Police Log

The Hampton Township Police Department is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life of our residents and guests by providing the very best in law enforcement services. The twenty-two officers and two civilian clerks take pride in serving the community in a professional and proactive manner. Thank you to the staff for helping to keep our community safe.

A summary of noteworthy incidents that occurred are listed below. These incident statistics included, but WERE NOT LIMITED TO, the following between the dates of 6/10/2019 - 7/15/2019:

Theft from Vehicle

On July 3, 2019, starting at 6:48 a.m., Hampton Township Police took multiple reports of thefts from unlocked vehicles. 

Local Students Attend Esteemed Leadership Program

igh school juniors, Geoffrey Gravitte and Rege Kramer, attended the prestigious Keystone Boys State at Shippensburg College in June. Geoffrey was nominated and sponsored by former State Representative, retired Lt. Col. from the U.S. Marine Corps, and American Legion/Veterans of Foreign Wars Rege was member, Hal English. nominated and sponsored by Hampton High School Social Studies Teacher, retired Lt. Col. from the U.S. Army, and Legion Post 296, Mr. Thomas Gleason.

Boys/Girls State are summer leadership and citizenship programs sponsored by The American Legion and the American Legion Auxiliary for high school juniors. The programs began in 1937 and are held in each of the U.S. states excluding Hawaii. The selection is highly competitive, and the population of students attending represents the top talent from across the state.

Program participants are divided into subgroups referred to as cities.

The citizens of each of these cities elect mock municipal officials and representatives to the mock state legislature. Many programs also have a country level as well. The participants also elect state officials, such as governor, lieutenant governor, and other state-level officials mirroring their actual State. The legislature meets to organize, elect leaders, and to pass bills, in a way that is similar to how their actual state legislature operates. Some programs tend to have a more traditional education focus, providing speakers and training throughout the week and then concluding with mock political functions. Other programs take a more hands-on approach by running the mock government activities all week. Being elected to a high office during the event can be an important distinguishing achievement for college or Military Academy admissions.

Geoffrey remarked, "Keystone Boys State is unique in that it is not only comprised of the State's best scholars, but these scholars also have the best leadership skills. The program gave us a taste of what could be our future of leading our country by passing legislation in a

With the apparent success and wild popularity of the program, the plan is to



3:00-7:00 on Wednesdays. The vending fee for the season is a nominal \$100, a fee that vendor, Bruce Story-Camp called, "a great deal" and lower than the going rate for vending.

Bob Rose and Braelyn Mersenheiner, from Chocolate Moonshine, were present to sell their fudge. "We also sell chocolate bars," said Rose, "but they melt in the sun."

Next to Rose is usually his son, Wombi, of the card company, Lovepop. Wombi's handmade, "slicegami," cards are nationally known and have even won the backing of Kevin O'leary from Shark Tank. Lovepop was not present that day due to the weather.

Hampton residents, Tod and Kaden Herchenroether, were there shopping for produce at the Freedom Farms truck. "I like the idea of supporting local businesses," said Tod Herchenroether. "Its kind of like a community gathering place."

Despite the bad weather, Freedom Farms was too busy to interview, but one woman buying corn said that their "produce is great."

Also present were Al and Sam Alawartani from Sam's Gyro and Bruce Story-Camp from Pip & Lola's, who come all the way from Homestead to sell their homemade, organic soaps. Story-Camp said he is hoping to see the market grow overtime and has tried to involve more of his friends who are vendors. Anyone who stops by their tent will get a free sample as the motto in their shop is, "no one

leaves empty handed."


The Hampton team received the *Leader-ship Award*. All of the other teams at camp voted on which team they would want to be on if they weren't




