As the Planning Director for Hampton Township, educational outreach is an important part of my job. To that end, I am happy to write a short column for the Hampton News to explain permitting and land-use topics and answer frequently asked questions.

In the past year, many new vape shops (businesses that sell non-tobacco vape products,

Police Information

The Hampton Township Police Department (HTPD) is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life of our residents and guests by providing the very best in law enforcement services. Thank you to the staff for helping to keep our community safe.

A summary of noteworthy incidents that occurred are listed below. These incident statistics included, but WERE NOT LIMITED TO, the following between the dates of 9/16/2024—10/6/2024:

Vehicle Accident

On 10/4/24, HTP Officers, Hampton Fire and Shaler/ Hampton EMS responded to the area of RT 8 and Craighead Road for a 3-vehicle accident. No injuries were reported, insurance information was exchanged between the involved parties, all of the vehicles were towed by Leo's Towing and Hampton FD cleaned up debris from the roadways.

Social Services Team Hosts Training Program for Law Enforcement Officers

Currently under the direction of Senior Police Social Worker Angela Kenbok, the Social Services arm of the Hampton Township Police Department (HTPD) has become a model program within the region. The Social Services team recently took part in presenting a five-day Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training program for law enforcement officers and police social workers. The seminar provided 40 hours of training to officers and social workers from Hampton, Ross, Millvale, Mt. Lebanon, and VA Police, and upon completion, each participant received a certificate and a pin.

The goal of the seminar was to educate and raise awareness for law enforcement officers so they can learn methods for deescalating situations and, when appropriate, provide alternatives to jail. If, for example, an individual has not committed a serious crime—for example, household conflict, hoarding, safety or zoning issues—a social worker can step in to work toward an alternative outcome. Over the course of the five days, participants engaged in a number of role-playing exercises to explore options for a variety of situations that may arise. The program also stressed the importance of self-care, emphasizing the need for officers and social workers to prioritize their health and to learn to relax and unwind after long hours on shift.

CBD, and other items like Delta-8) have been popping up everywhere. Hampton has not been immune to this trend, with four such stores currently operating in the Township. I have had many residents ask me, "Why does the Township keep approving these?" The short answer is – because we have to. This sudden rise in vape shops has occurred in so many places that it has prompted articles and news segments by KDKA, PennLive, CBS Pittsburgh, The Atlantic, and many other outlets examining why these stores have become so prevalent. For more information, an online search of "Why are there so many vape shops" will return many results explaining this change. Some of those reasons include:

There is a growing demand for e-cigarettes, CBD, and forms of "legal marijuana" like Delta-8 and THCa that have been developed in recent years and are not regulated by federal laws. Unlike most other retail stores that must compete heavily with online retailers, licensed vape shops are the only place these items can be obtained.

These stores can be easily located in existing commercial storefronts, making them an attractive option for landlords looking to rent out vacant suites in strip malls, stand-alone buildings, or empty convenience stores. Landlords have seen the loss of many tenants in recent years due to changing shopping habits. These empty storefronts are the most common places to see these new vape stores.

Unlike restaurants, vape stores don't require many parking spaces or employees – the stores can often be operated with

just one person. They also deal with non-perishable products, so unlike restaurants they don't have to worry about using up their inventory before it goes bad.

The fee for a PA State license to sell these non-tobacco items is only \$25 per year, making it much more affordable for start-ups than other types of state-licensed businesses.

Residents who are curious about this trend can find more information online with other reasons for the sudden explosion in these types of stores. But the bottom line is, municipalities cannot prevent these types of businesses from opening since they are permitted under state law...unless there are provisions in their local zoning laws, which Hampton does not currently have. However, next year Hampton will be updating its Zoning Ordinance. At that time, we may consider enacting measures to limit these types of stores, such as listing them as a "conditional use" which carries extra restrictions and requires the review and approval of a land development application by the Planning Commission and Council. Residents can always consider contacting their local state representative to ask for changes to the state laws. Right now, the state is working on legislation that would increase the licensing fee and better regulate what types of items these stores can sell. In the meantime, market demand must dictate how many of these stores open in Hampton since there is nothing that we can legally do to deny these businesses the right to operate in the Township. Where Are They Now?

Vince Matthews graduated from Hampton High School in June of 2022, and later that same year, he completed boot camp in October in Great Lakes, Illinois. He then embarked upon a challenging journey of highly specialized trainings.

