closed businesses in this plaza, and no one should be parked in the lot after closing hours. Officers approached the vehicle and found a male in the driver seat and a female in the passenger seat, both seats were reclined. The male and female advised that they were going to take a nap. TIP OF THE MONTH:

With daylight saving time ending the first Sunday of November and the days growing shorter, people will be frequently coming and going from your house in the dark. That, combined with slippery surfaces in damp weather, increases the chances of people falling. Make sure exterior handrails are secured and easy to use. Bigger screws might be enough to tighten a wobbly connection between a rail and its support brackets. If steps are slippery, consider adding traction tape, which has sandpaper-like grit on top. Some types come with a reflective strip - a safety bonus.

Running Down a Title Championship

The Hampton High School boys' cross-country team made history as

Pennsylvania state champions! The team won the PI-AA class 2A state title in Hershey on November 4th with a score of 66, a first in program history, after successfully achieving a 3-peat of WPIAL championships. The Talbots defeated the defending champions, Grove City, who scored 89. Only two other Hampton teams have ever won a state title; boys' soccer and boys' swimming.

"It was a dream season, but one they worked for," explained Coach Dean Longwell. The key was to put in two months of running in the summer. They started optional runs 3 days/week in the third week of June and mandatory runs starting mid-August. The cross-country season is a long one. The boys won their section 11-0 and had four invitationals before the WPIAL playoffs and the PIAA state playoffs. "The whole team bought in this year. We had 8

guys there after practice stretching and doing core every day. Cross country is a sport where you have to have depth, and we all worked super hard together to make sure we achieved that," said the Talbots 1600M record holder, senior Dale Hall.

Hall placed 4th individually at states but was focused on a team win. "It's super fun and special, and really hard to put into words. The best way to put it is to go run over 700 miles with the goal of winning something, then have 16-18 minutes to decide if you win. Then you win it...just try and figure out how that feels," said Hall.

"We had this vision in 2021 and built on it; the top five runners that year were three sophomores and two freshmen," said Longwell. The team came in 11th in 2020. They experienced significant growth over the last four years. The top guys put in extra mileage over the summer and during the week in the fall. Training also included psychological and visual techniques. "We've had solid teams before and usually have individual qualifiers but it was fun watching it all come to fruition. It was a cohesive format for success," said Longwell. He explained that they don't necessarily have to be great athletes but lead by example and put in the work.

"The transition through the past four years has been huge. I went from the annoying freshman kid to veteran leader. I do my best to encourage the underclassmen, take some time to get to know them no matter how competent they are, and encourage them towards improvement. Athletically,

I've gone from one of the slowest kids on the middle school cross country team to a multiple time state medalist and a future collegiate athlete. God had blessed me abundantly these four years and it is so special to see how much others' investment in

me has paid off," explained Hall. The other senior athletes are Layne Haught and Jacob Bonnar. Both athletes plan to pursue their athleticism in college, Haught at St. Bonaventure University and Bonnar at Duquesne University.

covery until a fortunate meeting on September 17th at the home of another Hampton resident, Tim Wolfson. It was there that the Kernick family was introduced to writer Lainy Carslaw.

Carslaw agreed to look over the manuscript and knew it had potential right away. "I read a lot of work as an editor," said Carslaw. "But Cindy's story

grabbed me immediately."



That story began back in 1998 when Kernick's friend and colleague approached her with a potential case. But there was a catch: the case would have to be *Pro bono* and would involve a massive amount of work for the already overloaded lawyer. But once she learned the details, she could not shy away.

The book is an account of Kernick's work on the historic Teenie Harris case. Harris is a household name in Pittsburgh but in case you are hearing it for the first time— he was one of the first Black photographers, working for the *Pittsburgh Courier* in the 1930s. His photos captured

the Hill District in its heyday—a community during a moment of time filled with so much promise, so much prosperity, and later, so much turmoil. His photographs drew the attention of many, including the man who would seek to rob him of his life's work.

Dennis Morgan sold and profited from Harris's photographs for years, and it would be up to Kernick to return those historic photos to their rightful owner.

In her memoir, A Lawyer's Promise: The Story of the Teenie Harris Negatives, the reader will learn so much about the legacy of Teenie Harris, Pittsburgh's history, Kernick's grueling job as his lawyer, and how the case unfolded.

"It's an amazing story that deserves to be told," says Carslaw. "I am so honored that the family trusted me with this manuscript. As a lifelong Pittsburgher and fellow writer, I feel compelled to do anything I can to help this story get published—for Cindy and for Teenie."



Veteran's Day 5K

Fiscus Becomes All Time Scoring Record Holder

Hampton High School senior Luke Fiscus started playing soccer around the age of 4 and has now left his mark in Hampton history, finishing the soccer season with accolades and a school scoring record. In his position as striker, Fiscus broke the Hampton single season scoring record in the first round of the state playoffs, scoring 37 goals in a season. In the game against Bradford, Fiscus scored three goals to push past the record of 36 goals set in 2005 by his current assistant coach Jedd Cordisco. Cordisco remains the all-time scoring record holder with 99 goals across four high school seasons.

