Police Information

The Hampton Township Police Department (HTPD) is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life of our residents and guests by providing the very best in law enforcement services. Thank you to the staff for helping to keep our community safe.

A summary of noteworthy incidents that occurred are listed below. These incident statistics included, but WERE NOT LIMITED TO, the following between the dates of 12/14/2023—1/12/2024:

DUI

On 01/11/2024, 911 dispatched HTP to the Southern area of William Flinn Hwy. for an erratic driver who was entering Hampton Township.

The vehicle was observed at the intersection of McCully Rd. and William Flinn Hwy. The vehicle was weaving within its lane, as well as failing to maintain its lane of travel. A traffic stop was initiated on the vehicle at Citizens Bank and the operator of the vehicle drove across the median to get into Citizens Bank.

After standard field sobriety tests were performed the driver was placed under arrest for suspicion of driving under the influence.

Vehicle Accident

On 01/05/2024, an officer observed the aftermath of a two-vehicle motor vehicle accident on Duncan Avenue at Pine Creek Golf. Both vehicles were blocking the east travel lane of Duncan Avenue.

UNIT #1 said she was traveling east on Duncan Avenue, behind UNIT #2 when UNIT #2 stopped in the lane of travel to make a left turn. She said that she took her attention off the roadway and struck the rear of UNIT #2. The officer observed the seatbelt actuator to be fired and the driver seatbelt to be locked in the extended position. Moderate damage was observed to the front bumper and hood. The operator was treated and transported to the hospital by Shaler Hampton EMS. UNIT #1 was removed from the scene by Zang Auto.

UNIT #2 said that he was traveling east on Duncan Avenue. He said that he stopped in the lane of travel to make a left turn into the parking lot of Pine Creek Golf when he was struck from behind by UNIT #1. No air bags were observed to be deployed and the operator said that he was wearing his safety belt at the time of the collision. Moderate damage was observed to the rear bumper area of UNIT #2. The operator denied injuries and denied medical evaluation on scene. UNIT #2 was driven from the scene under its own power.

Hampton Township Police accident forms were completed. The call was then cleared.

On 01/05/2024, HTP were dispatched to the area of 4463 Mt Royal Boulevard for a report of a single-vehicle accident with unknown injuries. It was then updated that the vehicle was smoking, and the caller was unable to get the driver out of the vehicle.

Officers arrived with Shaler Hampton EMS and contacted the driver who was still in the vehicle but conscious and alert. Shaler Hampton EMS and Officers were able to get the operator out of the vehicle and he was able to walk to the stretcher. The driver had been wearing his seatbelt and multiple airbags had gone off from the impact. The vehicle had gone off the road, through an anchor wire for a utility pole, and into a

In speaking with the driver, he was not sure what caused him to crash. He stated he may have lost control of his vehicle. The area where the crash occurred was on a hard bend in the road. The road curves to the right and the vehicle had gone straight, without turning. The driver was transported to UPMC Passavant Hospital for treatment.

Duquesne Light was notified of the damage to the pole anchor. They arrived on the scene and confirmed there was no immediate danger. Zang's Towing was notified and responded to remove the vehicle. The vehicle had sustained heavy damage to the front end and had multiple airbags deployed.

Game Laws

On 01/01/2024, HTP responded to Indian Spring Lane for a report of a deer that had been shot and was dead on the complainant's property. The resident advised the deer had since been retrieved and this all happened 30 minutes before calling.

Based on the described location of the deer, it would have run onto the property from a back wooded area. The resident

For the first time, the Hampton High School Drama Club entered the Prime Stage Drama Awards. 



Sgt. Kirsopp elected to retire after a long career with the Hampton Police Department. He was very involved in the SRT (Special Response Team), which most civilians recognize as SWAT, and was in charge of training. "That man is a true warrior. The courage and fortitude he showed on the job, he shows in his battle with cancer," explained Hampton Police Chief Tom Vulakovich. "He will be really missed on the job, not only as a co-worker, but as a friend."

Kirsopp is a former army ranger and is part of the IATW foundation. When Monteleone found out that Kirsopp's cancer returned, he wanted to help and decided to help financially with

the Cabin Fever concert. The IATW foundation offers no cost therapeutic programs for both physical and mental health, outreach activities which include an ice hockey and softball teams, outdoor activities like hunting and fishing, and special events to raise money for veterans in the area that are struggling. Monteleone is the only paid employee of the foundation and 72 cents of every dollar goes directly to help veterans.

"I hope the community comes out and supports Rob and his family," said Monteleone. Ten thousand dollars were raised at last year's concert and Monteleone is hoping to double that number this year.

Updates for Hampton Township Residents

In 2024, I am continuing to advocate for legislation that alleviates medical debt, prevents gun violence, preserves reproductive rights, invests in our first responders and public schools, and ensures every eligible voter has access to the ballot box.

While the House passed the Medical Debt Relief Act that I prime sponsored, there is still work to do to get this vital legislation enacted into law. I continue to work with bipartisan colleagues and Gov. Josh Shapiro to pass this bill that will help thousands of Pennsylvanians.

To prevent gun violence, we must pass legislation requiring background checks and providing for extreme risk protection orders. Both bills addressing these issues have passed the House with my support and await a vote in the Senate. Preserving reproductive rights is critical to protecting individual liberty and bodily autonomy. We are seeing the dire health consequences for women in other states when these rights are reversed. I remain committed to passing legislation to protect abortion rights and reproductive health care.

In 2023, I voted for a state budget that made historic investments in public education and advocated successfully for grants for the Hampton Police Department. This year, I will continue to work with my fellow legislators to ensure our first responders and public schools receive the resources they need.

Finally, by expanding access to the ballot box, we allow all eligible citizens to make their voices heard. I will continue to advocate for the protection of mailin voting and am a prime sponsor of legislation to enact early in-person voting, as well.

Regulating AI Technology



With the rise of artificial intelligence (AI) we begin living in a new era of revolutionary technology involving the science of giving machines the capability to be able to think and perform like a human being. The use of

these technologies can certainly be beneficial, but it brings with it new societal challenges which need to be addressed. I am proud to take part in bipartisan efforts in Harrisburg aimed at regulating these technologies to monitor and guide the growth within appropriate confines while minimizing the risks they are associated with through proper actions.

One piece of legislation would create a registry to stockpile information of any firm that has or intends to create software containing algorithmic logic. Creating this AI registry would give law enforcement and citizens the ability to counter the outcomes of fraudulent usage of these technologies.

One field that needs regulatory action regarding AI is the health insurance field. AI is rapidly being implemented in their utilization review processes. It is essential for all Pennsylvanians to be in the know regarding what involvement AI had in the approval or denial of their claims.

Finally, a third piece of legislation would act against AI being used to create content to be used for fraudulent misrepresentation of a political candidate. Voters deserve accurate information on political candidates to make informed decisions for their best interests, protecting Pennsylvanians against deception is an important part of making a safer world for all.

Placing guardrails on artificial intelligence throughout Pennsylvania is a step forward in protecting our communities and vulnerable citizens. As the world wanders into a new technological frontier our state Legislature must take appropriate actions.
