Police Log

The Hampton Township Police Department is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life of our residents and guests by providing the very best in law enforcement services. The twenty-two officers and two civilian clerks take pride in serving the community in a professional and proactive manner. Thank you to the staff for helping to keep our community safe.

A summary of noteworthy incidents that occurred are listed below. These incident statistics included, but WERE NOT LIMITED TO, the following between the dates of 5/16/2020—6/5/2020:

Fraud

On May 26, 2020 at 11:37 a.m. Hampton Township Police received a phone call request from a resident from Grandview Drive regarding attempted fraud. The resident advised that she received a phone call stemming from New Jersey Judiciary. The caller claimed to be the resident's grandson and stated that they had been in a car accident. The resident was aware that this is a common phone scam where the scammer uses scare tactics to get people to send money. The caller asked for their name, and the caller provided a name that was not the resident's actual grandson. The resident ended the call and did not provide any sensitive information.

On June 3, 2020 at 12:30 p.m., Hampton Township Police received a report from a resident on Branding Place regarding fraud. The resident advised police that they received two unemployment checks which they had never applied for. The resident had contacted the unemployment office and was advised to file a police report and to send the checks back. The resident had discovered that someone had created an unemployment request utilizing their personal information.

Vehicle Accident

On May 18, 2020 at 6:55 p.m., Hampton Township officers responded to Route 8, at Wildwood Road, for a two-vehicle accident. The accident was found to have occurred when the operator of one vehicle traveled southbound on Route 8 through a steady red light. The other vehicle, which was traveling through a green light at Wildwood Road was struck by the other car. One vehicle was towed from the scene.

On May 27, 2020 at 11:44 a.m., Hampton Township Police responded to Route 8, at Anderson Drive, for a two-vehicle accident. The accident was said to have occurred when one vehicle was stopped in the southbound passing lane, waiting to turn left onto Anderson Drive, when it was struck from behind. Both vehicles sustained disabling damage and were towed from the scene.

On June 9, 2020 at 3:51 p.m., Hampton Township Police responded to Harts Run Road and Middle Road for a two-vehicle accident. Upon the officer's arrival, the vehicles were found to still be in the roadway with moderate damage. The accident occurred when one vehicle operator attempted to stop at the intersection but applied their clutch instead of brake, which resulted in the collision with a vehicle within the intersection. Both vehicles were towed from the scene.

On June 11, 2020 at 2:27 p.m., Hampton Township Police responded to Route 8 at Duncan Avenue for a single vehicle rollover accident. Upon their arrival, they located a vehicle laying on its passenger side with moderate damage. The operator was found to be inside the vehicle, while multiple passengers

The crash was said to have occurred when the operator struck the curb and a guiderail with the vehicle, which caused it to turn over. The vehicle was towed from the scene.

Vehicle Fire

On May 17, 2020 at 5:31 p.m., Hampton Township Police and Fire Department responded to a parking lot on Route 8 for a vehicle fire. Upon arrival, officers observed a vehicle that was fully engulfed in flames. Members of the fire department were able to extinguish the fire and the vehicle was towed from the scene. The operator stated they were traveling on Route 8 when the engine compartment began smoking and caught on fire. There were no injuries as a result of the fire.

DUI Arrest

On June 5, 2020 at 8:11 p.m., Hampton Township Police were dispatched to the area of Route 8 for a report of a vehicle that was driving erratically from Shaler Township, and was reported to have struck a road barrier multiple times. A Hampton Township officer intercepted the vehicle traveling north on Route 8. The officer observed that the vehicle was unable to maintain its lane of travel. The officer initiated a traffic stop on the vehicle in question, and upon making contact

with the vehicle operator, the officer detected the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from the car. The officer also observed other physical indicators of impairment. The operator submitted to field sobriety tests, which they were unable to perform as had been instructed and demonstrated. The operator was placed under arrest for suspicion of DUI.

On June 7, 2020 at 7:35 p.m., Hampton Township Police were dispatched to the area of Route 8 and Clearview Road after a witness called 911 to report a possible intoxicated driver. An officer was able to intercept the vehicle in question and observed that the car was unable to maintain its lane of travel. A traffic stop was initiated on the vehicle, and upon making contact with the vehicle operator, the officer immediately detected the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from the vehicle. The officer also observed other physical indicators of impairment while conversing with the driver. The operator submitted to field sobriety tests, which they failed to perform as had been instructed and demonstrated. The operator was also found to be in possession of drugs and was placed under arrest.

