The team was led by a strong group of seniors: Courtney Coholich, Valerie Fischer, Sammy Joyce, Abby Wolf, Maude Antol, Grace Kleunder, Molly Wojcik, and Amanda Moser. Courtney, Amanda, and junior Logan Nicklas made all section and all WPIAL. Junior Lanie McLaughlin also made all section. The team's leading scorer was Logan followed by Courtney. Head coach Bill Paholich said, "One of the keys to the season was Sammy Joyce and junior Rylee Obringer moving to the center back position and stabilizing the defense. We got a nice surprise when freshman Sophie Kelly stepped in to play goal at the halfway mark of the season and played very well. We had contributions from a lot of players this season and I have 12 juniors who will step up to lead next season."

In the WPIAL playoff run, the Hampton girls beat Elizabeth Forward with a score 3 -0 in a hailstorm. Next, they prevailed to win in overtime against Ambridge on a Courtney Coholich penalty kick. The semifinal round was next and Hampton lost to Mars 1-0. The team won their state playin a game against South Fayette 4-3 in overtime. Junior Lanie McLaughlin scored the tying goal with 2 minutes left in regulation and also scored the game winner five minutes into overtime. When asked about the season, Lanie responded, "This season has been amazing! I feel like making it to WPIAL playoffs and then states has reminded us just what we can really

Police Log

The Hampton Township Police Department is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life of our residents and guests by providing the very best in law enforcement services. The twenty-two officers and two civilian clerks take pride in serving the community in a professional and proactive manner. Thank you to the staff for helping to keep our community safe.

A summary of noteworthy incidents that occurred between October 23rd , 2018—November 19th , 2018:

DUI Arrest/Vehicle Accident

On October 23, 2018 at 10:52 a.m., Hampton Township Police were dispatched to East Hardies Road for a single vehicle rollover accident. Upon the officer's arrival, the operator was still sitting in the vehicle, and appeared to be confused, with slurred speech. The officer also detected the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from the operator. The accident appeared to have occurred when the involved vehicle was negotiating a bend in the roadway. It traveled off of the roadway while trying to negotiate a bend and struck a tree stump, which caused the vehicle to rollover. The vehicle was towed from the scene and the operator was transported to the hospital.

On November 4, 2018 at 3:15 a.m., Hampton Township officers responded to Route 8, near East Hardies Road, for a disabled vehicle. Upon arrival, the vehicle was found have substantial damage to the front of it, as well as airbag deployment. Immediately upon making contact with the driver and sole occupant, the responding officer detected the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from the vehicle. The driver stated that they lost control of their vehicle and struck a concrete barrier dividing the northbound and southbound lanes. The driver

showed visible signs of impairment, and was asked to perform field sobriety tests. The operator was unable to complete the field sobriety tests as had been explained and demonstrated and was subsequently placed under arrest for suspicion of driving under the influence.



On October 26, 2018 at 12:43 a.m., Hampton Township Police responded to the intersection of Route 8 and West Bardonner Road for single vehicle accident into a pole. It appeared that the vehicle had been traveling south on Route 8 when it left the roadway and struck the pole. Upon speaking with the operator of the vehicle, they claimed that they did not remember how the crash happened. Responding medics removed the driver from the vehicle and transported the individual to the hospital. The fire department was also on scene and assisted with traffic control and with cleaning up debris. The vehicle had to be towed from the scene due to damage.

On October 29, 2018 at 6:19 p.m., Hampton Township officers responded to West Hardies Road, at Richland Road, for a two-vehicle accident. After speaking with the vehicle operators and witnesses, it appeared as thought the accident occurred when the operator of one unit was stopped in the roadway, waiting to turn left, when the driver that was traveling behind the other vehicle was unable to stop their vehicle in time to avoid a collision. The operator swerved into the oncoming lane, resulting in a head-on collision with another vehicle. Both vehicles had to be towed from the scene.

On November 1, 2018 at 6:45 p.m., Hampton Police were dispatched to the area of West Hardies at Wildwood Rd. for a report of a two-vehicle accident with unknown injuries. It was determined that one driver attempted to make a left-hand turn onto West Hardies Road from a side

street, which resulted in a collision with another vehicle that was traveling on West Hardies Road. Both vehicles had to be towed from the scene due to disabling damage. One operator








Blessed Trinity Takes Cross Country Championship



n't be where I am today." Tyler is also a Hampton Honor Roll student and has played varsity baseball all 4 years at Hampton.



Every month until the 90th celebration, we will offer information about Troop 17 happenings. Stay tuned. There will be more activities to share.




