A summary of noteworthy incidents that occurred are listed below. These incident statistics included, but WERE NOT LIMITED TO, the following between the dates of 7/13/2025—7/26/2025:

DUI ARREST

On 7/20/25, a vehicle was stopped at William Flinn Hwy. and Harts Run Rd. for failing to maintain a single lane and an inoperable brake light. The officer could smell marijuana coming from inside the vehicle and an open alcoholic beverage was observed. There was also an open package of edible THC beside the driver's right leg. After receiving consent to search the vehicle, officers recovered the plain view items as well as a rolling tray, beer bong, and two partial marijuana cigarettes. The driver tested positive on a preliminary breath test (PBT). Both driver and passenger were under 21 years of age. The contraband was destroyed at the station and non-traffic citations were issued via summons.

On 7/26/25, HTP were dispatched to Harts Run Road for a report of a male in a vehicle passed out behind the wheel. The first officer on scene located the male still inside the vehicle, appearing unconscious. After waking the driver, he appeared disoriented, had slurred speech and smelled of alcohol. 



We are normal people, fathers and mothers, coaches, and have children of our own," said Halli. His favorite part of the job is to "help people on their worst day and help


Celebrating Brown's Promotion at A.W. Beattie Career Center

Hampton Fastpitch Team Defies the Odds

This summer, the Hampton girls fastpitch softball team, led by longtime coach Tom Carlin, proved that grit, growth, and heart can outshine even the toughest competition. With a roster split between rising 6th and 7th graders, the team took on a bold challenge: competing in 12U tournaments against older, often larger opponents—many heading into 8th grade.

Coach Carlin, who's been involved for four summer seasons, follows the age group of his daughters Haley and Callie, both key players on the squad. "The all-star team changes every other year," he explained, "but the spirit and drive these girls bring to the field never wavers."

What made this season stand out wasn't just the wins—it was the transformation. "We intentionally entered tournaments

where we'd face strong competition." Carlin shared. "The size difference alone was something to see! But the girls never backed down."

One of the most memorable matchups came against Fox Chapel, widely regarded as one of the strongest 12U teams in the re-Hampton gion. faced them three times-twice home and once in a nail-biting finale that went into extra innings and ended

with a one-run difference.

"Watching how competitive we were in that final game compared to early summer really showed everyone's improvement," Carlin said proudly.

Despite the sweltering summer heat, the team's energy never faltered. After a rain-soaked spring, the weather finally cooperated, and ASA umpires kept the games running smoothly and professionally. "This is fastpitch softball," Carlin noted, "and these girls just love to play and compete."

In fact, five of the players heading into 6th grade could have opted to play 10U—but chose to stay with their teammates and take on the tougher 12U bracket. That decision speaks volumes about their character. "Win or lose, they support each other and keep working hard," Carlin emphasized.

With the season wrapped and memories made, the team is already buzzing about next summer. There's talk of entering the

> Little League tournament series-if enough interest builds. Given the team's passion and progress, it's easy to imagine them making a strong showing.

Coach Carlin summed it up best: "These girls grew so much this summer-not just as players, but teammates. ľve been fortunate to coach them, and I can't wait to see what they do next."

resilience. "The team had a very positive attitude all summer," he shared. "They never got down on themselves and always believed we could win." That belief paid off in dramatic fashion during the Saxonburg Tournament, when Addison Watenpool stepped up to the plate with two outs and a full count. Down 4-3 against Plum, she connected with the pitch and sent it soaring over the leftcenter field fence — a grand slam. "It was a very rare moment, because not many go over the fence in 10u," Holtz said. "Everyone was going crazy." The video of the homerun, posted to the Hampton Athletics Association Facebook page, quickly became a community favor-

Another standout performance came from pitcher Amelia Holtz, who racked up an astonishing 123 strikeouts in just 15 games. She pitched 55 of the team's 73 innings, averaging 2.25 strikeouts per inning a rare feat for any young athlete.

But beyond the stats, Coach Holtz emphasized the joy of watching firstyear players gain confidence. "It's always intimidating to go up against older girls that can pitch very fast and sometimes wild," he said. "Seeing them succeed in fielding and hitting by

From Underdogs to State Playoffs


The Hampton girls' softball team just kept winning and etched their place in Hampton High School history with the furthest playoff run in program history. In their second year under coach Katie Hedderman, they accomplished many firsts and finished the season 8th in the state of Pennsylvania.

There was a combined roster of 21 girls between varsity and JV. The mix of experience and young talent allowed them to

build depth and was one of the reasons they could be so flexible with pinch hitters, defensive changes, and late-game substitutions in big moments. "The past two years have been nothing short of incredible. We've made history both seasons," said Coach Hedderman.

They completed the season 18-5 overall, with a perfect 12-0 record in their section, gaining the Section 3-4A title. "That undefeated section run was a huge confidence boost going into


High School Softball (Continued from page 9) the playoffs and a testament to how locked-in the girls were," Hedderman added.

