On March 18th, Steve Monteleone, founder of IATW and the Cabin Fever event organizer, presented Kirsopp's family with a check for \$18,000 in front of a full house of officers, first responders, and community members at the Hampton Community Center.

"To say my family and I are overwhelmed is an understatement," said Kirsopp. "You have hearts of gold and I don't know how I could ever repay it." Kirsopp, who has been fighting his cancer battle for 5 years, was joined for the check presentation by his wife Roz, his son Ray, (Continued on page 3)

Plenty of "Firsts" for Wrestler

She made history by claiming gold in the very first sanctioned WPIAL girls' wrestling championship on February 17th, pinning both of her opponents, and her accomplishments don't stop there. McNutt became the first female wrestler in Hampton school history to capture a WPIAL championship and was the first female wrestler to medal at the Chartiers-Houston tournament

Police Information

The Hampton Township Police Department (HTPD) is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life of our residents and guests by providing the very best in law enforcement services. Thank you to the staff for helping to keep our community safe.

A summary of noteworthy incidents that occurred are listed below. These incident statistics included, but WERE NOT LIMITED TO, the following between the dates of 2/13/2024—3/6/2024:

Two-Vehicle Accident/DUI

On March 5, 2024, HTP was dispatched to the area of Oakbrook Court and Ferguson Road, for a two-vehicle accident. Upon arrival, officers observed the aftermath of a head-on collision between two vehicles.

The accident was said to have happened when Unit 1 attempted to turn left from Middle Rd. onto Oakbrook Ct. directly in the path of Unit 2, causing the vehicles to collide.

Both drivers were evaluated by Shaler-Hampton EMS and refused transportation to the hospital. Due to the severity of the accident, both units required a tow.

The driver of Unit 1 was placed under arrest for suspicion of driving while under the influence.

Vehicle Accident

On March 1, 2024, HTP units responded to the area of Harts Run Rd. and Woodland Rd. for a report of a vehicle accident involving one vehicle that rolled over and was upside down in the creek. Upon arrival, officers found that

there was an occupant trapped inside the vehicle who they assisted in getting out through the rear driver-side door. The driver was transported to the hospital for further evaluation due to the severity of the accident. Officers surveyed the scene and found a patch of ice on the roadway caused by water runoff.

On March 6, 2024, HTP was dispatched to the intersection of Mount Royal Boulevard and Duncan Avenue for a single-vehicle rollover-style crash. The accident was said to have happened when the driver attempted to make a left turn from Duncan Avenue onto Mount Royal Boulevard and lost control. 

A Student Collaboration

This winter, students from all grade levels at Hampton Middle School had the opportunity to work with an artist-inresidence for a mural that will be displayed on opposing sides of the HMS courtyard. HMS Student Wins State Chess Championship

Chalk up another first for HMS seventh grader Benjamin Lin! No stranger to competition, Ben frequently travels around the country with his father to participate in chess tournaments that test his skills against the best of the best among his peers. Last month in Harrisburg, Ben earned his biggest victory to date, besting all competitors to earn the title of State Middle School Chess Champion at the 2024 Pennsylvania State Scholastic Chess Championship. The two-day tournament pitted 46 players against each other in the K-8 Open section, and each competitor played five games. Entering the tournament as the No. 2 seed, Ben won his first four games, and managed to draw the No. 1 seed in the final round, securing the first place by a tiebreaker.

As champion, Ben will represent Pennsylvania at the 14th Annual Dewain Barber National Tournament of Middle School State Champions in Norfolk, Virginia, this summer (July 27-30, 2024). Smiling from ear to ear as he carried home a trophy that stands half his height, Ben is thrilled



to have achieved this milestone in his chess journey. He looks forward to the national competition in July, hoping to bring even more hardware home to Hampton.

Chess Players Capture Six Awards

Six Aquinas Academy of Pittsburgh students won awards at the Aquinas Chess Invitational Tournament. The tournament was held on a Saturday afternoon in early March. TIP OF THE MONTH:

Clean air and spring cleaning go hand in hand this month.

More allergens are floating around in the air this time of year, and you'll want to prepare your home with a routine air conditioning tune-up before the temperatures rise and you'll switch from heat to AC. 

in its 29-year existence.



Navigating your Child's Orthodontic Journey

As the number of orthodontic patients has grown, so has the number of orthodontic techniques. There is no doubt that phase 1 orthodontic treatment between age 4 to 9 will reveal dramatically different cosmetic results, but are these treatments necessary for the majority of children, or are many of these early treatment recommendations optional? Venkat Announces Grants for Emergency Responders by State Rep. Arvind Venkat

As a practicing emergency physician and legislator, I understand how important it is to enact policies that will improve the safety of our communities. That's why I support Gov. Josh Shapiro's proposal to double the state's investments in the Office of the State Fire Commissioner's Fire and EMS Grant Program – which allocated these funds to Shaler-Hampton EMS and Hampton Volunteer Fire Department – so we may keep our communities safe.




