
Girls Volleyball Celebrates Record Season

Todd Memorial Fund Benefits School District

The Todd family is keeping their daughter's memory alive in Hampton Township School District, where she was loved by teachers and inspired many in the community.

"Initially our goal was to help struggling teens transition to college, because mental health care can be difficult to access," Amy Todd said. However, after consulting professionals, they

decided to direct funds to the Hampton Township School District, where Abbey graduated in 2019.

When Abbey took her life in 2020, at the height of the Covid lockdowns, the family created the Abbey Todd Memorial Fund, to which community members, families, and friends of the Todds donated as well.

After a fall from a horse in 2009, Abbey suffered from Reflex Sympathetic Dystrophy Syndrome (RSD) which caused chronic pain. Because of her illness, Abbey was at times confined to home and felt isolated from her peers. Additionally, she

suffered from migraines, autoimmune disease, chronic Lyme disease, and then depression set in. Abbey suffered in silence, hiding her health issues, which contributed to her depression. "Depression and chronic illness are closely related," Amy explained.

Programs funded in Abbey's memory, include bringing motivational speaker Alex Sheens' "Because I Said I Would" program to the middle school and the creation of a wellness center where students can find rest and inspiration. Most recently, a living wall in the art room of the high school added a calming focal point for students.

The living wall features a vertical wall of living plants. Experts agree that natural elements inside schools reduce stress

and anxiety, while boosting moods and positive thinking. Abbey's love of plants was a consistent theme throughout her years in the Hampton school district, where her art is still displayed.

"My daughter loved plants because they were alive and thriving. They gave her hope," Amy emotionally offered. Abbey particularly loved succulent plants, a widely known symbol of tenacity, strength, selflessness and love. "Abbey loved plants because they speak life," added Amy.

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

In his second year at the varsity level, Coach Holler first met several of his players during his three-year stint coaching at Hampton Middle School.

"Our seniors were in eighth grade when I started coaching at the middle school," he shares, "and it's been so great to see their journey. I've loved watching them grow as competitors and, even more so, as people."

After such a stellar season, it's tempting to wonder

how to approach the coming year. Coach Holler, however, takes it in stride, explaining, "Every season is a new opportunity with a new group of seniors who are ready to take on the leadership role. time, Unit 2 was traveling in the opposing direction in the southbound curb lane of William Flinn. As Unit 1 continued to spin, he entered into the opposing southbound travel lanes and struck the rear wheel of the trailering unit of Unit 2.

Unit 1 sustained major disabling damage to its front end as well as multiple airbag deployments. Unit 2 sustained no damage to his tow vehicle, but the axle of his trailering unit became sheared from the wheel as a result of the collision. Leo's Towing responded to remove Unit 1 from the scene, while Ferrah's Towing responded to remove Unit 2's trailer from the scene.

On 12/02/2023, HTPD was dispatched for a report of a white GMC SUV that had struck a guardrail and pulled into the parking lot across from the Hartwood Wine Cave. The third-party caller reported the two occupants of the SUV then exited the car and surveyed the damage before the caller left the area. Upon arrival, officers checked the immediate and surrounding area for the described vehicle with negative results. Officers then surveyed the area for damage to any associated guardrails; no immediately recognizable recent damage was observed.

On 12/04/2023, as an officer was on patrol in the area of Aldi Foods, they observed two vehicles pulled into the entrance/exit to the property. Both operators appeared to be out of their cars, and she observed what appeared to be vehicle parts lying in the roadway. Upon making contact with the vehicle operators, they verified that it was a two-vehicle accident with no reported injuries.

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Unit 2 stated that she was traveling north in the curb lane of Route 8, approaching the entrance/exit to Aldi, when she observed Unit 1 start to pull out of the Aldi parking lot onto the roadway. She stated that the operator was looking to the right and was not looking in her direction at the time. She stated that she had to stop abruptly in the roadway to try and avoid a collision with Unit 1. She stated that even after she came to a stop, the driver of Unit 1 continued looking to the north, never looked to the south, and drove into her vehicle. Unit 2 sustained substantial damage to the front driver's side bumper area. Unit 2 was able to be driven from the scene.

