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Aquinas Academy Excels in Mock Trial State Finals For Third Consecutive Year

The Aquinas Academy of Pittsburgh's High School Mock Trial team were Co-Champions and advanced to the State Finals competition for the third consecutive year. Aquinas Academy was

undefeated in Allegheny County beating Allderdice, Eden Christian, Hillel Academy, and Mount Lebanon high schools.

Aquinas placed fifth at the State Competition which took place on March 28 and 29 at the Dauphin County Courthouse in Harrisburg. Fourteen teams from across Pennsylvania qualified for the tournament. Aquinas

won their the first round match with a convincing victory over Central Bucks East, winning on a 5-0 vote from the jury. John Ortiz won Best Attorney and Alice Rothfus won Best Witness. The team lost in their

second round against Nazareth Area in a close match 3-2. Anne

Dolan won Best Attorney and Brynn Burnsworth won Best Witness. Aquinas' 5th place finish represents their highest-ever placement in their three State tournament appearances.

Aquinas Academy's Mock Trial team included seniors Brynn Burnsworth, Anne Dolan, Lucy Fowler, Samuel McGowan, John Ortiz, Mary Osburg, Alice Rothfus, and Clara Yuo; Junior Luke

Crawford; and sophomores Alexandra Swift and Elise Metzler. This was Timothy Waxenfelter's fifth year coaching the team.

The Pennsylvania Mock Trial Competition is sponsored by the Pennsylvania Bar Association Young Lawyers Division. "One of the largest in the nation, the PBA/YLD Mock Trial Competition gives over 290 high school student teams from across the state the opportunity to act as lawyers and witnesses in simulated civil trials before actual judges and panels of juries. 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Hampton's Stunning Production of Hadestown: Teen Edition

The Hampton High School stage transformed into the underworld of Hadestown for four spectacular performances during the first two weekends of April. It took 97 students (between

cast, crew, and orchestra) and eight adults to pull off the epic run of *Hadestown: Teen Edition*, which led to many standing ovations, even mid-show, and sell-



ing out the entire auditorium, which hasn't been done since 2005 with *The Wizard of Oz.*

Hadestown: Teen Edition weaves together the mythic love stories of young dreamers Orpheus and Eurydice, as well as King Hades and his wife Persephone. It is a sing-through musical that includes 36 separate pieces of music with complex vocal arrangements

and very little spoken dialogue. "For my co-director Mrs. Lavella, and myself, the biggest challenge with this production was figuring out how to stage and choreograph those 36 pieces of music," explained director Dan Franklin. "For the kids, it was a Herculean task to learn all the melodies and constant vocals. But they tackled it in the most beautiful way possible."

Three roles in the show were double cast (Hermes, Persephone, and Hades), meaning that two actors played the role in

different performances, and those actors performed in the ensemble on the nights that they didn't perform in their role. Typically, roles in the Hampton musicals are not double-cast but during callbacks this year, there were several auditioners that had a unique way of portraying a character and Franklin and his other directors wanted to see all of these interpretations equally. Double-casting was a way to bring that to fruition.

Sophomore Logan Brady, who played Hermes during the Friday evening performances, was one of those actors. "I prepared with the help of both the directors and my peers for vocals

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Blood Drive: Students Step Up Amid Shortage

On April 9, 2025, Hampton High School hosted its Community Blood Drive, collecting 70 units of lifesaving blood products, enough to potentially save the lives of 210 area patients. Among the standout student donors was Sydney Pacek, who won a \$50 gift card sponsored by Caliente Pizza after nurse Kirsten Nelson drew her name from the raffle.

Student participation was the driving force behind the blood drive's success, as organizers noted a steep decline in community involvement. Only nine community members were scheduled to donate during the afternoon hours. Before the pandemic, the school's blood drives attracted over 120 donors regularly; this time, there were just 54 donors on the schedule.

This decline comes at a critical time, as Pittsburgh faces a significant shortage of blood supplies, highlighting the urgent need for community involvement. Blood donations are essential, with no substitute available for saving lives in hospitals.

Looking ahead, the next blood drive will take place on October 29, 2025, in the old library at Hampton High School. Event hours will be adjusted to better align with current participation trends, and organizers are hopeful that increased awareness and outreach will boost donor numbers and reenergize community support.

Hampton High School encourages residents to rally behind this lifesaving effort. Let's come together to restore the community spirit that has long defined Hampton's blood drives. Mark your calendars and be part of the solution!