Following his boot camp graduation, Vince served as an E3, or Fireman, before transferring to Charleston, SC, to embark on four specialized training schools. This rigorous pipeline tested the physical and mental endurance of the sailors within a chal-



lenging timeline. Designed by MIT, this program is renowned as one of the most demanding trainings offered by the military.

His series of training began with A School, where Vince studied mechanics, machinery, and basic engineering to qualify as a Machinist Mate Nuclear (MMN). After three months, he graduated with honors and was promoted to the rank of E4, or Petty Officer Third Class.

Next, he entered Power School, where he focused on the science and mathematics of reactors, tackling complex subjects such as physics and thermodynamics. Despite

the program's rigorous standards, Vince persevered, passing three challenging exams.

The third phase of his training was Prototype, where he applied his knowledge in hands-on settings. During this time, he worked on two submarines and gained insight into his future roles within the Navy. Qualified personnel guided him in the operations of nuclear reactors, and the demanding 24/7 shift schedule tested his resilience as he prepared for the qualifying exam to become a Machinist Mate Nuclear.

Vince excelled in his class and subsequently advanced yet again, where he was selected as an Engineering Laboratory Technician, further enhancing his skill set.

Vince was later presented with the opportunity to enter STAR Reenlisting, which came with a substantial bonus and a promotion to E5, or Petty Officer Second Class.

Soon, Vince will transfer to his next assignment in Newport News, VA, where he will serve aboard the USS John F. Kennedy (CVN 79), equipped with the highest level of technology available in the Navy.

Vince said his journey was challenging, but has no regrets. "The best part of being in the Navy is meeting new people from diverse backgrounds around the world. I have forged lifelong friendships that I would never have made without taking the risk to pursue this path."

Tennis Team Goes Back to States for the Second Consecutive Year

The Hampton High School girl's tennis team played all of their matches away this year due to renovations on the home tennis courts, but that didn't stop them from making history! Last year, the Hampton girls went to the PIAA state playoffs for the first time. This year, the team fought hard at the WPIAL championships to secure a victory in the 3rd place match, which clinched their back-to-back trips to the PIAA state championships in Class 2A.

"It is much harder to repeat a trip to states. The pressure and expectations of the previous team, and wondering if we were good enough, make the journey this year all that sweet-

er," said Coach Grant McKinney. "We had four 3-2 victories, including a 3-2 victory against Oakland Catholic to clinch the bronze medal and a trip the PIAA State Team Championships. Those close wins show the grit, hard work, and determination of the team."

"We were so proud to be back-to-back state qualifiers. It was an amazing moment to share with our families and each other," said senior singles player Abigail



Anderson. This was truly a team accomplishment. Assistant coach, Milt Squiller, helped by leading extra practices and trained many of these girls when they were on the junior varsity team. Seven of the girls on varsity were on JV last year. "The girls on our exhibition team and the girls on our JV are not recognized enough. Without those girls we would not be where we are. The JV and the exhibition teams work hard to make us better players," explained Anderson. Hampton junior doubles player McKenna Restori added, "Our coach says we are a 'deep' team. We work hard, we compete, and we have some fun out on the court."

Hampton Senior Grace Stitt has also made Hampton history in the singles realm. Stitt is the first player in 30 years to earn a PIAA singles berth, after just missing the bid to states last year.

She is only the 2nd player in Hampton history to advance to the PIAA singles playoffs. "My team helped to build me up countless times throughout the season. Leading up to both sections' singles and WPI-ALS, I was not feeling hopeful. My team, more specifically my fellow seniors (Abigail Anderson, Madison Holleran, Carolyn Clutter, Ellery Robertson, and Mack McGinnis), tremendously helped me to find the confidence I needed to pull out the tough wins." Stitt will compete in the first round of the PIAA playoffs on November 1st in Hershey, PA.

blind sports, which coincided perfectly with October, recognized as National Blind Sports Month. This initiative aims to raise awareness and celebrate the achievements of athletes with visual impairments.

Mr. Brush introduced the lesson plan, drawing on his extensive experience with the visually impaired through the organization Envision Blind Sports. This organization serves as a resource for athletes, families, schools, and communities, striving to enhance opportunities for blind athletes.

Mr. Brush collaborated with students to create sighted and non-sighted partnerships, engaging them in both sports and team-building exercises. "We developed a lesson where the

ultimate goal was for students to learn how to interact with visually impaired individuals," he explained.