Unit 1 stated that he was trying to make a left out of the Aldi parking lot, and it appeared as though the roadway was clear. He tried to pull out of the lot and struck Unit 2. Unit 1 sustained damage to the front driver's side panel area and was able to be driven from the scene.

Both parties were provided all pertinent driver, vehicle, and insurance information to pass along to their designated insurance companies.

On 12/05/2023, HTPD was dispatched to the area of 4284 William Flinn Highway for a report of a two-vehicle accident with unknown injuries. Officers arrived on the scene and observed two vehicles blocking both northbound lanes of William Flinn Highway and a male lying on the ground off to the side of the road.

Unit 1 stated they were traveling southbound on William Flinn Highway attempting to locate a dentist office in Castletown Square. Unit 1 stated they were not paying attention to the roadway and were looking for the office while executing a left-hand turn from the left-hand lane of William Flinn Highway to enter the plaza. As Unit 1 was executing the left-hand turn, Unit 1 struck Unit 2 as Unit 2 was traveling northbound on William Flinn Highway. Unit 1 sustained moderate damage to the 12 o'clock position. A passenger reported an injury to the right side of her abdomen and was transported to UPMC Passavant by Shaler Hampton EMS. Both occupants of Unit 1 were wearing their seatbelts. No airbags were deployed. Zang Auto Body towed the vehicle from the scene.

Unit 2 stated they were traveling northbound on William Flinn Highway in the right-hand lane. Unit 2 stated they observed Unit 1 executing a left hand turn which prompted Unit 2 to apply the brakes hard. Unit 1 then struck Unit 2 while both vehicles were still in motion. Unit 2 sustained moderate damage to the 10 and 11 o'clock position. The driver complained of a left shoulder injury and was transported to UPMC Passavant by Shaler Hampton EMS. Unit 2 was wearing their seatbelt. No airbags were deployed. Zang Auto Body towed the vehicle from the scene.

On 12/14/2023, HTPD was dispatched to William Flinn Highway in the area of the Allison Park Industrial Complex for a two-vehicle crash with entrapment reported. Officers arrived on the scene with Shaler Police, and it was determined that the collision occurred within Shaler Township Police jurisdiction in front of Milano's Pizza. Officers remained on scene and assisted as needed.



'Al's Bike Drive' was born and has grown annually, with 583 bikes donated this Christmas season.

In the Walmart Gibsonia parking lot on December 7, volunteers were welcomed by coffee and donuts by Al's team. They would need the fuel, as nearly 600 bikes were pulled from shipping containers and loaded on several dozen trucks, everything in size from Jeeps to 18-wheeler tractor trailers.

With the help of Hampton Police & Fire Department, along with Northern Regional Police, an escort was formed for the long line of trucks delivering the bikes to the next destination of Wildwood Country Club.

The procession was followed by a luncheon, where guests learned about the history of Al's Bike Drive, with the occasion marked by a total of 7,334 bikes donated since its inception. "I don't do this alone. I rely on family, friends and my team," Al shared.

He also explained the management team of Walmart was crucial to the project's success, as the cost of bikes increased dramatically since the pandemic and inflation.

Last year, Al's Bike Drive began partnering with 'Variety, The Children's Charity,' to collect funds for adaptive bikes. Adaptive bikes help individuals achieve therapeutic goals, such as increased range of motion, strength, and coordination. Charlie Lavelle, CEO of Variety, expressed his gratitude, "A part of you is with all the kids who received an adaptive bike." Fifteen adaptive bikes were donated this year, each costing upwards of \$2,500 for the customization.

Seventh grader Penelope attended the event with her mom, riding her adaptive bike, who explained her daughter had not been able to ride bikes with her siblings. "She's getting exercise! This is something we could have never done without an adaptive bike," she added.

