2023 Changes For Trash Pick Up



No Shave, No Problem

HPD Participates in Cancer Awareness Program

The Hampton Township Police Department (HTPD) protects and serves our community every day and now they are reaching out to help others in different ways; through Presents from Police and No-Shave November.

The Hampton police officers work in conjunction with other area police departments to deliver presents donated by the community to children in need. Local residents donated new unwrapped toys at the police station, the community center, and at State Farm, 5006 Route 8. The officers coordinated the delivery of the toys to deliver at the same time on the same day to Sunrise School in Monroeville. The Sunrise School serves students with special needs ages 5-21.

"The officers put time and effort into this. The community really comes together in the spirit of giving. It's amazing how many residents turnout to donate gifts and thank the officers for their efforts," said Hampton Chief of Police Tom Vulakovich. Chief Vulakovich also explained another effort that will help those with cancer. There is an existing policy in place for Hampton police officers that doesn't allow facial hair other than a mustache. Last year, some officers approached the chief and asked if they could participate in No-Shave November.

No-Shave November is a month-long journey during which participants forgo shaving and grooming in order to evoke conversation and raise cancer awareness. The goal is to grow awareness by embracing our hair, which many cancer patients lose, and letting it grow. Participants donate the money they typically spend on shaving and grooming to educate about cancer prevention, save lives, and aid those fighting the battle.

Though he was able to raise \$600 through these efforts, he still felt he could do more to help his teammate.

Now let's pause here and rewind to June, when former Steeler JuJu Smith-Schuster announced he would be hosting a farewell event in Pittsburgh to sign autographs and merchandise for fans. As expected, Smith-Schuster's announcement garnered excitement from Steelers fans all over town, but it sparked an idea in Lennex. While most 10-year-old athletes would want to use this as an opportunity to meet one of their idols and secure an autographed poster to hang on their wall, Lennex saw this as an opportunity to collect autographed merchandise to auction off at a "Christmas in July" fundraiser that the Hampton Wrestling Association and Casey's Family Restaurant was hosting.

The young man on a mission was able to secure over \$300 worth of autographed merchandise plus a \$5000 donation to Kaylee's family from SmithSchuster and his organization, JuJu Foundation, in Rylan Lennex's name. After months of planning and communication between the JuJu Foundation and Rylan's

mom, Patty Lennex, the donation came own trials and tribulations over the past



through and Rylan was able to present it to Kaylee and her family at a Hampton youth wrestling match on December 21st.

"Rylan's family has been through their

few months and he has overcome those and stayed focused on his goal to help another classmate, teammate and friend in their time of need," Gretchen Bennett, wrestling booster president said. "Knowing the Lennex family, all I can say is they all have a heart of gold and I can't tell his parents enough how great of a job they are doing raising their boys."

Kaylee is now in remission and still receiving treatments, but has proven that she is "sassier than cancer." Between the community, the North Hills Wrestling League and Rylan's dedication, over \$16,000 was raised for Kaylee's family, 35% of that being what Rylan raised on his own. Kudos to the Hampton wrestling community and all who contributed to Kaylee's recovery.

Bikes For All Kids

Mild temperatures, hot cocoa, donuts, and festive Christmas music welcomed volunteers for Al's Bike Drive at the Walmart Gibsonia on the morning of December 8th.



With large shipping containers lining the parking lot, volunteers went into a flurry of activity, emptying 535 bicycles for kids across the region, as part of the United States Marines Toys for Tots Program.

Once the bicycles were assembled in a huge grouping, volunteers posed for a photo while Al Todd, dressed in

a blue Santa suit, addressed the crowd. "I want to thank you all for coming! This is what 535 bikes look like," Todd exclaimed. Al delivered further instructions, and volunteers once again became busier than Santa's elves, loading bikes onto trucks and trailers. Todd works as a financial consultant at his Thrivent office, located in McCandless Township. He and his team are passionate about community service.

Over the past several years, Donna Eichner of Shaler Township has volunteered with her husband Jack. "I get so emotional thinking about the kids who will receive these bikes on Christmas morning. It fills my heart with joy!" Eichner tearfully exclaimed as she guided bikes to nearby trucks. The couple was eager to help new volunteers learn the ropes at the event.

Once the bikes were loaded, a huge procession formed. The Hampton and North Hampton Fire Departments flanked both ends of the parade, as the vehicles made their way to Wildwood Country Club. Business owners along Route 8 marveled at the long line of vehicles, with

sirens blaring, horns beeping, and lights flashing. The Hampton Police and Northern Regional Police departments closed every intersection on Route 8 to assist the procession in safely transporting the precious cargo.

Al's Bike Drive celebrated its fifteenth year of supplying bicycles to Toys for Tots programs. The organization collects donations year-round to raise funds to purchase bicycles, helping children enjoy the rite of passage of owning their own bike. Before its formation, Todd discovered the need when helping Toys for Tots programs. In 2008, Al raised funds to donate 33 bikes to marginalized children. The next year the bikes doubled. A snowball quickly formed and the program hit a milestone of 1239 bikes. This year, the program encountered supply chain challenges. Cumulatively, Al's Bike Drive has helped Toys for Tots donate over 6.737 bikes.

