The Hampton Township Police Department is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life of our residents and guests by providing the very best in law enforcement services. The twenty-two officers and two civilian clerks take pride in serving the community in a professional and proactive manner. Thank you to the staff for helping to keep our community safe.

A summary of noteworthy incidents that occurred are listed below. These incident statistics included, but WERE NOT LIMITED TO, the following between the dates of 12/22/2020—1/20/2021:

Accident/DUI Arrest

On December 23, 2020 at 10:39 pm, Hampton Township Police (HTP) responded to Route 8, at Harts Run Road, for a two-vehicle accident. The accident occurred when one vehicle was stopped in the southbound turning lane of Route 8, waiting to turn left onto Harts Run Road, when the vehicle was struck from behind. While speaking to the operator of one vehicle, the officer observed indications of impairment. The operator submitted to field sobriety tests, which they failed to complete as had been explained and demonstrated. The operator was subsequently placed under arrest for suspicion of DUI. One vehicle had to be towed from the scene due to extensive damage.

On January 9, 2021 at 6:07 pm, HTP responded to the area of William Flinn Highway near Clearview Road for a report of a disabled vehicle in the roadway. Upon arrival, officers discovered a vehicle that had struck a large curb on the side of the roadway, which had caused disabling damage to the vehicle. The driver showed visible signs of impairment and was subsequently placed under arrest for suspicion of DUI. The vehicle was towed from the scene.

COVID Vaccine: Round Two Underway for Local Healthcare Providers

ast month, Hampton Township Council Member and family medicine physician, Dr. Joseph Dougherty, shared his experience as a front-line recipient of the first of two shots in the Pfizer Covid-19 vaccine regimen. After receiving the second dose in early January, Dr. Dougherty remains confident in the vaccine's safety and efficacy, and he encourages all who are able to get the vaccine to consider it. Of the second shot, he reports, "I

no effects other than a sore arm at the injection site. My wife, [Dr. Lela Dougherty], had her second shot as well, and she developed muscle aches for about 12 hours." Since then, both have had no other side effects, and they

feel optimistic about the vaccine's potential for getting the nation on the road back to normal. A major step on that road is vaccinating all healthcare workers, many of whom work within large healthcare systems that are providing the vaccine to their employ-





ees. For the hundreds of unaffiliated healthcare workers in our region, however, access to the vaccine is a bit more complicated, requiring a dedicated and sometimes frustrating search. To streamline the process, a group of local physicians took matters into their own hands and created a series of clinics specifically aimed at vaccinating unaffiliated and private healthcare workers. The clinics have been a true team effort between Hampton's Dr. Lela Dougherty and Dr. Kirsten Lin of Family Matters Direct Primary Care and their partners at Direct Care Physicians of Pittsburgh. While the doses are administered free of charge, the volunteer physicians have asked those receiving a vaccination to consider

donating to RIP Medical Debt, a national nonprofit organization whose aim is to provide medical debt relief for those in need. To date, the vaccine clinics have raised nearly \$3,000 for the group.

Through the clinics, which have been featured on several local newscasts, first-dose vaccines have been administered to 700 caregivers, all of whom will receive their second dose in coming weeks. In pulling together to ensure access to the vaccine for an often "forgotten" group of caregivers, the dedicated clinic team is inching us further along the path toward herd immunity and its promise of a return to normal.

On January 4, 2021 at 8:44 pm, HTP were dispatched to the area of Sample Rd and Laurel Lane for a reported intoxicated driver. The reporting party advised that the vehicle was driving in the oncoming lane and was traveling at a high rate of speed. A responding officer was able to intercept the vehicle in question and observed traffic violations. A traffic stop was initiated, and the vehicle operator showed visible signs of impairment. The operator was unable to complete field sobriety tests as had been explained and demonstrated and was subsequently placed under arrest for suspicion of DUI. The operator was also found to be in possession of illegal substances and paraphernalia.

