Gone but Will Never Be Forgotten

Will Pilarski's Courageous Battle with Cancer by Lainy Carslaw

"After 30+ hours of fighting, at 3:14 p.m. Will Power decided to leave this earth and take his flight to the next level. Let the battle for the cure rage on. Will Power forever!"

This was the Facebook post written Will Pilarski's mom, Abby Pilarski on December 30th, 2017, for worried friends and family who had anxiously been awaiting an update since learning that Will had slipped into a coma earlier that morning.

But this is not about Will's last day. It's not about his last months, when, after learning that his tumor had

A summary of noteworthy incidents that occurred between November 22nd 2017 - December 10th 2017:


Drug Arrest

On November 24, 2017 at 10:38 p.m., a Hampton Township officer initiated a traffic stop on a vehicle on Route 8 after observing that the vehicle was unable to maintain its lane of travel. Upon making contact with the operator, the officer detected the odor of suspected marijuana emanating from the vehicle. A second officer observed a plastic baggie containing suspected marijuana in plain view on the floorboard of the front passenger seat. The passenger of the vehicle was observed to be trying to move the baggie with his foot. Concluding the investigation, the passenger was charged with possession.

DUI Arrest

On November 25, 2017 at 9:54 p.m., a Hampton Township officer initiated a traffic stop on a vehicle on East Hardies Road after observing multiple traffic violations. Upon contacting the operator, the officer smelled the odor of burnt marijuana emanating from the vehicle. The operator showed visible signs of impairment and was asked to submit to field sobriety tests. The driver was subsequently placed under arrest for suspicion of DUI.

The driver was also found to have a suspended driver's license, and officers located suspected marijuana and paraphernalia within the vehicle.

Upon speaking with the operator, the officer detected the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from the vehicle. The operator was asked to perform a series of field sobriety tests, which they were unable to complete as had been explained and demonstrated. The driver was subsequently placed under arrest for suspicion of DUI.

House Fire

On December 10, 2017 at 3:53 p.m., Hampton Township Police were dispatched to Swansea Crescent West for smoke that was reported to be coming out of a residence. Upon arrival, the homeowner stated that they were attempting to start a fire in the fireplace when the house became very smoky due to a fire igniting within the chimney area. Fire units responded to the scene and gained control of the situation.

Hot Tub on Fire

On November 24, 2017 at 7:00 a.m., Hampton Township Police were dispatched to Ridge Drive for a hot tub that was reported to be on fire. Upon arrival, the fire had already been extinguished by a neighbor. Hampton Township Fire Department also responded to the scene to verify that the scene was safe.

Vehicle Accident

On November 24, 2017 at 3:18 p.m., Hampton Township officers were dispatched to Middle Road, at McNeal Road, for a two vehicle accident. Upon arrival, officers located both vehicles parked on the side of Middle Road. Upon speaking with the operators and witnesses, it was determined that the accident occurred when the operator of one vehicle was attempting to turn off of McNeal Road onto Middle Road. The vehicle had been stopped at the stop sign at that location, and did not see a vehicle traveling south on Middle Road directly behind an uninvolved vehicle that was turning onto McNeal Road. The operator attempted to enter Middle Road, and collided with the second vehicle.

December 5, 2017 at 8:18 a.m., Hampton Township officers were dispatched to Richland Road for a single vehicle accident. Upon arrival, officers located a vehicle that was over an embankment and crashed into several trees. The driver stated that they were traveling west on Richland Road when they lost control going around a bend and went off the roadway. The three vehicle occupants were all transported to the hospital by ambulance for injury treatment and further evaluation.

This is about Pilarski's whole life. It is a life that has made a difference. It is a life that has inspired others. And it is a life none of us will ever forget.

To ensure Will's life will continue to make an impact, his brain will be donated to scientific research in hopes of

finding a cure for cancer.

... "Will's theme and war cry became: I can, I will...watch me!" wrote Abby, "and he did. It may seem like his fight is over and he lost, but I assure you his fight and will power has just begun."





Act 537: What does it Mean to You?

A Letter from the Municipal Manager Regarding the Act 537 Plan:

Recently, KLH Engineers, the Township's sanitary operations engineer, presented to Township Council a new Act 537 Plan identifying proposed upgrades to the Water Pollution Control (sewer) Plant. A notice was then placed in the Post Gazette as well as the Township's website and Facebook page for public comment. This presentation has raised a number of resident questions and concerns that I would like to take this opportunity to address.

What is an Act 537 Plan?

An Act 537 Plan is a special study of a sanitary sewerage system's facilities. In Hampton's case, it is a special study to develop and evaluate options to strategically upgrade the existing Allison Park Water Pollution Control Plant (the Township's sewer plant) and to allow for better efficiencies in the operations and compliance of the plant with current as well as

future demands and regulatory requirements.

Why is an Act 537 Plan necessary?

An Act 537 Plan is necessary for two basic reasons: First, and most importantly, it presents a comprehensive plan of identified system needs or upgrades so that the public can see the big picture; and, second, it presents alternative solutions in a strategic format that takes into account present, future and anticipated operational as well as environmental requirements. It is, if you will, a road map into the current as well as future operations of a sanitary sewer system.

Okay, but is it true that the Hampton Plan says that my sewer rates are going up in 2018?

NO, it does not! It identifies an estimated cost for the sewer plant upgrades and an estimated cost of what these upgrades translate into for the individual customer. NOTHING REGARDING RATES HAS BEEN DECIDED OR EVEN PROPOSED TO TOWNSHIP COUNCIL.

Yes, but rates will go up if this plan is implemented, correct?

Correct; at some point some amount of a sewer rate increase will have to be considered by the township. When and how much of an increase has yet to be finalized, however, the Act 537 Plan does identify an estimated rate increase of \$.89 per day or \$27 per month to offset the \$45.1 million in system upgrades.

A possible rate increase. Will there be an opportunity for public input?

ABSOLUTELY! In conjunction with an Act 537 Plan, there is a requirement for public input. Besides normal monthly Council meetings, at least three (3) special public hearings will be held during the upcoming year alone; most likely one in late summer, one in the fall, and one in early winter. Residents are also encouraged to contact the Township at their convenience to become better informed with regard to the Act 537 Plan process and/or to offer their opinions as they desire.

REMEMBER, the presentation of the Act 537 Plan is not the end of the process, but the beginning of one. Please follow