At a luncheon for the volunteers at Wildwood Country Club, Todd said, "We are thankful for the bikes we have."

nator, expressed her gratitude to Al Todd and the volunteers. "The



amount of time and effort Al puts forth for these bicycles is unimaginable."

Jenn Neilen, the coordinator for Alle-Kiski Toys for Tots, explained to the volunteers that she had once been a recipient of the program. "I was on the other side. I left a difficult relationship and needed help. My kids received bikes. Now, I want to make other families happy."

Al added, "Through the years I have heard many stories of people who needed help. The work we do is extremely important. Thank you for all you are doing and all you have done. I will continue to march forward with my friends in the Marine Corps."

This year, the bike drive worked with a new partner, Variety - The Children's Charity, to have ten adaptive bikes built for kids with special needs. The organization works to empower children with disabilities to live life to the fullest. Charlie LaVallee explained to volunteers that children with challenges or disabilities may feel left out. The bikes help them feel equal to their peers; however, they are very costly at \$2,000 per custom bike. "Variety has distributed 9 million dollars worth of equipment to children with disabilities. We are so grateful to Al and all the volunteers because every child should have a bike," LaVallee explained.

Later in the program, Al Todd formed a procession with the children receiving adaptive bikes. The group joyfully rode through Wildwood Country Club. One elementary student, JoAnn, beamed with pride on

her bike. Through tears, her Mom said, "Now, she can ride bikes with her siblings! We can ride bikes together as a family."



ent that the collection contracts were changing. The new contract takes effect January 1, 2023, and the fee will increase to \$30.51 per month. Discounts are available for senior citizens and if you pay up front for the entire year.

Hampton Township and Waste Management are giving residents an opportunity to select their cart size (96-gallon, 64-gallon,

or 35-gallon) for your trash carts. The Township is recommending you choose the 96-gallon cart, as Waste Management will not take anything left outside of the cart. Keep in mind, the 64-gallon cart is the size of your recycling cart. Any household that has not communicated with Waste Management will automatically receive a 96-gallon cart for trash (you should already have a 64-gallon cart for recyclables, which you will continue to use for recycling). Also, glass is again included as part of your recycling. You should have already received and replied to the post card, as the deadline was December 23rd to reply. The new trash carts will be delivered to residents beginning January 23rd. It may take a couple of weeks for every residential household to receive their new trash cart. Use your existing trash carts until you receive the new Waste Management cart.

You will have one "bulk item" that can be picked up as part of your monthly bill - - this will occur the 4th full week of each month, for one item. If you have more than one item, you will be subject to an additional per item charge.

The Township is aware how difficult this change will be for everyone. Working through it together, we can all make the best of this! The Township has been trying to keep communication open and clear through as many channels as possible in an effort to help the community understand the new program.

The Fastest Teacher in the 'Burgh

Oakland Catholic math teacher Elaina Tabb put down the calculator and laced up her Adidas sneakers to compete in the 2022 California International Marathon (CIM) this past December. She achieved her goal to secure a podium finish and brought home the third place title along with her personal record time of 2:28:04.

"I feel blessed to be able to pursue this dream of mine alongside my teaching career," Tabb said. "It was pretty special hearing the announcers call me 'the high school math teacher from Pittsburgh' as I was coming down the final straightaway. I love that I am able to pursue both of my passions: running and teaching. I know that my teaching career only makes me a better runner as it brings so much joy to life."

Tabb launched her career when she attended Hampton Middle School and joined the cross country team; she hasn't slowed down since. She won the 3,200 WPIAL Class AAA title in 2010 as a senior at Hampton and became a six-time Division I All-American at William and Mary college. She joined the professional ranks as a distance runner in 2014, signing with Adidas-sponsored Boston Athletic Association.



The 2022 California International Marathon (CIM) was a U.S. Championship race and marked Tabb's 3rd marathon completed to date. When asked if she has any advice for anyone thinking about competing in a marathon, she said:

"The marathon has to be something you're truly excited for. It's a very big commitment in terms of the number of hours of training, so my suggestion is to commit to whatever distance lights the fire inside of you. If that's the marathon, then great, but a 5k, 10k, and half marathon are equally as impressive!"

Tabb plans to spend the upcoming weeks resting and recovering from her intense training while thriving in her teaching career at Oakland Catholic. Congratulations Elaina!


This student teaching opportunity at A.W. Beattie launches a path to becoming

With winter being upon us, a friendly reminder to our residents and motorists during this winter season from the Hampton Township Public Works Department:

The Public Works crews plow approximately 100 miles of Township-owned roads as well as 20 miles of State-owned roads (through an agreement with PennDOT). Middle Road and Duncan Avenue are County owned and maintained. Route 8 is state-owned and maintained by PennDOT in the winter. It takes our crews three to five hours for one route (depending on if all trucks are running and what type of winter event they are dealing with). Main roads are taken care of first followed by residential streets.

Please help the snow and ice removal crews during winter snow events/emergencies by NOT PARKING on Township roadways.

Please do not plow, shovel or blow snow from sidewalks or driveways into public streets. This slows snow removal efforts and can result in a dangerous condition for pedestrians and drivers.

Plowing snow onto driveways and sidewalks cannot be avoided. Public Works drivers are not permitted to "steer" the plow away from driveways.


