# Hampton and Aquinas Students Connect Over Chess

Chess teams from Hampton High School and Aquinas Academy recently gathered for a friendly practice session after school at Aquinas. A rare opportunity in a league where most matches are virtual. With busy student schedules and limited travel windows, coaches Cathy Seluga (HHS) and Michael Burchill (Aquinas) saw this meetup as a meaningful way to strengthen the local chess community.



“Meeting in person helps students exchange ideas, cheer each other on, and maybe even form friendships,” said Seluga. “It turns chess from a solo pursuit into something communal. That sense of

belonging is especially important during the teen years.”

Hampton’s team is newly formed, having launched in December 2024. Despite their youth, they’re already making waves, thanks in part to standout players Luke Martin, a 2025 Outstanding Young Citizen Awardee and Ben Lin, a state champion who leads the Hampton Community Library’s Chess Club.

Coach Burchill emphasized the life lessons embedded in the

game: “Chess teaches patience, courage, and sportsmanship. We want our students to persevere in creative thinking to achieve their goals.”

Aquinas brings experience to the board, with 11 seniors anchoring what Burchill believes is their strongest team since joining the Western PA Interscholastic Chess League in 2019. The league’s season runs December through February, with playoffs in spring.



Both schools plan to continue their collaboration, with Hampton set to host the next joint practice. As Seluga noted, “Peer-to-peer matches build encouragement and the students enjoyed it so much, we can’t wait to do it again.”

the first time ever, a Hampton band would be competing in the most prestigious and demanding marching band circuit in the nation, the Bands of America (BOA) Championships.

Led by band director Chad Himmler, who is no stranger to creating "firsts" within Hampton's music program, the group performed in Columbus at the BOA Central Ohio Regional in late September, where they competed alongside 22 other schools on the field of a 22,000-seat professional sports stadium. To call their experience successful is, at best, an understatement. In their first competition at this level, they not only advanced from the Preliminary round to the Finals round where they earned a 9th-place finish, they did so with grace, integrity, and class.

"We received praise from BOA officials all day long," Chad reports, "not only about our students' performance, but also about their character and mature sportsmanship. They cheered enthusiastically for [eventual winners], the Kiski Area Marching Band," he shares proudly, adding,



"They stayed [very late] to watch Kiski perform a winner's encore, demonstrating impeccable sportsmanship and respect for a neighboring local school district."

As newcomers, the students may have felt like underdogs, but they surely came away winners. When their buses turned into the HHS lots at 4 a.m. the next day, the exhausted but gleeful group carried a trophy whose brilliance was outshone only by the pride they brought to Hampton.

**Sidenote:** The Fall issue of *Hampton Magazine* will feature a more in-depth look at the band's experience at the BOA competition.

In addition, as *The Hampton News* was going to print, the band finished the season with their best-ever score (91.3) at the PIMBA championships, earning the bronze medal for the first time in school history. It's truly been an amazing year for the HHS Marching Band! Up next for the band is the Pittsburgh Veterans Day Parade, scheduled for Saturday, November 8<sup>th</sup>.

The 33<sup>rd</sup> annual HAEE 5K, held on Sunday, October 12<sup>th</sup>, was more than just a race. With over 300 runners, walkers, and supporters filling the course, the event pulsed with energy from start to finish. The Hampton Middle School band set the tone with a lively warm-up performance, and Jen Lavella got the crowd moving with stretching and lively heart pumping cardio moves. This year's logo, a vibrant and dynamic design, was created by Central Elementary 4<sup>th</sup> grader Lila Zelch. Her artwork captured the spirit of movement and adorned race shirts, banners, and medals, earning smiles from participants and pride from her classmates.

Among the crowd stood Betty Onik, mother of the late Emily Onik, a beloved Hampton High School health and physical education teacher who passed away in October 2024 from ALS. The poster of Emily captured more than her image; it captured a feeling that you could hear her laugh ringing out and touched lives.

Allison Mitchell, a proud Hampton alumna and the overall winner of the race, was among those deeply moved. Allison approached Betty with a heartfelt story that left a lasting impression. Allison recounted her journey from a freshman in Ms. Onik's Wellness 1 class to a certified Exercise Physiologist and marathon runner. "Ms. Onik taught me

that movement is medicine," Allison shared. "She believed in me before I believed in myself. When I run, I carry her with me." Allison's story is a testament to the ripple effect of great teaching. Her goal to qualify for the Olympic Trials in the marathon is not just a personal milestone, it's a tribute to the teacher who first lit the spark, Emily Onik.

Looking ahead, the HAEE 5K continues to be a cornerstone of community fundraising, supporting innovation and excellence in Hampton schools. The next HAEE event, *The Heart of Hampton*, is scheduled for Saturday, March 14, 2026, at Wildwood Country Club. Organizers promise an evening of celebration, remembrance, and renewed commitment to the educators and students who make Hampton shine.

# A Walk Through Pittsburgh's Baseball Past

Pittsburgh native and published author Mark Fatla embarked on his journey of documenting the history of the Pittsburgh ballparks during and after the Covid-19 pandemic of 2020. A retired attorney, Mark decided to fill his time by pursuing one of his greatest passions: the history of baseball in the city of Pittsburgh. He did just that, and three years later, in 2023, went on to publish his first book *Pittsburgh's Historic Ballparks*.

On October 13<sup>th</sup>, 2025, the anniversary of Pirates' legend Bill Mazeroski's game winning walk-off home run in game 7 of the World Series, Mark filled the Hampton Community Center with 18 likeminded Hampton residents to take them on an insightful journey of the history of Pittsburgh's ballparks. Complete with historic memorabilia and even peanuts and Cracker Jack, the presentation began with a review of Mazeroski's home run. Using unique storytelling capabilities accompanied by baseball facts and personal stories, Mark went



on to paint a vivid imagery of baseball in Pittsburgh in the late 1800's and early 1900's.

