Police Log

The Hampton Township Police Department is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life of our residents and guests by providing the very best in law enforcement services. The twenty-two officers and two civilian clerks take pride in serving the community in a professional and proactive manner. Thank you to the staff for helping to keep our community safe.

Vehicle Accident/DUI Arrest


The children, ranging in ages from 4 to 12 years old, learned many things. They learned about the particular qualities of Tucker and Henry, poodles who are hypoallergenic, intelligent, and social. They are hypoallergenic because they have hair instead of fur. They don't shed but go to a groomer just like people! Tucker, who is Henry's uncle, is a blue poodle and Henry is a black poodle who was the biggest in his litter and weighs 63 pounds. Tucker was the smallest in his litter and weighs 47 pounds. The kids also learned that Henry falls asleep if you sing to him, so the children sang Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star and sure enough, Henry fell fast asleep! Tucker, also an excellent watch dog, who used to work at a store with Suzy and caught someone who was trying to steal jewelry. He stared at the person until she gave it back!

Suzy also spoke about the dogs' jobs as therapy dogs. They make weekly visits to the cancer center at UPMC Passavant Hospital, an elder care home, preschools, and even the Pittsburgh International Airport where they visit with passengers and employees. Tucker has been a therapy dog for 9 years and Henry for almost 2.

During the program she demonstrates some of the obedience commands such as sit, down, stay. These are all things the therapy dogs need to pass in their test in order to become a therapy dog. Finally, the children were given the opportunity to ask questions, pet, and get kisses from the dogs. Of course, they first were taught the best ways to approach a dog: always ask permission, always approach from the front, and let the dog sniff your hand first.



Hannah was nominated for the impressive award by her Jewart's gymnastics coach, Lainy Carslaw. Carslaw nominated her because of her positive fight back from an injury. In 2016 Hannah landed badly after a huge double back dismount from the bars on an 8-inch mat, half on and half off, causing an ankle break in 3 places and a dislocation. The potentially career ending injury took 1 1/2 years to recover from and return to the sport. Recovery included lots of rehab, getting cleared to return to the sport, and then retraining to get back to her previous skill level. Throughout it all she stayed positive and kept her strength up in the gym doing conditioning and cheering on her teammates. This past year she was able



to overcome the hardest part, doing the same skill that caused her injury. She went to the same meet in Philadelphia and placed 1st not just on bars, but overall in the all-around. She continued on to go to states, regionals, winning first on floor, and was an alternate for nationals where she was only a few tenths shy.

Her coach also recognized her achievements in track. Hannah shined in the high jump and triple jump, going to WPIALS for both. At WPIALS she placed 7th for high jump. She had taken a stronger interest in track when she was not sure she'd be able to return to gymnastics. Throughout it all she kept a good attitude and demonstrated a strong work ethic.



They Aren't Much to Look at; But the Heirloom Tomato is a Gem (originally published 8/2008)

They come in all shapes and colors and are nothing like the traditional bright red, blemish free, round and pear shaped tomatoes that we are all used to. I know when I first saw one I thought to myself, "These tomatoes are hide-ous." Then I tasted one and changed my whole point of view. It was firm, sweet and meaty; it was the ultimate tomato.

Heirloom tomato plants are "open pollinated' which means that the seeds grow true to their type. The tomatoes we are used to seeing are hybrid which means they were genetically altered for desirable characteristics, such as color, shape, size, plant yield and their resistance to disease. Many heirloom tomatoes come from seeds that are passed down from generation to generation.

Heirloom tomatoes are gaining in popularity and more and more farms are beginning to commercially produce these. There are literally hundreds of varieties of heirlooms to choose from ranging in colors from deep purple, bright green, yellow, and a variety of reds.

Although heirlooms are not as readily available as the hybrids, they can be found in your upscale supermarkets, whole food stores, and at the produce yards. You will often find that heirloom tomatoes are grown organically as well; meaning no pesticides, fungicides, herbicides, or chemical fertilizers.

One last significant point about heirlooms is that most of our commercial tomatoes are grown from very few varieties. If something catastrophic would happen to these crops such as pest infestation, disease or blight; it could wipe out the entire future of the commercial tomato. Heirlooms are genetically unique from each other and from commercial tomatoes; which means that many would likely survive the conditions that destroyed the commercial crop.
