Police Log

The Hampton Township Police Department is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life of our residents and guests by providing the very best in law enforcement services. The twenty-two officers and two civilian clerks take pride in serving the community in a professional and proactive manner. Thank you to the staff for helping to keep our community safe.

A summary of noteworthy incidents that occurred are listed below. These incident statistics included, but WERE NOT LIMITED TO, the following between the dates of 4/13/2019— 5/21/2019:

Theft from Vehicle

On May 11, 2019 at 9:18 a.m., Hampton Township Police responded to South Villa Drive for a report of a vehicle break-in. Upon arrival, the responding officer observed that the vehicle in question had a shattered driver side window. The vehicle owners stated that sometime during the night, an unknown person broke into the vehicle and stole money from a wallet that had been left in the cup-holder.

Residents are strongly encouraged to refrain from leaving anything of value in their unoccupied vehicles and to keep vehicles locked at all times.

Drug Arrest\Wanted Person

On April 29, 2019 at 8:13 p.m., Hampton Township officers were dispatched to the area of Ebonhurst Drive for a male that was causing a disturbance. Upon the officer's arrival, they located the male in the area and detected the odor of burnt marijuana coming from where the male was located. The male fled on foot upon seeing the officers but was quickly detained by one of the responding officers. Upon identifying the male, he was found to have an active warrant for his arrest and was also found to be in possession of drugs.

Hazardous Conditions\Vehicle Accident

On May 14, 2019 at 1:53 p.m., Hampton Township Police were dispatched to Route 8, at Harts Run Road, for a two-vehicle accident. The accident occurred when one vehicle was traveling southbound on Route 8 and



eight scouts are now high school seniors preparing for graduation.

The Eagle Court of Honor took place on Saturday, May 11th, 2019 at Camp Guyasuta located in Sharpsburg.

Most people know that the Eagle Scout Award is a great honor, even if they're not familiar with the requirements. Since the inception of the Eagle Scout award in 1912, **only 2.01 percent** of eligible Scouts have earned Scouting's highest honor. (https://blog.scoutingmagazine.org/2015/03/30/what-percentage-of-boy-scouts-become-eagle-scouts/)

Once progressing with rank advancements and becoming eligible to earn the Eagle Scout Award, scouts must develop a project focused on leadership and service that involves a community sponsor or beneficiary. They engage in fundraising to cover the expenses of their project. Sometimes, the project can take up to a year to complete.

Following are the Eagle Scouts who were recognized at the Court of Honor and brief descriptions of their projects.

Joey Baker: constructed and installed benches at Glade Run Lake.

Andrew Coholich: constructed a fire pit and benches at St. Mary of the Assumption Parish's youth house.

Regis Colwell: built and submerged vertical plank structures to support fish habitats in Glade Run Lake.

Chris Ference: at St. Catherine of Sweden Parish, constructed a pergola structure above a memorial that was created as his brother's Eagle Scout Project.

Christian Harper: designed, built, and upholstered benches with shelves for Blessed Trinity Academy's remodeled library.

Jason Hunkele: renovated the youth room at Ingomar United Methodist Church.

Ethan Knight: restored Duncan Heights Cemetery by clearing brush and building and installing a bench

Ryan Michael: built a paver walkway and bench for Christ Church Fox Chapel's Columbarium.

All eight Eagle Scouts are members of Troop 17, seniors at Hampton High School in Allison Park, and will be pursuing higher education in a variety of disciplines.

It's unusual to have so many scouts in one troop achieve the highest scouting rank and receive their awards together. The Eagle Scouts and their parents planned the outdoor ceremony, which had attendance of about 150 family and friends.

began to make a left hand turn onto Harts Run Road. As the operator was making the turn, the rear of the vehicle slid and struck the rear of another vehicle. While on scene, officers observed an oily substance covering the roadway at that location. Both vehicles were able to be driven from the scene. Officers followed the trail of oil and located a vehicle in Indiana Township that was responsible for the oily substance. The PTO had broken off of the vehicle, causing the hydraulic line to become damaged and leak. Traffic control was provided until the roadway was fully cleaned.

Pet Struck by Vehicle

On May 14, 2019 at 12:45 p.m., Hampton Township Police received a phone call from a resident who observed a vehicle strike a pet cat on Pere Marquette Drive. The reporting party stated that the driver appeared to be distracted and did not appear to be paying attention to the roadway at the time of the incident. The animal later died from the sustained injuries.