Students quickly gained insight into the challenges faced by those with visual impairments, while their sighted partners learned effective ways to guide them during sports activities. Fourth-grade student Sofia shared her experience, stating, "I didn't realize how difficult it would be when I couldn't see what I was doing. I had to really trust my partner as she guided me."

Mrs. Serbin noted that the exercises aligned with the "Portrait of a Talbot," a shared vision within the Hampton Township School District that promotes the essential skills, knowledge, and attributes necessary for a successful future. "The lessons emphasized the importance of effective communication and perseverance," she added.

"Students had to communicate precisely," remarked Mr. Brush, "especially in their roles as guides." Students quickly adapted to the responsibility of assisting their peers. One student, Lennon, expressed, "I felt really scared at first being guided, but after a few attempts, I started to feel more comforta-

ject some students were already familiar with. "I explained that athletes with disabilities compete with the same determination as Olympic athletes," he noted.

Mrs. Serbin observed that some students revealed talents



previously unnoticed during the unit. "One typically quiet student began using very descriptive language while directing his blindfolded partner," she said. "His leadership skills flourished as he felt a responsibility to care for his peer."

Most importantly, Mr. Brush hoped the lessons would foster empathy and understanding for those who are different. "Students can truly make a difference in the future. I hope they will know how to interact with visually impaired individuals in their schools, communities, or workplaces, and communicate effec-

tively to assist them if needed."

He added, "Instilling awareness of people with special needs early in students' lives helps develop a lasting sense of empathy."

Mr. Brush will conclude his student teaching at the high school, where he will continue to teach health and physical education. To learn more about Envision Sports, visit:

Angela presented the program alongside Ross Township social worker Jordan Sager, and together they provided a range of models for the officers and social workers on hand. Pleased to participate with her co-workers as well as some Hampton officers, Angela was especially impressed that officers Austin Campanella and Nate Meade dedicated an entire week to learn crisis intervention techniques.

"I really enjoyed the opportunity to participate alongside my fellow Hampton social workers and the Hampton police officers," Angela says. "In particular, it speaks volumes about the officers' dedication to their community. Both were happy to spend their week in the training sessions, and they're looking forward to using the skills they learned."

Attendees from other municipalities who participated will share their knowledge with fellow officers, thereby expanding the reach of social worker intervention within law enforcement.

The CIT is particularly important to the behavioral health system because research shows that individuals suffering from mental illness or substanceuse disorders tend to have a higher rate of contact with the criminal justice system than others within the general population.

Social workers first joined the department during the summer of 2020 thanks to Slippery Rock University professor Yvonne Eaton-Stull, an expert in trauma and crisis intervention, and HTPD Chief Tom Vulakovich. The goal was to provide an added layer of expertise to the practice of law enforcement by introducing social workers who can offer support and ongoing case management as they enhance safety within the community.

As they continue to work to get the word out about the value they bring to law enforcement, the social services team has filled their calendar with events through the end of the year. Upcoming events include a booth at Santa's Sparktacular Holiday event on December 5th and a New Year's Eve raffle for HTSD students to win a ride to school in an HTPD vehicle. More information is highlighted on page 15.

Hampton has been a true success story in demonstrating the value of partnering law enforcement officers with social

workers, and other local townships have taken notice. Upon learning of the success in Hampton, several communities in the area are working on adding social workers to their law enforcement teams.

Physician Assistant Flexibility Closer to Taking Effect and Diwali Will Soon Become a State Holiday in PA by State Rep. Arvind Venkat

Physician assistants play a critical part of the healthcare system but face the barrier of needing redundant licenses based on whether their supervising physicians are either a Doctor of Medicine or a Doctor of Osteopathic Medicine. I am proud to sponsor legislation to eliminate this unnecessary burden. House Bills 2294 and 2295, allowing physician assistants to practice under either MDs or DOs, have both passed the state House of Representatives and are now in the state Senate for consideration.

As a practicing emergency physician, I know my fellow medical professionals want to help as many patients as possible, and these common sense bills eliminate a circumstantial barrier to performing their sworn duty. If enacted into law, these bills will make it easier for physician assistants to continue their important clinical work in our state.

I'm also pleased to see the companion legislation (S.B. 402) to my bill designating Diwali, the Festival of Lights, as an official Pennsylvania holiday be signed into law by Gov. Josh Shapiro. Diwali is celebrated by hundreds of thousands of Commonwealth residents of Hindu, Sikh, Jain and Buddhist background every year, and state recognition of this holiday fosters a stronger sense of community and inclusivity.
