Valentine's Day. The non-profit group has its roots in Charlotte, North Carolina, and its reach is spreading across the country.

The local chapter began in 2021 when Lisa Kostelnik, a Wexford-based gym owner and sister of Widow Project founder Ashley Manning, heard about three young women from her gym who had lost their spouses within months of each other. The project continues to grow as this year, 407 widows or widowers received flowers, treats, and small indulgences; 49 of those live in the Hampton/Gibsonia/Glenshaw area.

"It's such a thoughtful and kind gesture," reflects Linda. "It's wonderful that people remember you on Valentine's Day. This was my third or fourth year as a recipient, and it's so lovely. The first year," she remembers, "was bittersweet. You are so grateful that people remember you, but of course you wish they didn't have to. This is very special, and it truly helps you on a difficult day."



Volunteers gathered at the lodge in North Park and worked together to assemble everything where, Lisa reports, "You could just feel the love. Even the snow stopped for the two days we were working! Volunteers put their whole hearts into this, and the outside world kind of goes away for those couple of days."


### Meet An Officer

### **Jacob Mitchell**

Hampton Township Police Department officer Jacob Mitchell has always wanted to get impaired drivers off of the road, and now he has become an expert. He recently obtained a designation of DRE (Drug Recognition Expert), an expert that is called in for possible drug-related DUI's. Mitchell completed the extensive Drug Evaluation Classification Program through the National Highway Traffic Safety Association to become one of only 254

in the state of Pennsylvania.



If an officer suspects that a driver is impaired under a substance after completing the

standard sobriety testing, Mitchell is called to the scene. Through a 13-step process, he determines if an individual is impaired by drugs or may be having a medical emergency and he makes the judgement on whether a blood draw is needed or if the individual should be taken to the hospital.

When asked what he likes about his job, Mitchell replied that "I really enjoy helping people during their worst times in life, and that every day is different."

Mitchell grew up in Canonsburg and attended Waynesburg University. He played football there for four years and graduated with a degree in Criminal Justice. Following graduation, he worked with the Washington County Juvenile Probation Leader Program, a school-based program teaching life skills to at-risk youth. He then worked in domestic relations collecting child support funds and realized that sitting behind a desk was not for him, which led him to the Police Academy.

Mitchell started working part-time with HTPD out of the Academy for a couple of years and became full-time in 2017. In his off time, he travels with his wife Emily, and his daughters Evelyn (7) and Jane (5) to cheer competitions. "It's a blast. They both love it and it's fun hanging out with family and friends." The Mitchells live in Sarver and also enjoy spending time with their chocolate lab Theo who just turned 9.

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






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### Gabby Elk Dominates WPIAL Diving, Earns Second Straight Gold Medal

The Western Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic League (WPIAL) held its WPIAL/UPMC Sports Medicine Girls' Diving Championships on February 21<sup>st</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup> at North Allegheny



High School. Forty-two studentathletes participated in the competition across two classifications. Hampton junior Gabby Elk successfully defended her Class 2A gold medal.

Elk recorded a score of 444.25, finishing 12.30 points ahead of her competitors. This impressive score surpassed her previous year's winning score of 441.05, establishing her as a two-time champion.

Elk is the 23<sup>rd</sup> student-athlete to win at least two WPIAL girls' diving championships since 1980. She joins Nikki Perella, who claimed gold in the 1-meter dive for Hampton in 2005. Perella went on to dive in college at Lehigh and was awarded Freshman of the Year in 2006. With this victory, Gabby Elk qualifies for the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association (PIAA) Boys' & Girls' Swimming & Diving Championship, set to take place on March 12-15 at Kinney Natatorium on the campus of Bucknell University.

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



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### Food Allergy Safety Bill Passes PA House and a State Budget To Build On

I'm thrilled that the food allergy safety bill I'm prime sponsoring with state Rep. Natalie Mihalek, H.B. 77, has passed the Pennsylvania House of Representatives with bipartisan support and now moves to the state Senate for consideration.

Plain and simple, this legislation will save lives by requiring restaurants and other related establishments to warn of the presence of ingredients that trigger potentially fatal allergic reactions and request customers to convey to their servers what food allergies they might have. As an emergency physician, I've treated countless patients with serious consequences of food allergies and recognize the importance of ad-

dressing this critical public health concern.

Gov. Josh Shapiro recently outlined his proposal for the Commonwealth's 2025-26 fiscal year budget. For one, I was pleased to hear his ongoing commitment to economic development. I also remain committed to ensuring public health, public safety, and public education are all robustly funded through our state budget, with a particular emphasis on funding for school districts such as Hampton.

As we move into March, the General Assembly has already started to negotiate the 2025-26 budget. We'll be wrapping up Budget Hearings in the coming weeks. These hearings allow Committee Members in both the House and Senate to speak directly to the administrative departments who carry out large parts of Pennsylvania's annual budget to better understand what their needs are, what programs are working, and what isn't working.

Budget hearings are especially important this year as we navigate the chaos out of Washington, D.C. A significant portion of Pennsylvania's budget comes from federal dol-

lars, whether that is money for education, roads, clean water, farmers, or individuals with disabilities. When funding is indiscriminately cut or frozen from the federal level, that makes it incredibly difficult to plan for our state budget and how we fund the programs that Pennsylvanians rely on to get to work, get an education, and build their lives here in the Commonwealth.

But, we are negotiating this budget without a way to protect that money from waste, fraud, and abuse. That's why I am reintroducing the Commonwealth Fraud Prevention Act with my colleague Kristin Phillips-Hill (R-York). This legislation encourages private citizens to come forward as whistleblowers to report those filing false or fraudulent claims against the Pennsylvania government. It includes all of the provisions required for compliance with the Federal False Claims Act, which will allow Pennsylvania to recover an additional 10% of any monies recovered under the law. 44% of government fraud is found by tip. Protecting and encouraging whistleblowers to come forward is the best and most effective way to prevent fraud and protect our tax dollars.

Over the past several weeks, I have been busy in both Harrisburg and here at home. Shaler Hampton EMS recently hosted an Allegheny County Emergency Services forum at the Hampton Community Center, and I was pleased to attend and support our vital first responders. I am committed to working with our emergency services to find solutions to the current and long-term issues that EMS providers are facing throughout the state.

In Harrisburg, Gov. Josh Shapiro delivered his annual budget address on Feb. 4. Our state's fiscal year begins on July 1 and lasts through June 30 of the following year. Gov. Shapiro's proposed \$51.5 billion budget would increase spending by 7.5% over the current fiscal year. I am concerned that the rapid growth in government spending will exceed our revenue and require the state to use a large amount of our Rainy Day Fund.

Additionally, the unequal distribution of proposed funding is very troubling.

For example, if we compare the Hampton Township School District to the School District of Philadelphia, we see very different funding proposals. Hampton Township School District currently receives about \$6,000 per student in state funding, and under the governor's proposed budget, the district is slated to get just \$32 extra per student. Compare that to the School District of Philadelphia, which receives \$11,000 per student currently and in the proposed budget will receive an extra \$790 per student.

This proposal penalizes well-run schools like Hampton and others throughout the North Hills.

Over the next few months, I will be analyzing the budget proposal and working hard to find potential changes and improvements for a fairer and more balanced budget. We need a budget that is sustainable, fairly distributes funding throughout Pennsylvania, and encourages growth.