A friendly reminder from Hampton Township Police: When driv-

ing through neighborhoods and local roadways, residents are encouraged to obey the speed limits and pay attention while behind the wheel.

Dog Bite

(S) On May 11, 2019 at 1:33 p.m., Hampton Township Police responded to Hemlock Drive for a report of a dog bite. The responding officers were informed that the reporting party's dog had been attacked by another dog, causing injury. While the complainant was walking their dog, another dog was able to get off of its leash and attacked. The complainant's dog was taken to the vet for evaluation and treatment for the sustained injuries.

Animal Complaint

On April 27, 2019 at 11:25 p.m., Hampton Township Police were dispatched to Route 8 for a vehicle damage report. Upon the officer's arrival, they were advised by the

reporting party that there was a large object in the roadway that caused damage to their vehicle. The responding officer located a deceased black bear in the roadway, which was removed.

Vehicle Accident

On April 20, 2019 at 8:45 p.m., Hampton Township Police were dispatched to Wildwood Road, near Lucy Drive, for a vehicle that struck a utility pole. Upon arrival, officers spoke to the operator, who had sustained a minor injury as a result of the collision. The accident occurred when the operator was momentarily distracted while driving and struck the utility pole. Duquense Light Co. was notified of the property damage. The vehicle had also struck a fire and Shaler hydrant Hampton Water thority was notified. The vehicle sustained disabling damage and had to be towed from the scene.

On April 23, 2019 at 12:00 p.m., Hampton Township Police responded to Wildwood Road Extension and Talley Cavey Road for a two-vehicle accident with no reported injuries. Upon speaking with both operators, it was discovered that the accident occurred when one operator got distracted by an object blowing around inside the vehicle. This caused the vehicle to drift off of the roadway, striking the front of another vehicle that was stopped at an intersection. The vehicle then struck a guide rail at that location. Both vehicles had to be towed from the scene due to extensive damage.

On April 28, 2019 at 12:06 p.m., Hampton Township officers were dispatched to South Pioneer Road for a report of a disabled vehicle. While in route to the scene, officers were informed that the vehicle was over a hillside. Upon their arrival, officers located the vehicle over an embankment, with the driver and sole occupant standing outside of the car. The operator stated that they were traveling south on South Montour Road, when they lost control of the vehicle. The vehicle drove over an embankment and had to be removed by a tow truck.

On May 9, 2019 at 6:03 p.m., Hampton Township Police responded to Middle Road, at Wildwood Road Extension, for a two-vehicle accident. Upon arrival, both vehicles were found to still be in the roadway. Two of the involved parties initially complained of pain, and medics were requested at the scene. The accident occurred when one vehicle was traveling north on Middle Road and attempted to turn left onto Wildwood Road Extension. A second vehicle was traveling south on Middle Road, and was struck by the other vehicle as it attempted to turn left. One vehicle had to be towed from the scene and two of the involved persons were transported to the hospital by ambulance.

On May 13, 2019 at 2:39 p.m., Hampton Township Police responded to Route 8 for a two vehicle accident. Upon arrival, they located both involved vehicles in the area of Aldi. There were no injuries reported at the time of the crash. After

speaking with both involved operators, it was determined that the accident occurred when one operator was attempting to turn left onto Route 8 from a parking lot to then travel south. The operator was waved out by the driver of another vehicle stopped in the northbound curb lane of Route 8, however, failed to see a vehicle traveling in the northbound passing lane. The operator entered Route 8 and struck the oncoming vehicle. One vehicle had to be



towed from the scene.

On May 21, 2019 at 1:33 p.m., Hampton Township Police responded to Route 8, at Craighead Road, for a two-vehicle accident. Upon arrival, officers spoke to both operators and verified that there were no injuries as a result of the collision. The accident occurred when one vehicle operator attempted to merge from the southbound curb lane of Route 8 into the passing lane, striking another vehicle in the process. Both vehicles only sustained minor damage and were able to be driven from the scene.


Vehicle versus Motorcycle

On May 4, 2019 at 6:47 p.m., Hampton Township Police were dispatched to Ferguson Road for a two vehicle accident involving a motorcycle. One person was reported to be down on the ground, with observed injuries. Upon the officer's arrival, they located the two involved vehicles in the roadway. EMS personnel were already on scene tending to the injured party that was laying in the roadway. Both vehicles had to be towed from the scene due to damage. The injured party was transported to the hospital by ambulance.





All finalists' stories are available on the website: www.ht-sd.org. The finalists have the chance to be named "Reader's Choice Winner" in their category.


