

Vehicle Accident/DUI Arrest

🛞 On 12/10/2022 at 11:35 a.m., a HTPD officer were on scene of a motor vehicle accident at the intersection of East Bardonner Road at William Flinn Highway. The officers on scene observed three vehicles to be involved in the collision. The operator of the first involved vehicle advised that he was traveling west on East Bardonner Road. He stated that the second vehicle was stopped in the west bound travel lane of East Bardonner Road at the intersection with William Flinn Highway. He stated that the third vehicle was stopped in front of the other involved car. The driver struck the second vehicle from the rear, causing it to strike the rear of the third unit. The operator was also found to be in possession of an open alcoholic beverage within the vehicle and was taken into custody for suspicion of DUI. 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The Super Bowl of Fundraisers: Girl Scout Cookies!

t's time to put your New Year's resolution on pause because Girl Scout cookie season is upon us and the troops in Hampton Township are carrying on the 100+ year tradition. To clarify, your great ancestors weren't digging into a box of perfectly round cookies laced with chocolate stripes and coconut flakes sprinkled on top. In 1917, just five years after the organization was founded, a Girl Scout troop in Muskogee, Oklahoma held a homemade cookie sale in their high school cafeteria to raise funds for troop activities. Word spread fast (yes, even in 1917 without cell phones and emails) and Girl Scout troops around the nation began preheating their ovens and planning their own cookie sales to raise funds for their troop.

By 1934, the national Girl Scout organization partnered with commercial bakers who soon developed "Cooky Mints" whose name would be changed 29 times before landing on "Thin Mints." Hampton resident Evelyn Fabian remembers the crisp chocolaty cookies as "Chocolate Mint," the name the cookie held from 1951-1963.

Fabian's title was not just a Girl Scout cookie connoisseur; she was the Northgate Cookie Chairman in the 1970's. "My title brought many responsibilities from upholding the organization's mission of making the world a better place to collecting money and distributing all the cookie orders to the troops in 15 local neighborhoods," Fabian said. "Mind you, this was before electronic services and the majority of orders were paid for in cash, but I was lucky to work with a well-organized group of people. We were working together for a good reason."

Not only does the position require a lot of integrity, but also willpower! The Fabian house acted as a cookie storage unit during cookie season while the leaders would pick up orders needed. "My house was always full of cookies and I was a mother of 6 children- all of whom loved cookies," Fabian said. "If someone opened a box, we had to pay!"

Girl Scouts pride themselves on being ahead of their time, so Fabian was happy to the program see evolve throughout the years. "If the technology to sell online is there and provides a helpful and safe resource, then I encourage people to use it," Fabian said. "Change can be good, especially in cookie form!"



There's a Girl Scout cookie for every palate and this year, the Girl Scouts are kicking off the season with a new cookie, the Raspberry Rally, which has garnered the excitement of many.

Sisters Athena Smith, a Daisy in Troop 16720, and Luna Smith, a Daisy in Troop 50921, had the opportunity to try the new cookie and described it as "tasting like a sugar rush!" They enjoyed the cookie so much, that they each bought a box for themselves, putting each one step closer to achieving the aggressive goal they each set.

Sweet tooth aside, girls also look forward to the cookie season because it gives them opportunities to bond with their troop. "I joined Girl Scouts to meet new friends and experience the activities," Keira Pater, Brownie in Troop 51275 said. "We have been spending time at troop meetings making signs that we will hang at our cookie booth."

Girl Scout cookies have both a rich history and flavor that give us a high-minded excuse to indulge. Hustle to your local troop's cookie table and stock up on these once-a-year treats, or visit <u>https://www.girlscouts.org/en/cookies.html</u> to find a troop selling cookies in your local area.





Their collection kicked off on January 14th with over a dozen collection sites, including Hair Doctors at 5475 William Flinn Highway in Gibsonia. Folks can drop off prom gowns, prom shoes, jewelry, neckties and bow ties at the sites through March 18th.

Michelle Simon and her husband founded Bless A Dress several years ago, after they discovered that some girls had trouble attending prom due to financial circumstances. Since then, they have "grown by leaps and bounds every year!" Simon explained. Last year, nearly 800 girls shopped for prom dresses, with caring volunteers assisting them and offering support.

"This year, we decided to add ties and bowties to our collection," Michelle said. Girls shopping can choose a matching tie to give their prom date. Michelle added, "We are so grateful to the businesses that help us collect dresses, the friends who help spread the word about the event, and every person who volunteers. We couldn't do it without everybody helping!"

There is no cost or income requirements for high school girls to participate in Bless A Dress. Topaz Thimble, LLC helps with on-site alterations. "Every girl deserves to feel like a princess on prom day, no matter her circumstances or ability to afford a gown," Michelle added.

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



Noteworthy incidents and events:


