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
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Perrucci Finishes First in National Baton Twirling Competition

A summary of noteworthy incidents that occurred between June 15th —July 22nd, 2018:

Traffic Stop/Drug Arrest


On July 19, at 11:26 p.m., a Hampton Township officer initiated a traffic stop on a vehicle on Walters Road after observing an equipment violation. Upon making contact with the vehicle occupants, the officer detected the odor of marijuana emanating from the vehicle. Upon investigation, the officer found drugs and paraphernalia in the vehicle.

Gas Leak

On July 19, at 3:27 p.m., Hampton Township Police and Fire Department were dispatched to a business on Mount Royal Boulevard for a strong odor of natural gas within the establishment. Upon arrival, it was discovered that a vent to the boiler was standing open, which was creating the odor. The Fire Department remained on scene to help alleviate the hazardous conditions.

Traffic Stop/Wanted Person

On July 12, at 2:57 p.m., a Hampton Township officer was monitoring a 40 mph speed zone on Route 8, when a vehicle traveled through at 62 mph. The officer then initiated a traffic stop on the vehicle. Upon speaking with the driver, the male





driver advised the officer that he did not have his driver's license with him, but did provide a name and date of birth. Upon running the provided name and date of birth, the officer observed that the male in the driver's photo associated with the provided identification did not appear to be the same individual that was driving the vehicle. The operator was asked multiple times to confirm his identity, and insisted that he was the individual he had provided information for. The officer was able to obtain photographs of tattoos for the individual that the driver had provided information for, which did not match the tattoos that were on the vehicle operator. Through further investigation, the officer was able to obtain a name and date of birth for a related individual. Upon running the name and date of birth for this other individual, the driver's license photograph matched the vehicle operator and the male was found to have

a warrant from the Allegheny County Sheriff's Department. The driver was taken into custody and transported to the Allegheny County Jail.

Theft from Vehicle

On July 9, at 7:20 p.m., Hampton Township Police received a report of a theft that had occurred from a vehicle on South Villa Drive. The theft had occurred sometime during the overnight hours, at which time loose change was stolen from the unlocked car.

**Residents are encouraged to lock their vehicles at all times and to refrain from leaving valuables within unoccupied vehicles.

DUI Arrest

On June 15, at 9:33 p.m., a Hampton Township officer observed a motorcycle approaching the intersection of Ferguson Road and Mount Royal Boulevard. As the motorcycle was coming to a stop at the stop sign, the operator nearly dumped the bike. The operator remained at the stop sign for a few moments to get the motorcycle balanced. Once the operator continued, the officer observed the motorcycle to be driving in excess of the posted speed limit, and traveled over the double yellow line. Upon initiating a traffic stop on Mount Royal Boulevard, the operator was observed to be unsteady on his feet while walking around the motorcycle. The officer detected an odor of alcohol emanating from the operator's breath while they were speaking. The operator was unable to complete field sobriety tests as had been explained and was arrested for suspicion of DUI.

On June 17, at 4:42 p.m., a Hampton Township officer observed a vehicle driving on Wickline Road in an erratic manner. Upon stopping the vehicle, the officer asked the driver for a driver's license, at which time the driver handed over a debit card. The operator was asked again for driver information, and handed the officer a driver's license. The operator was observed to have bloodshot, watery eyes, was sweating profusely, and was slurring her words. The officer also detected the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from the vehicle. The operator was unable to complete field sobriety tests as had been explained and demonstrated and was placed under arrest for DUI.

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

On June 20, at 1:28 a.m., Hampton Township Police were dispatched to Sheetz for an intoxicated male who was reported to have struck a pole in the parking lot with his vehicle. A responding officer intercepted the vehicle in question on Route 8 and initiated a traffic stop. As the vehicle was turning into a parking lot, the officer observed the driver to nearly strike a light pole. Upon making contact with the operator, the officer immediately detected the odor of alcohol emanating from the vehicle. The operator was observed to have glassy eyes and slurred speech. The officer also observed paint transfer on the front of the vehicle that appeared to be consistent with the pole in the parking lot that had been struck. The operator was asked to perform field sobriety tests, which he was unable to complete as had been explained and demonstrated. The operator was placed under arrest for suspicion of DUI.

On June 23, at 12:19 a.m., a Hampton Township officer initiated a traffic stop on a vehicle, on Harts Run Road, after observing the vehicle weave out of its lane of travel on three occasions. Upon making contact with the operator, the

officer detected the odor of alcohol emanating from the vehicle. The officer also observed the driver to have bloodshot, glassy eyes and his speech was slurred. The operator was unable to complete field sobriety tests as had been explained and demonstrated and was subsequently placed under arrest for suspicion of DUI. The officer also located drug paraphernalia within the vehicle during the traffic stop.

On June 25, at 11:09 p.m., a Hampton Township officer initiated a traffic stop on Route 8 after the vehicle in question was observed to be weaving out of its lane of travel. The vehicle was also observed to be traveling well under the posted speed limit and nearly drove off of the roadway just prior to the traffic stop. The officer detected the odor of alcohol emanating from the operator's breath as they were speaking, as well as slurred speech. The operator was unable to stand without swaying and losing balance. The operator was unable to complete field sobriety tests and was arrested for DUI.

On June 29, at 5:45 p.m., Hampton Township Police were dispatched to a business on Route 8 for a fight. It was reported that a customer had also fled from the establishment without paying their bill. A description of the vehicle was provided to responding officers as well as a partial license plate number. One of the responding officers intercepted the vehicle on Route 8, near Duncan Avenue. Upon making contact with the operator, the officer asked

Township Continues ALICE Training

n Sunday, July 22nd, the Hampton Township Police Department partnered with the Hampton Township School District and the Winchester Thurston school to hold an Active Shooter Civilian Response Training, ALICE, for community members.

ALICE stands for: Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, and Evacuate. The training provides preparation and a plan for individuals and organizations on how to more proactively handle the threat of an aggressive intruder or active shooter event.

88 community members registered for the program. Among the participants were church members, parents, preschool owners, and business owners just to name a few. Assistant Superintendent of Hampton Township School District, Rebecca Cunningham explained, "Most active shootings happen in the workplace and the situation lasts on average of 5-8 minutes. The goal of the training is to promote situational awareness and to improve the chances of survival in such situations.

The participants handled the training very seriously."

Hampton School District paraprofessional, Julie Koehler, and her son, Michael, took the 4-hour training. "The training enabled me to become more equipped to deal with a situation should it occur. Previously I have had other training but I feel that repeat training reinforces the skills learned and increases your ability to preform in such situations, said Julie." Michael stated, "I thought the training was really well done. It taught

me how to access and address situations. It was also very helpful to practice by running the simulation in a controlled environment."

Chief of Police Tom Vulakovich commented, "The participants were really engaged, and we received a lot of positive comments about the training. The program provided basic information to bolster the confidence of the participants and to give them the necessary skills to avoid being hurt in an Active Shooter situation." He would like to inform the mem-

bers of the community that the Hampton Police will offer the training for any community groups/organizations in Hampton such as churches, businesses, schools, etc.

The ALICE training is a non-linear approach to survival that empowers the first responders, YOU, to make decisions. With its option-based tactics, ALICE has become the accepted response, versus the traditional "lockdown only" approach. The training ended with a poignant quote from Theodore Roosevelt, "In any moment of decision, the best thing you can do is the right thing, the next best thing is the wrong thing, and the worst thing you can do is nothing."

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



where they had been prior to the traffic stop. The operator advised that they had been golfing, but when asked, were unable to provide the officer the name of the golf course. The operator was then asked to step from the vehicle and was detained by officers. The operator had the odor of alcohol emanating from the vehicle. The operator was asked to submit to a preliminary breath test and agreed to do so, however, was unable to perform the breath test. The operator was then unable to perform field sobriety tests as had been explained and demonstrated and was placed under arrest for DUI. The operator was found to be the same person who left the establishment without paying their bill.

On July 7, at 11:43 a.m., a Hampton Township officer initiated a traffic stop on Route 8 after the officer observed the vehicle swerve out of its lane of travel on multiple occasions, nearly struck a guide rail, and was observed to be driving above the posted speed limit. Upon making contact with the driver, the officer detected the odor of alcohol emanating from the vehicle. After verifying that the operator was familiar with the English alphabet, the driver was asked to state the alphabet in its entirety, which they were unable to complete. The operator was then asked to submit to other field sobriety tests, which were explained and demonstrated prior to the driver's attempts. The officer detected the odor of a alcohol emanating from the vehicle. The operator was observed to have glassy, bloodshot eyes. When asked for an operator's license, the driver handed the officer her license and also began to hand the officer a debit card. 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

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

from 8 a.m. -3 p.m. According to Chief of Police Tom Vulakovich the purpose of this training is to minimize potential injuries and casualties against civilians and police officers during situations when there is an active shooter involved. The officers and members of the Special Response Team are trained to get to the scene, enter, and to find the perpetrator(s). Once the perpetrator(s) is found the officer's goal is to engage them and stop them. It is only after the shooter is stopped that casualties/injuries are addressed. The training was coordinated by Sergeant Rob Kirsopp.

Officer Frank Spiker of the Shaler Police Department said, "I think the training is great. The different scenarios in this training brought about the different decision-making processes that an officer needs to undergo in various situations whether it is a school shooting or otherwise." Hampton Police Officer, Ben Brown added, "This training transitions to any active shooter or other high stress situations that law enforcement can be faced with."

The training began with hours of classroom instruction followed by real life scenario training episodes. The officers move towards where the shooting noise is coming from. If the noise stops they are trained to move more cautiously. They also receive training such as how to clear corners and doorways using the slicing the pie process. This technique uses angles to the officer's advantage to minimize their exposure while clearing the rooms.

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

are all studying Mandarin and the program runs from July 1st to August 13th.

So far, the students have visited the cities of Beijing and Shanghai; however, most of their time has been spent in the coastal city of Xiamen. Each day, Luke has 8



hours of Chinese language and culture classes at the Xiamen University. A single day consists of a three hour language class, a two hour culture class, a one hour and a half tutor session with bilingual Xiamen University students, and finally an evening activity that could be interacting with local high school students