Mark then told the story of nine baseball stadiums that were born in Pittsburgh, the most well known including Forbes Field, Three Rivers Stadium, and PNC Park, while also detailing insightful stories about lesser known parks such as Exposition Park and Recreation Park. Fatla also recalled the history of three original baseball stadiums used by the Negro Leagues in Pittsburgh's Hill District neighborhood in the early 1900's including Central Park and Greenlee Field.

Mark outlined facts about Pittsburgh teams that he's uncovered through his own research, such as how the Pirates got their team name. Philly did when he was left out of their program by a typo error. The Philadelphia team said, "you people are not acting like upstanding baseball team owners, you're acting like pirates!" Hence, the team name was born.

That question sparked a fire in Mark so bright that he has since dedicated his life to uncovering the hidden mysteries in the rich history of baseball and other sports in Pittsburgh. ## Scam

### This Isn't Your Pal, It's a Phish

In this week's scam, cybercriminals are using a clever trick that makes their phishing emails seem more real than ever. You receive an email from a real PayPal email address. The email contains an invoice for a large purchase you did not make, and a phone number for you to call if you want to dispute the charge. Even though the email comes from a real PayPal email address, this is a scam.

Cybercriminals create a PayPal account and use it to send you a fake payment invoice. The email you receive is real, but the invoice is not, and if you call the phone number in the email, you will not be connected to PayPal's support team. Instead, your call will be answered by a cybercriminal who will pretend to work for PayPal support. They will try to trick you into giving them your credit card information for a "refund," or trick you into paying a fee to fix your account!

Follow these tips to avoid falling for this phishing scam:

- If you receive an unexpected PayPal invoice, log in to your account on the official website or app to verify if it is legitimate.
- Remember to be wary of unusual emails, even if they come from what ap-

pears to be a genuine email address. Be suspicious of any unexpected bill or urgent request for money.

- Don't call the phone number listed in a suspicious email. If you have any questions or concerns, always use the official customer support number on the organization's real website.


### “Death by Chocolate” Hits the Stage at HHS

## Regulating Artificial Intelligence Usage in Health Care

by State Rep. Arvind Venkat

As an ER physician, I have already seen how artificial intelligence, or AI, has impacted health care in Pennsylvania, where it is used for patient care, billing, research and more. Despite the promise of AI, it is crucial that Pennsylvanians can trust that it is being used effectively and ethically by insurers, hospitals and clinicians.

This is why I introduced bipartisan legislation (H.B. 1925) that would enact common-sense regulations on AI use in our health care system. It is vital that patients know how and when AI is used in their care, and this legislation would require hospitals, clinicians and insurers to docu-

ment that information.

While technology can assist with assessments, the best way to make a diagnosis is to meet with the patient and understand what is affecting them. This bill would ensure clinicians are not over-reliant on AI by requiring a human decision-maker to make final decisions based on an individualized assessment whenever AI is used in treatment or insurance review.

We have already seen that AI can reinforce preexisting biases and discrimination in the health care system. This legislation would require providers and insurers to report how bias and discrimination -- already prohibited by state law -- have been minimized in their use of AI and how those determinations were made.

We are living through a moment of significant technological change due to AI. It is important that we act now so that this developing technology can support Pennsylvanians while being used responsibly.

As the Pennsylvania State budget impasse enters its fifth month, I'm continuing to fight for a budget that fully funds the needs of Pennsylvanians.

I hear from my constituents and from people and organizations across Pennsylvania about the pain that this late budget is causing them daily. People are losing their jobs, rape crisis centers are shutting down, foster parents aren't getting paid, senior centers are closing, children aren't receiving the services they need to thrive, all because Pennsylvania has not passed a budget. I have [shared some of those stories](#) on the Senate floor over the two months. Our counties, human service agencies, non-profits, child-

care centers, and schools should not have to borrow the money that the Legislature was constitutionally obligated to provide them back in June. They should not have to drain their reserves or take out loans that require interest payments.

That's why I've introduced legislation to pay off interest accrued on any loan taken out by an entity that receives state funding that was forced to take out a loan during the budget impasse. This includes counties, human service agencies, non-profit agencies, childcare centers, and schools that have been forced to take on additional debt to stay open and continue providing necessary services.

This legislation attempts to make these entities whole for money that they never should have had to borrow in the first place.

In light of the increased need caused by the federal government shutdown, my office is holding a food drive to benefit the North Hills Community Outreach food pantry. Donations of non-perishable items are welcome at our McKnight Road office through December 1!

### Property Tax/Rent Rebates: Apply with Help from My Office

I'm proud to say my district office serves as your local connection to state government, helping with a wide range of programs and services. One of the most common topics we're asked about is the Property Tax/Rent Rebate (PTRR) Program, which offers vital financial relief to seniors and people with disabilities.

This year, more residents qualify for the program because income limits increased to \$46,520 for both homeowners and renters. Applicants should exclude half of their Social Security income when determining eligibility.

The program is open to residents age 65 years and older; widows and widowers 50 years and older; and people with disabilities 18

years and older. I encourage all to apply if you think you may qualify. The maximum standard rebate is \$1,000.

The Hampton Township School District provides additional relief for residents in the district through its own PTRR program. While the district program follows many of the state guidelines, renters are not eligible, and the income limit is \$36,000 (with half of Social Security income excluded). Therefore, some residents will qualify for the Pennsylvania program, but not the Hampton program.

No one needs to pay for assistance to apply for either of the rebates. My office is here to help! 