The 2024 season was their history-making first trip to a WPIAL championship, finishing as runners-up. This year, they brought home the program's first-ever gold medal in WPIAL's. In the championship game, the Talbots faced section rival Blackhawk. Blackhawk had a 3-0 lead by the sixth inning. Walks from Katelyn Dubee and pinch-hitter Ashley Schick put runners on, and Marissa Snyder smashed a ball to center, scoring two. Freshman shortstop Alena Zottola followed with a double to tie it up. Eden Lawrence grounded out to move Alena to third, setting the stage for their cleanup hitter, Teresa Fritsch, who launched a deep fly ball to center. Alena tagged and scored to give them the 4-3 lead. Hedderman remarked that winning the WPIAL championship was the ultimate season highlight. "The energy in the stadium, the fans jumping to



their feet, the moment the girls grabbed the trophy together, it was pure joy."

The Talbots made it to the state playoffs for the first time in 2024 and lost in the first round. This year, they won the first game but fell 6-3 to LeBoeuf in the PIAA quarterfinals. "This was the most unified, selfless team I've ever coached. Everyone had each other's backs. They bought into the 'one common goal' mindset and it showed every time they stepped on the field," Hedderman explained.



"The most rewarding part was watching the girls grow as people. They've hosted charity games like our Pediatric Cancer Awareness night and organized youth nights to connect with younger players in our community. Those bonds off the field are what make the on-field success so special." There were just 3 graduating seniors (Aliza Michielli, Cassie Vidic, and Alaina Dittrich) so a lot of talent remains for next year's team.

testing was attempted but terminated by officers due to the safety concerns of the individual injuring himself due to being highly intoxicated. Chemical testing was refused, and the driver was subsequently placed under arrest for suspicion of DUI.

On 7/26/25, while on patrol, an officer initiated a traffic stop after observing a vehicle leaving its lane of travel on three separate occasions. While speaking with the driver, the officer could smell the odor of an alcoholic beverage, and the driver had heavily slurred speech. After failing to complete field sobriety testing and taking a PBT, the driver was arrested for suspicion of DUI of alcohol or a controlled substance. The vehicle was towed from the scene.

Vehicle Accident

On 7/ 23/25, HTP were dispatched to the scene of a two-vehicle motor vehicle accident near the intersection of Bryant Road and Sample Road. Upon arrival, officers observed two vehicles, both with significant damage. There were no injuries; both vehicles were towed from the scene.

On 7/28/25, while on patrol, an officer located a two vehicle accident on William Flinn Highway at Oxford Blvd. between an automobile and a motorcycle. Shaler/ Hampton EMS arrived on scene and transported one person to the hospital. Both vehicles were able to be driven from the scene.

FRAUD ATTEMPT

On 7/22/25, a complainant came to HTPD to report an alleged fraud attempt involving their bank account. They had been contacted through their computer by an individual identifying himself as being from Microsoft. The individual claimed there was an issue with the complainant's account and that he owed a \$12,000 fine related to pornography.

The individual initially instructed them to contact him at a phone number he provided. He then provided a secondary number stating it was a private line to avoid the call being recorded or intercepted. The complainant complied and called the secondary number.

During the call, they were directed to go to the bank and transfer the funds into a "new account" while remaining on the phone. Upon arriving at the bank, the complainant informed the teller of the situation. The bank employee advised them to hang up the call immediately, which they did. The bank then documented the incident, cancelled the existing account, and issued a new ATM/debit card.

The complainant was advised by both the bank and HTPD that this was a scam. They were instructed to closely monitor all accounts associated with them and were also informed about credit monitoring agencies for further assistance. At this time, no financial loss was reported.

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Credit Union Celebrates Customer Appreciation Day

On August 6, 2025, the North Districts Community Credit Union welcomed members old and new to their gleaming new facility at 101 NorthTowne Square in Gibsonia, PA—with open arms, festive tents, and a whole lot of gratitude. The Customer Appreciation Day was more than just a celebration—it was a tribute to decades of trust, community, and growth.

Outside the branch, laughter and aromas filled the air as guests enjoyed complimentary hot dogs, baked beans, a variety of side dishes, and desserts that disappeared as quickly as they arrived. Families gathered under sunny skies and marveled at balloon animals conjured by Putts the Clown. Every guest had the chance to win prizes, and those who brought canned goods for Lighthouse Food Bank received extra tickets—underscoring the Credit Union's spirit of giving back.

The North Districts Credit Union was chartered in 1942. Current board member Tom Castello, helped operate the union modestly out of his home. Growth led to a few moves—and now, to this spacious, modern hub equipped with multiple tellers, a large parking area, drive-thru services, and an automatic banking machine. "The old location was so crammed," shared longtime member and president of the board Bob Wiskemann. "This new space feels just perfect—and so much brighter."