On January 19, 2021 at 12:22 am, HTP initiated a traffic stop on Route 8 after observing multiple traffic violations. Upon making contact with the operator, the officer detected the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from the vehicle. The operator submitted to field sobriety tests, which were not completed as had been explained and demonstrated. The operator showed visible signs of impairment and was subsequently placed under arrest for suspicion of DUI.

Traffic Violation/Active Warrant

On January 4, 2021 at 9:30 am, HTP officers initiated a traffic stop on Route 8 after observing multiple traffic violations. Upon stopping the vehicle and making contact with the operator, it was discovered that the driver had a suspended drivers license. The operator was also found to have an active warrant for their arrest. The operator was also found to be in possession of paraphernalia.

Vehicle Accident

On December 30, 2020 at 4:31 pm, HTP responded to West Hardies Road for a single vehicle accident that initially was said to involve a mailbox. Upon the arrival of the responding officers, they located a vehicle in the front yard of a residence. The vehicle had struck a gas meter, shearing the stem, which resulted in a gas leak. The vehicle also struck a sewer pipe in the front yard, which flattened one tire on the vehicle. People's Gas responded to the scene to fix the gas meter break. The vehicle was towed from the scene.

On January 5, 2021 at 1:09 pm, HTP responded to Route 8, near Aldi Foods, for a two-vehicle collision. Upon arrival, officers found one vehicle still in the roadway, blocking a lane of travel. The accident was said to have occurred when the operator of one vehicle was attempting to pull out of a business parking lot to then travel south on Route 8. There was a line of vehicles stopped in the northbound curb lane, and the operator did not see an oncoming vehicle traveling in the passing lane. The operator attempted to exit the parking lot to turn left and collided with the oncoming vehicle. Both vehicles were towed from the scene.

compensate for the smaller sized audiences. If we aren't able to perform for a live audience, we preplanned by purchasing the rights to be able to live-stream "Pippin" so that the audience can still enjoy the hard work that the students are putting into this production in this temporarily skewed new landscape."



The number of students involved in "Pippin" is a much smaller number than what the students are used to, with a cast of only 32, an orchestra of 15, and a stage crew of 25. The directors' idea behind this was to keep student involvement at a manageable level for safety. Sophomore Brooks Brady, who plays Pippin, said, "I'm really happy to get back to working with everyone. We were so disappointed when "Drood" had to be cancelled, even though we understood. I think that makes us more excited to do our show this year. We're all having so much fun, even with Covid precautions in place." The role of Fastrada is played by sophomore Leah McConnell, who said, "I'm really glad we are able to have rehearsals and put on a show this year. Pippin is such a fun musical! There's a lot of acrobatics and energy-packed jazz numbers. Although it's not the same as it usually would be because of Covid, I can tell it'll be an awesome show." Junior Lindsay Liebro plays the Leading Player and she said, "Despite the uncertain times, we are a family more than ever, and I pinch myself because of how lucky I am to share a stage with these amazing people. This show has a few tricks up its sleeve



and we are excited to be able to perform again."

Without a doubt, producing live theatre during a pandemic has to be carefully orchestrated and every detail needs to be determined in advance with a backup plan. It is easily twice the amount of work

than in previous years for directors, actors, crew, musicians, and all involved. Yet already, Franklin said they have learned so much during this process as they started to rethink what theatre is and why is it so important to our society. Dan said, "Theater is so important now, when people have been isolating for nearly a year and those human interactions are starting to erode. Theatre is the healing balm that so many of us desperately need for our souls right now."

Pending the pandemic situation, in-person tickets will be \$12 and will be available online through the HTSD website under the Arts & Academics tab sometime this spring.


espite setbacks and delays because of Covid, the Hampton High School's swimming and diving team has come

out stronger than ever this season. It was a tough start with practices and meets being very inconsistent, and many are still up in the air currently, but the team has stayed optimistic. Coach Keith Hart explained that although the lack of a normal routine can be frustrating, "safety is the most important thing and we are thankful to have a season." They have had quite a successful few meets recently, and on Thursday the 21st, the swimming and diving teams had a huge victory against Gateway, with the boys winning 100-85 and the girls 94-92. This was following a win against North Hills for both boys swimming and diving.