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Stormwater

In 2008, Hamton Township enacted a Stormwater Management Ordinance, which requires property owners to install stormwater controls on their property when the amount of new impervious surface area that is added to the property exceeds 400 square feet. Impervious surfaces include paving, new gravel area, roof area, or any other hard surface that water will not absorb through. This number is tracked cumulatively across all new projects that have been undertaken since 2008. So, if you plan to add over 400 square feet of new impervious surface area, whether that's via one project or multiple smaller projects that add up to over 400 square feet, you will need to install stormwater controls to mitigate the new runoff that will be generated. Pennsylvania is one of the most flood-prone states in the country. In recent years, heavy storms have become more common, creating many flooding issues for low-lying properties and downstream communities. These stormwater requirements, which are mandated by the state, aim to prevent surface

runoff from being redirected to adjacent properties and to reduce the flooding impacts to the area's streams. To help residents with these requirements, the Township has developed several pre-engineered options for compliance with the stormwater requirements, which can be found in the Residential Small Project Stormwater Guide (available on the Township's website or in the Permitting Office). These options include things like an underground sump pit (aka gravel pit), and infiltration trench, pervious pavers, or a cistern/underground storage tank. However, these options are not "one-size fits all" and the best solution for your particular property may need to be designed by a stormwater engineer.

Also, if you live in a newer development the amount of new impervious surface area that can be added before stormwater controls are needed may be different, so please check with Permitting Office while your planning your project for an exact answer.


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
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2025 Clean-up Day In Hampton

Social Services Launches Food Drive to Support NHCO

Tackling Medical Debt, Expanding Allergy Treatment, and Supporting Families

My bipartisan bill aimed at relieving the medical debt of many Pennsylvanians was recently amended to reflect a change in how to realize that goal. In the bill's updated form, the Pennsylvania Department of Health would develop standardized financial assistance forms. These forms would reflect a hospital's financial assistance programs, be shared with patients upon admittance and discharge at all Pennsylvania hospitals, and made available on hospital websites and the Health Department's website.

Too often, patients don't know if they might be eligible for existing hospital-based financial assistance programs. With this legislation, residents would receive access to that information and resources automatically.

I've also introduced a bipartisan legislative package of bills that would replace "epinephrine auto-injector" with "epinephrine delivery system"

in current statutes. Last summer, the FDA approved an epinephrine nasal spray to treat serious allergic reactions and anaphylaxis.

A quick response often means the difference between life and death for patients suffering from an allergic reaction, and epinephrine is the definitive treatment for this often life-threatening condition. By making a simple change in description, other FDA-approved formulations of epinephrine would be recognized under Pennsylvania law and ensure that serious allergic reactions can be treated rapidly in schools and other settings across the Commonwealth.

Additionally, I've authored or co-authored bipartisan bills that would hold health insurers accountable for consistently denying reimbursement claims, help put military family members through college, and give pharmaceutical professionals greater representation on the PA State Board of Pharmacy.

Local Pharmacists go to Washington, D.C. with Congressman Deluzio to Discuss Taking on Monopoly Power





Small businesses are the lifeblood of communities like

Hampton Township, but big corporations consolidating power are squeezing them, crushing competition, and ripping people off. That is unacceptable to me. So I joined col-

leagues in Washington to launch the "Monopoly Busters Caucus," aimed at restoring competition to American capitalism, lowering costs, and giving small businesses a fair shot.

Hampton residents Jon and Bob Akanowicz, father and son co-owners of Towne Drugs in Aspinwall, joined me at the Capitol to highlight the damage done by Pharmacy Benefit Managers (PBMs)—corporate middlemen dominating the pharmacy indus-

try. Jon shared, "Since early 2025, over 70 pharmacies have closed in Pennsylvania. The top three PBMs control over 80% of all pharmacy claims in the U.S. They under-reimburse pharmacies, making it hard for community pharmacies like ours to stay in business. This impacts patients' access to crucial medications."

PBMs are just one example of monopolistic practices hurting small businesses and consumers. From skyrocketing egg prices—where corporations exploit bird flu to inflate profits—to excessive junk fees from companies like Ticketmaster, monopolies are squeezing Americans at every turn.

The "Monopoly Busters Caucus" is committed to fighting corporate power and promoting a pro-worker, pro-consumer, and pro-small business agenda. It's time for Congress to juice competition and lay a path back to the American Dream.