Originally serving teachers and staff from ten local school

districts—including Shaler, Hampton, Fox Chapel, and Pine Richland—the credit union offered a financial lifeline in times when educational salaries were modest and pensions small. "It was a way to save for the future," Wiskemann recalled. Former teacher and board member Mary Louise Ellena added, "It's serendipity, really-how the credit union brings so many of us together."

For over 20 years, there has been a significant reduction in human and pet exposures to the rabies virus throughout Allegheny County. This is largely due to the efforts of the rabies vaccination program for wild raccoons, spearheaded by the Allegheny County Health Department and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. This year, employees and volunteers from both organizations are distributing vaccine-containing baits through September 20th across Allegheny County.

During this time, please keep your dog on a leash, indoors or confined to your property as much as possible during baiting and the week after. The risk of adverse effects to humans and animals due to exposure to the vaccine is minimal, but the ACHD and Township urge the public to avoid contact with the bait if possible.

Protect your deck.

Safety inspections of your deck are a must-do on the autumn home maintenance checklist. Spray water on various spots around the deck and reseal if water seeps into the planks. The deck will be secure throughout the winter if water beads up or forms puddles.

Look for any loose screws or nails to prevent cold weather damage. Tighten or replace fasteners as needed. Power wash the deck and inspect it for splintering or cracking. If necessary, fill the cracks in the wood with epoxy. Use a water-repellent stain to prevent damage from melting ice and snow.

be instantly directed to a website or mobile app. Unfortunately, cybercriminals can use QR codes to their advantage. This scam begins when you receive a package in the mail that you weren't expecting. There's no return address or sender information, but a QR code is printed on the box.

However, the package, which contains an item of little to no value, is just a trick to get you to scan the code. It was sent by cybercriminals, and they hope you will be tempted to scan the code to find out where the package came from. If you scan the QR code, you'll be taken to a fake website and asked to enter your personal information so that cybercriminals can steal it. The website could even secretly install malware on your device! Follow these tips to avoid falling for this QR code scam:

- ♦ Be suspicious of any package you receive that you did not order, especially if it has no sender information.
- Never scan a QR code from a source you don't recognize or trust. Cybercriminals can use them to send you to malicious websites.
- ♦ Be careful about allowing websites and apps to access your phone's data after scanning a code. Cybercriminals can use these websites and apps to steal your data or download malware to your device.



The North Hills DUI Task Force conducted a Stationary DUI checkpoint detail that was in conjunction with the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration Checkpoint Strike Force.

On 8-15-2025 the task force conducted a sobriety checkpoint in Shaler Township. There were 1308 vehicles that passed through the checkpoint and 7 individuals were administered field sobriety test. Of those tested, 5 were arrested for driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol. 32 citations and 11 warnings were issued for various vehicle code violations.

This is the 29th year for the North Hills DUI Task Force and to date, 267 checkpoints/roving patrols have been conducted. There have been 2,292 individuals tested for DUI, and of those tested, 1,080 have been arrested. The North Hills DUI Task Force is comprised of officers from the police departments of Borough of Aspinwall, Borough of Etna, Indiana Township, Northern Regional, O'Hara Township, Ross Township, Shaler Township, West Deer Township, Borough of West View, McCandless Twp, Borough of Millvale, Hampton Township, Borough of Blawnox, and Reserve Township.

Pushing Back Against Federal Healthcare Cuts

As we continue our work in Harrisburg to pass a fair, balanced budget, we are already seeing the impact on everyday Pennsylvanians of the federal budget advocated by President Trump. We are witnessing the decimation of health care access, rising numbers of uninsured residents, and increasing health care costs in our state. These problems will only multiply in the months and years ahead.

As an emergency physician, I have seen patients die after losing their health insurance. As a lawmaker, I'm working to fight back against these cuts. I have voted for and proposed significant legislation aimed at staving off the reductions in health care access passed by the Trump administration and the Congress in Washington.

My H.B. 79, which passed the PA House with overwhelming bipartisan support, would require greater transparency in hospital-based financial assistance programs so patients know about them — a step that can help prevent them from accruing medical debt.

I also voted for four bills that would protect essential health care access under the Affordable Care Act as this administration threatens to dismantle it. These bills would protect coverage for pre-existing conditions, ensure parents can keep their children insured until age 26, prohibit insurance companies from capping coverage for essential benefits, and require health insurance to cover preventive health care services without cost-sharing.

Health care is fundamental for all of us. Moving into the fall, my focus will be on passing a state budget that expands access for all Pennsylvanians and makes health care more affordable across our state.

Getting Smartphones Out of Classrooms

I'm a dad of four. Like a lot of parents, I see the clear evidence: Big Tech, social media, and smartphones are hurting kids in the classroom and beyond. From doing worse in school, to mental and physical health, to social relationships, and more—our kids are getting pummeled by devices and apps that are designed to be addictive.

At a minimum, our classrooms should be free of smartphone distractions so kids can focus on learning.

So I'm asking every school district in Pennsylvania's 17th Congressional District a simple question: what will your policies be this coming school year around smartphone use in the classroom?