So far several divers have qualified for the WPIAL championships as well, including Annaleise Craig, Kayla Berkibile, and Koda Carslaw. Carslaw, who is currently a sophomore, has set a whole new bar for the team. Mr. Hart explained, "with what little practice time we have had this season, he still steps up his game. I have been coaching for 37 years and have never had a diver with this much natural talent." In the Talbot's last meet Carslaw broke his school record from last year going from 252.5 to

287.35. Mr. Hart is confident that at least three more of his divers have a solid shot at qualifying within the next few weeks. The prospects of the Talbot diving team look great, so be ready for more success to come.

HAEE Grant Enriches Music Programs

he year is 2013, at Wyland Elementary School. The band room, adjacent to the multipurpose room, is crowded with students eager to learn their concert music and play their instruments. However, the students learning percussion wait patiently for their turn to practice on the sets. Some of them looked hopeless--would they ever get to play?

For years, this scenario was all too common for students at all three of Hampton's elementary schools. Luckily, with the help of a new HAEE grant, future students will not have to experience this.

If there is one thing Hampton prides itself on, it's our 'Tradition of Excellence'. One of these traditions is the upkeep of our arts programs. Occasionally, maintenance will be necessary to stay on par with tradition. The Hampton Alliance for Educational Excellence recently granted Central, Poff, and Wyland Elementary Schools funding for Orff Musical Instruments, as well as a Musician in Residence. The



proposal enriches the musical education program at Hampton and provides a more hands-on opportunity for learning abstract content. The Orff Musical Instrument approach focuses on an introductory musical

learning environment to bolster creativity, teamwork, and movement. This will give the students more time to spend on the instruments rather than having to take turns on a few. The Musician In Residence will help the children get the individual help each one needs to learn.

The total cost of the grant is \$22,335.70. There are three sets of a 15-piece sonor beat kit, each one separated according to each school's need. Additionally, the grant includes Soprano Mellophone, Soprano Metallophone, Soprano Xylophone, Pen-

tatonic Contrabass Bars, Hand Drums, Triangle, Guiro, and Maracas.

I spoke with Dr. Colleen Hannagan, principal of Poff Elementary and author of the grant, about how the Orff Instruments are benefitting the students across the schools.

Have the schools received the Orff Instruments? If so, how are the students responding? Is the music program now more efficient with the surge in instruments?

"We actually received the instruments on the day that the buildings closed last March. We were first able to get them into the students' hands this fall. They love them! They are so excited to use them in their music classes. At Poff, we didn't have anything like the Orff instruments before, so it hasn't made us more efficient but it has made the music classes more hands-on and exciting."

How do you believe students will benefit from this creatively? "My hope is that they will begin to write their own songs, because they will understand some basics of music theory. I

think that even if they don't all take to writing music, it will help them to think differently about everything they do in the arts, in reading, and in mathematics."

The proposal stated that the instruments will allow students to work together and collaborate more. Has this begun to happen in the classroom?



"It's hard to have the students collaborate because they can't share instruments right now. But they are all working together as the music teachers show them how to play the different instruments and make music together."

A Musician in Residence will also be in the classroom to help students learn music. Do/Have we seen a positive response from both the faculty and students?


"Unfortunately, because of the COVID restrictions we can't have the Musician in Residence, Mr. Shawn Funk, come into the school to work with the students yet. He has worked with the

> music teachers a number of times and they are enjoying working with him to implement the instruments into our curriculum."

> Is there anything else you would like to mention about the grant?

" I am so thankful that HAEE funded this grant. I have seen a positive impact in just the four months we've been using the Orff instruments. I look forward to seeing the long-term positive impact for our students."

It appears that this grant has already begun to fulfill its mission, and the Musical Arts at Hampton are upholding the 'Tradition of Excellence'.