United States Marines leaders also attended and spoke at the event. The representatives were in awe over the number of bikes which would be available to their families in need.

Todd also recognized the Hampton Police and Fire Departments, who competed to raise money for the event. "They keep us all safe. I am reminded how amazing our Hampton first responders are," he expressed.



He also encouraged volunteers to return next year to once again participate in Al's Bike Drive, while acknowledging the huge undertaking the event is..."I thank God for giving me the strength to do this," he added.

Updates for Hampton Township Residents

As we begin 2024, I'm reflecting on my first year in office as your state representative. In 2023, my staff and I engaged with almost 10,000 residents through outreach, constituent services, events, and people sharing their opinions on legislation. I am extraordinarily grateful for the opportunity to serve our community and will always welcome your input on the issues and the needs you might have. In 2023, we secured more than \$5.33 million in state funding for the 30th Legislative District, including \$250,000 to Hampton Township to replace the Clearview Road Bridge, \$175,000 for the replacement of infrastructure on South Pioneer Road, and \$20,000 to replace radios for the Hampton Township Police Department, among others. This funding will improve quality of life in Hampton Township, and I will work to secure even more funding to benefit our community this year.

I introduced 14 bills, such as the Medical Debt Relief Act and a bill to prevent sexually violent predators from residing near schools and day care centers. Additionally, I supported a state budget with record investment in our public schools, an enhanced child and dependent care tax credit, and increased property tax and rent relief, and legislation that would preserve reproductive and voting rights and enact common-sense gun safety regulations. I will continue to advocate for investment in our schools, first responders, and community, as well as legislation to benefit all Pennsylvanians.

Our Universities Should be Bastions of Civility & Respect



It has been heartbreaking to see the pervasiveness of antisemitism become more evident in our society over the past few months following the atrocious, unprovoked terrorist attacks on Jewish people in October. After the head of one of the Commonwealth's

most prestigious universities refused to recognize antisemitism and calls for genocide as bullying and harassment against Jewish students, it has become clear we have to act. To combat antisemitism on campuses, I have introduced

legislation that would require any institution of higher education in Pennsylvania that receives direct funding from the state to acknowledge antisemitism as harassment and/or bullying as a part of their codes of conduct. Taxpayer funding should only follow a university's commitment to demonstrating leadership on campus by taking all actions to combat antisemitism and all forms of hate. According to a November 2023 survey, 70% of students – both Jewish and non-Jewish – feel their university should do more to address antisemitism on campus. My legislation would help ensure this would be the case at those schools receiving funding from the Commonwealth. Our universities should be a place for ideas and discussion, but they must remain civil and free of violence.

In the future, our universities can continue to be, and be once again, bastions of education, civility, respect and a place where parents across Pennsylvania can be proud to send their young people to prepare in a responsible and respectful manner for their futures. This is what higher education should be and can be once again.







As we begin 2024 with a fresh start, this is the perfect time to look back at 2023 and all that we've done.

I'm incredibly proud of the work that my District Office did this year. We closed over 4,700 constituent service cases in 2023—everything from free faxing services and scheduling AARP tax appointments to helping navigate the Unemployment Claims System and working through thorny PennDOT issues.

We responded to over 10,600 constituent emails requesting assistance and sharing input on legislative topics that were important to the sender. I value the perspectives that constituents share on subjects that they are passionate about, and I'm always happy to hear from you. I was the prime sponsor of 34 bills this year. The prime sponsor of a bill is responsible for introducing the legislative language for the bill and helping shepherd the bill through the legislature. This Session is still ongoing, so all of these bills are still active through the end of 2024.

We also hosted 14 community events in 2023, including two Senior Fairs, a Hard-to-Read License Replacement Event, and two Shredding Events. We'll be planning our 2024 events calendar very soon, so please stay tuned for upcoming events!