Fire

On May 26, 2020 at 9:17 p.m., Hampton Township officers were dispatched to Duncan Avenue for a residence that was reported to have siding of the house on fire. The homeowners advised that a fire pit that had been utilized earlier in the

evening was likely to blame. They stated that the siding of the house had began to smoke and caught on fire. Fire Units were able to remove the affected siding and extinguish the fire.

Public Drunkenness

On May 26, 2020 at 12:19 p.m., Hampton Township Police were dispatched to a business on Route 8 for an intoxicated person passed out in the grass. The responding officer arrived on scene and observed the individual laying in the grass, who had a strong odor of alcoholic beverage emanating from his person and it appeared as though he urinated on himself. The individual had several open and empty alcohol containers laying nearby and had slurred speech and was unable to balance while standing.

Traffic Alert - Closure

Herron Road, from Maple Lane to Old Route 8, will be closed from Monday, July 6, 2020 to Wednesday, September 6, 2020 for road stabilization work. A detour map can be viewed on the website. Donato Elected to Represent Swimmers of Western PA

pcoming Hampton High School junior Isabella Donato, earned the position of Allegheny Mountains Swimming (AMS) representative after being one of 49 swimmers who applied from 49 swim clubs in western Pennsylvania. With this title, she will represent all swimmers across western PA who are a part of AMS and her du-

ties will include attending monthly meetings and bringing ideas for change to the local swim committees. Donato hopes to make AMS a more inclusive team by offering ways for swimmers to connect with each other outside of swim meets. In addition, she will be representing AMS at the USA swimming convention this September in Fort Lauderdale, FL.

Isabella feels immensely proud to be voted by swim-

mers throughout this part of the state. "The fact that people who I don't even know voted for me, is so crazy! I could not be more excited to meet other athletes across the US who are doing the same thing as me. It will be the best experience to meet swimmers from other states who are just as passionate as I am. Hopefully, I can use some of their ideas to make AMS even better, and they can use some of the great ideas we offer too," remarked Donato. While at the convention in Florida, she will meet with athlete leaders across the country and is extremely excited to bring some great ideas back to AMS.

Donato has been swimming for eight years and is not sure the route she wants to pursue after high school. She commented, "I'd consider swimming in college if given the opportunity, but I think it's really important to focus on my education as well. I am going to college to learn, and if I am given the chance to be on a team, that would be a bonus."

Gooden was nominated by a fellow volunteer at CORE, Center for Organ Recovery & Education, where he is a member of the advisory board that oversees the Organ & Tissue Donation as well as the Robert P. Casey Memorial Organ and Tissue Donation Awareness Trust Fund. He was then chosen by a panel of celebrity judges including tv personalities and a representative from the mayor's office. Ron was nominated and chosen for several reasons including overcoming a serious health condition and his volunteer work in the community.

On November 22, 2011 Ron received a heart transplant after being at the top of the list because there was no other person sicker than him. He was at the end stage and on a heart pump with less than 5% of his heart working. He received the transplant 8 weeks later. His immense gratefulness at receiving this precious gift of life lead him to volunteer with CORE. Gooden commented, "For me, to be given a second chance of life, I felt that I should give back by educating people about organ donation." He works extremely hard to get the message out to young people about the importance of organ donation. A few years ago, Gooden coordi-

nated a Blue & Green Day at the high school during the month of April, which is organ and tissue awareness month. It occurred on the 4th Friday of the month and students who participated were given a green wristband to wear. He hopes to have another Blue & Green Day soon. All area schools are all eligible to apply for a 3year grant if they include organ & tissue donation education as a part of their health/anatomy classes. The grant recipients receive \$3,000 the first year, \$2,000 the second, and \$1,000 the third year.




In addition, representatives from each of the participating schools converge at Penn State University every spring to present on how they are implementing the program. Non-participating school reps are also invited to attend to evaluate the program and decide if they also want to apply for the grant.

There are several key messages for Pennsylvanians. One is that the size of donor and blood type are the 2 biggest factors for a via-

ble donor/patient match. Also, the donor (except for living donors) must be in the hospital, on a ventilator, and with no brain activity. In addition, PA residents who wish to become organ donors need to sign up for organ donor designation through PennDOT.

The winners of the 60 Strong were all treated to a day at the Phipps Conservatory and Botanical Gardens. The day started with breakfast and ended with a group photo shoot. In addition, Gooden had a personal photo shoot at PNC Park and Heinz Field. Gooden remarked, "It was a great honor to be picked and have the opportunity to meet such amazing people and hear their stories about how they overcame their individual challenges."




Noteworthy incidents and events:






