Road Hazard

Due to the totality of the circumstances listed, in addition to Field Sobriety Testing a Drug Influence Evaluation was conducted by an IACP/NHSTA certified Drug Recognition Expert. Following the testing the driver was subsequently placed under arrest for suspicion of DUI.



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Hartwood's Industrial **Art Through Sound**

Allegheny County and the Allegheny County Parks Foundation have launched a free, selfguided audio tour for the Carol R. Brown Sculpture Garden at Hartwood Acres Park, Announced at the Parks Foundation's event, this immersive experience is the first of its kind in any Allegheny County Park.

County Executive Sara Innamorato praised the initiative, calling it a fabulous addition to Hartwood Acres and an exciting reason for both tourists and locals to visit. 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

He credits the success of this team with the discipline to



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
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
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


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Silver Medal, Golden Spirit: Chris Belch Shines at WPIAL Championships

Hampton senior Chris Belch delivered a remarkable performance at the WPIAL Boys' Track and Field Championships, capturing silver in the 1600-meter race with a stellar time of 4:16.33. His finish was not just a display of athleticism, but the culmination of years of perseverance and growth.

"Before I ran, I did a lot of swimming," Chris shared, reflecting on his early athletic pursuits. "But after I had run, I really enjoyed cross country." His journey began back in middle school track, yet it was in cross country that he discovered a lasting passion.

Chris attributes much of his success to his family and the supportive environment within the Hampton program. "A lot of credit is owed to my brothers for inspiring and pushing me," he said. "I got into running following my older brother Michael's footsteps, and I have always had motivation to challenge myself in every practice and race."

That drive was nurtured by his coaches—Mrs. Dietz for track and Mr. Longwell for cross country—who, alongside his teammates, helped shape his high school experience. "Growing with my teammates helped a lot because we trained and sweat alongside each other," Chris said. "Each season we had a team goal to stay disciplined."

Crossing the finish line at WPIALs was more than a medal moment—it was a defining one. "All I could think about was the

thrill of the race and how fortunate I was to continue my season," he said. At states, the emotions deepened. "It was more bittersweet, but being surrounded by my friends, family, and coaches helped me to realize how fortunate I am."

In recognition of his standout season and unwavering dedication, Chris was honored at a recent Hampton school board meeting—an acknowledgment of both his athletic talent and his character.

Looking ahead, Chris is setting his sights on new goals. "Currently, I am training the University of Pittsburgh's cross

country workouts," he explained. "I've spoken with the coach for the past year and we are trying to find me a spot on the team at some point this year, so to start the fall I will be running unattached at some college cross country meets." At Pitt, he will begin his studies in engineering, carrying forward both his discipline and ambition.

From middle school beginnings to a silver medal on the WPIAL stage, Chris Belch's story is one of heart and hustle.



To date, the task force completed 264 checkpoints and roving patrols. During these operations, 2,272 individuals were tested for driving under the influence (DUI), with 1,072 arrests made. These efforts reflected the task force's core mission: to save lives and reduce injuries on area roadways.

Sobriety checkpoints served as both a visible deterrent and a means of removing impaired drivers from the roads. In addition, roving and saturation patrols were deployed to identify and stop impaired drivers before they could endanger others. These mobile patrols often supported stationary checkpoints and were especially effective at catching drivers who attempted to bypass enforcement areas.

The North Hills DUI Task Force urged all drivers over the age of 21 to act re-

sponsibly and never drive while impaired. They reminded motorists to read all warning labels on prescription or over-the -counter medications and to plan ahead by arranging for a designated driver when consuming alcohol.

"The wooden shoes were particularly interesting," Lorraine


noted, recalling the eclectic mix of objects adorning the forest. "There was even a heavy machinery section, which stood out among the countless wooden, metal, and plastic plaques."

This global tradition of leaving signs dates back to 1942, when a homesick soldier stationed in Watson Lake posted a sign pointing toward his hometown. Since then, tens of thousands of travelers have added their own contributions, creating a mosaic of wanderlust, nostalgia, and creativity.



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Talking Together as a Community: **Protecting Pennsylvanians with Food Allergies**

by State Rep. Arvind Venkat

A wonderful, engaged group of neighbors turned out for my May 29 community town hall. We discussed the April 29 storms and the Public Utility Commission's investigation of the utilities' response, the importance of education funding, and the positive impact of immigration on our region, among other topics.

Residents also expressed many of the same concerns I hear in my neighborhood door knocking, including fears about how the Trump administration's budget bill will drastically cut Medicaid funding, and other actions at the federal level that have cut medical research and hurt our regional economy. I encourage everyone who is concerned to contact our federal representatives.

I also updated residents about the passage of my bills that would better educate the public about opioid overdose information and ban financial institutions from imposing fees for providing paper account statements - a practice that disproportionately burdens older consumers on fixed incomes.

In June, lawmakers and advocates rallied at the state Capitol to push for state Senate passage of legislation I introduced with Republican state Rep. Natalie Mihalek that would make our restaurants and other retail food facilities safer for more than 1.3 million Pennsylvanians with food allergies.

Our H.B. 77 – which passed the House in February with strong bipartisan support - would require PA restaurants and other retail food establishments to display employee-information posters and provide notice to customers regarding food allergy safety.
