Police Information

The Hampton Township Police Department is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life of our residents and guests by providing the very best in law enforcement services. Thank you to the staff for helping to keep our community safe.

leadership. North Hampton VFD owns two buildings, one on North Pioneer Road and one on Wildwood Road Ext., and Hampton VFD #1 owns one building on Duncan Ave. With the merger, all three firehouses will remain in operation but will function as one department.

North Hampton VFD President John Schwend explains, "We have been working behind the scenes for nearly five years to create joint bylaws and joint standard operating guidelines as well as to ensure the legal and financial aspects of the merger are completed in an appropriate manner. In addition, multiple committees have been formed, comprised of members of each fire department, to ensure continuity of operations during the merger process."

A dedicated, seven-person committee—made up of three members of each VFD along with Township Manager Chris Lochner—has spearheaded the process, painstakingly working to facilitate the merger to exacting standards. Earlier this year, a vote was taken to officially adopt the merger plan, accept the bylaws and guidelines, and determine the official merger date. Once the departments merge, a fire chief and other officers will be elected. From there, operational and leadership details will be determined by the officials.

John explains, "The unified operation will reduce redundancies in equipment, streamline administrative and operational leadership, and, most importantly, it will properly position the emergency services of Hampton Township for the future."





Updates for Hampton Township Residents

As your state representative, I continue to work for you in Hampton Township and Harrisburg. That's why I voted for House Bill 1219, sponsored by Rep. Tim Briggs, that provided relief to hardworking taxpayers.

H.B. 1219 would invest \$1 billion in our economy, allow Pennsylvanians to claim an Earned Income Tax Credit against their Personal Income Tax, expand the Child and Dependent Care Enhancement Tax Credit, accelerate the Corporate Net Income Tax reduction, increase the Net Op-

erating Loss deduction, and so much more. The bill would also increase investments in the Pennsylvania Housing Affordability and Rehabilitation Enhancement Fund, public transportation such as Pittsburgh Regional Transit, and the Neighborhood Assistance Tax Credit Program.

In the last 30 years, more than 120 productions have been filmed right here in Allegheny County, including major blockbusters and Oscar-winning films.

By passing this fiscally responsible legislation, we may continue to support hardworking Pennsylvanians, provide relief for taxpayers, and keep Pennsylvania open for business.