"My coach congratulated me a lot and told me the record would last a long time," said Fiscus, the 2year captain of the Hampton boys' soccer team. "I did not think there

was any possibility of the record until the playoffs. I cared more about doing well as a team than my individual stats," explained Fiscus. The first-round exit from the playoffs last year was motivation for Fiscus to train even harder this year. Fiscus said, "We (the team) support each other by trying to be as motivating and helpful as possible so everyone is able to play at their best."

In addition to the school record, Fiscus was awarded WPSCA All-State, Section 3A All-WPIAL (with teammates Coleman Docherty and Oliver Spinola), 3A All-Section (with teammates Hudson Struble, Conner Killmeyer, Coleman Docherty, and Oliver Spinola) and Section Player of the Year. Their head coach Matt McAwley was awarded Section Coach of the Year.

In addition to Hampton soccer, Fiscus is Captain and plays center back for Steel City soccer and is kicker for the Hampton High School football team.







On 11/22/2023, HTPD were dispatched to McNeal Road for a report of a single vehicle colliding into a pole. Upon arrival, the vehicle was off the roadway in a yard with severe disabling damage to the driver's side rear door/quarter panel area. A Duquesne Light pole was sheared because of the crash and was hanging over the roadway. Both the driver and passenger denied any injuries. The accident was said to have happened when the driver was traveling down a hill on McNeal Road towards William Flinn Highway and attempted to negotiate a left turn. He then lost control due to the wet road conditions, causing the vehicle to slide off the roadway and into the pole. Leo's Towing towed the vehicle. Duquesne Light arrived on the scene to repair the pole. There was property damage done to the yard on McNeal Road.

Three Vehicle Accident

On 11/2/2023, HTPD were dispatched to the area of William Flinn Highway and Old Route 8 for a report of a threevehicle accident. There were no injuries, and two tows were needed.

Unit 1 stated they were traveling southbound on William Flinn Highway in the right-hand lane when the vehicle directly in front began to execute a right-hand turn onto Old Route 8. Unit 1 saw the turn signal of the vehicle and continued slowing down. Unit 1 believed the vehicle completed the execution of the turn but did not fully turn into the intersection. Unit 1 then collided with Unit 2. Unit 1 sustained disabling damage to the 11 o'clock position and was towed from the scene by Leo's. Both the driver and passenger were wearing their seatbelts. No airbags were deployed. Both parties denied any injuries. Unit 1 estimated their speed to be approximately 30 MPH.

Unit 2 stated they were traveling southbound on William Flinn Highway in the right-hand lane. Unit 2 was attempting to make a right-hand turn onto Old Route 8 when they slowed down because they were unsure if they would be able to execute the turn due to a vehicle in the intersection. As Unit 2 was executing the turn, Unit 1 struck Unit 2 in the 5 o'clock position. Unit 2 received moderate damage and was towed from the scene by Leo's. Unit 2 was wearing their seatbelt, and no airbags were deployed. Unit 2 denied any injuries.

Unit 3 stated they were stopped on Old Route 8 waiting to turn onto William Flinn Highway. Unit 3 observed Unit 2 attempting to make a right-hand turn onto Old Route 8. Unit 3 witnessed Unit 1 come out of nowhere, struck the right-hand curb as they were attempting to stop, and then struck Unit 2, which sent Unit 2 into Unit 3. Due to the impact of Unit 2 into Unit 3, Unit 2 spun almost 360 degrees and came to final rest facing northbound. Unit 3 sustained minor damage to the 11 o'clock position. No airbags were deployed, no injuries were sustained, and Unit 3 was able to be driven from the scene.

There was roadway evidence that coincides with the statement of Unit 3, officer observed scars and marks on the curb and damage to the entire passenger side of Unit 1. Due to the collision, there were fluids on the roadway. HFD arrived and cleaned the fluid and debris. The MS-4 was then transported to the station by HFD and logged. All parties had information exchanged at the scene.

year old college senior when he was diagnosed with testicular cancer, which can affect male fertility. According to Gault, "It started as a small lump in my breast, and after testing, I was told I needed to have surgery and then chemotherapy." Joseph met Jeana during his chemo treatment. Gault recalled, "The basket contents were unbelievable, and so well thought out. A common occurrence when going through chemo is hair loss. Your scalp can become extremely sensitive, and laying your head on anything is painful. The basket had silk pillowcases which were amazing, a colorful chemo hat that totally fit my personality and so many other things. I felt like the basket was made specifically for me." According to Watenpool, "You wouldn't believe how often that happens - it's a God thing!"

Joe finished chemo in December of 2014; by February of 2015, he was officially deemed in remission. Cancer free for 9 years now, in 1 more year, he will no longer have to do any more follow-ups!

At the time of diagnosis, Joe had been dating Megan for all of a week. They stayed together through it all, and in November of 2017, they were married. They now have a daughter, and a son on the way! Joseph and Megan Price-Gault continue to be active with Mrs. Claus. According to Watenpool, "Their friendship and support is amazing."
