Police Information

The Hampton Township Police Department (HTPD) is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life of our residents and guests by providing the very best in law enforcement services. Thank you to the staff for helping to keep our community safe.

A summary of noteworthy incidents that occurred are listed below. These incident statistics included, but WERE NOT LIMITED TO, the following between the dates of 5/10/2024-6/12/2024:

ACCIDENT AND DUI ARREST

On June 8, 2024, HTP were dispatched to the area of Middle Rd. and Harts Run Rd. for a single vehicle crash into a telephone pole. County dispatch advised the telephone pole was reportedly sheared off and wires were down/entangled around the vehicle. Upon arrival, officers observed numerous power lines lying across Harts Run Road near Middle Road and half of the telephone pole was ying in the roadway. A fire hydrant and a stop sign were also hit. Duquesne Light was notified to respond ASAP due to the entrapment with possible live wires. The operator was placed under arrest for suspicion of DUI.

VEHICLE ACCIDENT

On June 12, 2024, HTP were dispatched to the area of Route 8, near Craighead Road, for a report of a two-vehicle accident with no injuries. Upon arrival, they located the two involved vehicles in the southbound curb lane of Route 8 at the intersection of McCully Road. All vehicle occupants denied the need for medics.

Both involved persons were provided all pertinent driver, vehicle, and insurance information to pass along to their designated insurance companies.



SCAM ATTEMPT

On May 31, 2024, HTP were notified of a scam attempt in progress. While one resident was on the phone with the scammer the other was on the phone with the Police Department. The residents reported that they received a call from a male claiming to be Sgt. Michael McKeen, a government official. He told the resident that there were two outstanding citations that needed to be paid in the amount of \$3000.00 or they'd face a civil liability charge and do either

Abigail Melnick, a Hampton Central Elementary student, sang the 'Star Spangled Banner.' Her lovely voice filled the Community Center and not a dry eye was found after her passionate delivery.

Jason Andrews and Timothy Madden played 'Taps,' the famous bugle call to remember those who gave their lives in the service of the United States.

Hampton resident, Zachary Merritt, delivered the keynote address at the

event. "When we stand together, we are much stronger than when we stand alone. Standing together is such a powerful symbol of unity," he addressed the crowd.

Merritt served from 2004 to 2014 as an active-duty submariner in the United States Navy, attaining the rank of Lieutenant Commander. He served on two submarines, the USS Michigan SSGN 727 Blue and the USS Alexandria SSN 757. Married to Hannalore Burns Merritt for eighteen years, they have two children, Cooper and Abigail.

"My dad is amazing. He participates in so much and gives his time freely. Even though he does so much, he comes home every day happy," Cooper Merritt said of his father. He went to say, "America has given everything to the world, and more. Living in America is amazing!" Cooper's sister, Abigail, added, "My dad is selfless."

Merritt has continued his legacy of service by coaching his kids sports teams and volunteering for local organizations. "Most young people

want to serve. Young people can direct energy to serve and think about ways to serve in their community, profession, or even by joining the military," Merritt said.

The Hampton band played, 'Marches of the Armed Forces,' where veterans are recognized as they march forward when their branch is played. Mr. William English, a Hampton resident who served in the Navy during the Korean War, said, "I love everything about my country, but we need to work harder as a people."



120 days in jail and/ or 50 hours community service time. The male said there was a gag order, and they could not talk about what was going on with anyone. They were instructed to go to the bank to withdraw the money, then go to the kiosk at a local Get-Go Gas Station. A Hampton officer responded to the Get-Go to meet them and to make sure that no money was lost to the scammer.

No government agency would call and tell someone they were under a gag order and that they had to go to their bank and withdraw money. It was explained that they were being scammed and advised to call their creditors and have their accounts locked.

TRAFFIC ALERT

Mt. Royal Blvd. (Between Duncan and Toner Avenues) Closure began on June 10, 2024

PennDOT has contracted with A. Liberoni Construction to provide slide repair and road resurfacing services for this season along Mt. Royal Boulevard.

Mt. Royal Blvd. between Duncan Avenue and Toner Avenue is closed for slide repairs. This section of Mt. Royal is expected to remain closed for approximately 50 days. (Sample Road will reopen prior to this closure.) The detour plan for this closure is Duncan Avenue, Route 8, and Mt. Royal Boulevard.



East of the Closure:

From Route 910, turn onto Cedar Ridge Road. Turn right onto Middle Road. Follow Middle Road back to Route 910 End detour.

West of the Closure:

Same detour in the oppose direction.

This will bring a lot of traffic to already extremely busy intersections along Middle Road at Cedar Ridge and East Hardies. The Township's Police Department will be monitoring these intersections at the beginning of the detour and working with PennDOT to determine if additional traffic control is needed.

Please consider using alternate routes and leaving at earlier times to help alleviate congestion in these areas.

Most importantly, please bring your patience and understanding for those who travel through this area this summer.

Clearview Road Bridge Closure

The Township is replacing the Clearview Road Bridge, which crosses Gourdhead Run and connects to Route 8. This project involves the replacing of the existing span and relocation of electrical, water, sewer and gas lines in the vicinity of the bridge. As a result, there will be a substantial impact to commuters who use the Clearview Road Bridge.

The initial phase of the project involved the aforementioned utility work, which will include intermittent lane restrictions across the Clearview Road Bridge.

THE SHUTDOWN OF THE BRIDGE AND DETOUR BEGAN IN EARLY JUNE. It is anticipated that the bridge will remain closed through September 2024. Please consider using Route 8 to Harts Run Road to Clearview Road for your detour. All work on this project is weather-dependent.



Life-saving Resources and Proper Health Care Reimbursement


A Franklin Park mother and father lost their daughter to an opioid overdose, but they have turned their tragedy into advocacy through the establishment of the <u>Stop the Judgment Project</u>, an initiative focused on removing the stigma of addiction and providing resources to help stem the tide of this public health crisis.

Their story is a major driving factor for <u>H.B.</u> <u>1783</u>, my legislation that would require Pennsylvania's Department of Health to develop and distribute posters in public and private settings

detailing the signs of an opioid-related overdose, the steps to respond, how to locate an agent that reverses opioid effects, and additional resources. The bill would also authorize the creation of a Lifetime Recovery from Substance Use Grant Program under the Department of Drug and Alcohol Programs to assist in the development, expansion, or improvement of recovery support services delivery statewide.

The bill passed the House 187-14 and moves a step closer to not only becoming law, but also saving countless lives and empowering Pennsylvanians in the prevention of future opioid overdoses. Additionally, <u>H.B. 1867</u>, my legislation that would allow health care providers to choose the insurance reimbursement option that best suits to their needs for services rendered, also moved to the Senate for consideration. Hard-working doctors, nurses and other health professionals deserve full compensation for the care they provide day in and day out.
