# **Police Information**

The Hampton Township Police Department is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life of our residents and guests by providing the very best in law enforcement services. The 22 officers and two civilian clerks take pride in serving the community in a professional and proactive manner. Thank you to the staff for helping to keep our community safe.

#### **Retail Theft**



# **Bridge to Success**

iam Butler of Hampton earned Boy Scouts' highest rank when he successfully completed the Eagle Scout Board of Review on June 1, 2022. The son of Christine and Allen Butler, Liam led a team of youth and adult volunteers in constructing a bridge on Trail Pittsburgh's Dr. J Trail in North Park. The bridge Butler and his team built replaced an older, smaller bridge that had fallen into disrepair. While Butler's plan increases the physical length and width of the

bridge, it also sits much higher above the stream that it spans. This will eliminate the frequent flooding of the old bridge, keeping it drier and less subject to rot and damage. In addition to the new span being larger and sturdier, Butler's design also included rock armoring a ten-foot section of the trail leading to the bridge. Rock armoring is done by embedding large rocks into the trail and packing with dirt. The method provides a more



durable trail surface and serves to curb erosion near the bridge. The Dr J Trail is part of the North Park Freeride Area. NPFR is a unique outdoor freeride and skills area. NPFR consists of the Dr J Freeride Trail, the Freeride Skills Park, and a pump track.

A junior at Hampton High School, Butler has enjoyed a rewarding career in scouting. He credits his time and leadership opportunities in scouting as a member of Troop 17 in the Japeechen District for his many interests in many outdoor activities including skiing, mountain biking, cross country, and perhaps most exciting, taking flying lessons. Looking ahead, Butler would like to become a commercial airline pilot. His leadership skills and love of adventure gained in scouting will serve him well in that pursuit.


Community members started setting up as early as 8 a.m., in an effort to claim the best spot to enjoy the day. Sandy Stritz-

compassion for the homeless in our Pittsburgh region.

Light of Life Rescue Mission is a Pittsburgh nonprofit provid-

ing help to homeless and marginalized people since 1952. Located in the North Side of Pittsburgh, the nonprofit has several locations. The Voeghtly Street Mission, opened in 2020, provides emergency services for men, women and children. Last year, 8000 nights of shelter helped the homeless community.



# **Aquinas Academy Athletics' Breakout Year**

Aquinas Academy of Pittsburgh's 2021-2022 school year proved to be a breakout year for the high school athletic department. Eleven of thirteen Aquinas varsity teams competed in WPIAL playoffs, with two teams winning WPIAL Championship runners-up. Fifteen athletes competed individually in WPIAL Championships in cross country, tennis, and track and field. One team and three athletes competed in PIAA state tournaments with two individuals earning medals. The boys varsity fencing team won second place in the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Fencing Association's Championship

Of particular note, both the girls basketball and field hockey teams competed in the Single A WPIAL Championships for the first time in school history.

tournament.

Individual highlights include three All-WPIAL athletes, fifteen All-Section athletes, four field hockey WPIAL All-Stars, and three Roundball Classic All-Stars. Junior Vinnie Cugini is the first Aquinas athlete to win First Team All-State awards for basketball, score over 2,000 points, be named a Post-Gazette Class 1A Fab 5 for three seasons, and lead all of WPIAL basketball in scoring for three seasons.

Aquinas athletes also achieved success in the classroom. 32% of Aquinas Academy high school students earned the Aquinas Academy Scholar-Athlete Award for competing on at least one sports team and maintaining an unweighted GPA of 3.5 or higher for the first three quarters of the 2021 - 2022 school year.

Athletic success has led the Class of 2022 to boast the largest group of students in school history who will be competing in collegiate athletics in the fall. The six athletes are: John Griffith - Colgate University (Cross Country and Track), Elizabeth Hardy - The College of Wooster (Lacrosse), Emma Queen - Bates College (Field Hockey and Ice Hockey), Laura Richthammer - Houghton College (Soccer), Elizabeth Russell - Denison University (Basketball), and Patrick Veazey - Franciscan University (Cross Country and Track).

About 3,500 people in the U.S. are waiting for a heart transplant, and many will wait **more than six months**. Sadly, some will die before a heart becomes available to them.

Duane Reese, a Hampton resident for over 20 years, unexpectedly found himself on the transplant list. Reese, an avid participant in his childrens' softball games, and according to his sister-in-law, Kristy Resch, "a man with not only a big voice, but the biggest heart ever," was suddenly at the mercy of a donor.

What started as a brief illness in early 2022 led to a severe case

pneumonia, then in early May, Reese was diagnosed with end stage heart disease Duane was put medications which they hoped would buy him some time until a heart was available. After attending a softball tournament in Texas with his daughter, he returned to Pittsburgh and was immediately admitted to the hospital. Although the trip was risky, according to Reese, "I wouldn't change a thing – I would do it again!"

Duane received his new heart on July 9<sup>th</sup>, and he was released from the hospital on July 25<sup>th</sup>. As with many transplant patients, Reese would love to meet the family of his donor. Duane is extremely grateful. He said, "This situation made me realize how short life is, and you never know what really can happen at any time. You have to make the most and best of it and that is what I try to do for my babies. Now with this second chance I have I am going to try even harder to be a better husband, father, and person." Although the family knows they have a long road ahead of them, they are ready to face the challenge.






