Police Information

The Hampton Township Police Department is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life of our residents and guests by providing the very best in law enforcement services. The twenty-two officers and two civilian clerks take pride in serving the community in a professional and proactive manner. Thank you to the staff for helping to keep our community safe.

A summary of noteworthy incidents that occurred are listed below. These incident statistics included, but WERE NOT LIMITED TO, the following between the dates of 4/5/2022—5/18/2022:

Traffic Accident/Hit and Run

On April 23, 2022 at 2:14p.m., Hampton Township Police were dispatched to the 2400 block of Sample Road for a report of a hit and run accident. The accident occurred as the vehicle was traveling on Mt. Royal Blvd when another vehicle turned left out of Royalview Drive and struck the victim's vehicle. The vehicle operator was advised a report would be on file for their insurance company.

Traffic Accident/Property Damage

On May 18, 2022 at 8:25a.m., Hampton Township Police were dispatched to Hemlock Drive and Hemlock Drive II for a single-vehicle accident. Upon arrival, officers located the vehicle resting against a stop sign. The accident occurred as the driver was traveling on Hemlock II Drive towards Hemlock Drive when a deer ran in front of their vehicle. The vehicle swerved to miss the deer, and this caused them to strike the stop sign as a result. The vehicle had minor damage and was able to be driven from the scene.

Traffic Accident

On April 7, 2022 at 12:05p.m., Hampton Township Police were dispatched to Sheetz on William Flinn Highway for a report of a two-vehicle accident with no injuries. The accident occurred when one vehicle was stopped on West Hardies Road at the intersection of William Flinn Highway and the second vehicle struck them from behind. Yinz Girlz team was invited to the FIRST[®] (For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology) World Championship after they won the FIRST[®] LEGO[®] League Western Pennsylvania Grand Championship last December.

The FIRST[®] World Championship brought more than 800 teams from 43 countries to compete in FIRST[®] LEGO[®] League (FLL), FIRST Tech Challenge (FTC), and FIRST Robotics Competition (FRC) with a global audience of over 30,000 attendees under the same roof for this mega competition.

Yinz Girlz developed a prototype called YODA (Yinz Girlz Outstanding Drone Attachment) that serves as an emergency supplies delivery system via drones, to aid those stranded by floods, hurricanes, and war. The YODA contains supplies and life-saving items to keep the person(s) alive until the rescue teams arrive.

At the end of the three-day competition, the Yinz Girlz won the Core Values FIRST[®] Core Award. Values are the cornerstone of the FIRST® LEGO[®] League (FLL) program. This award recognizes the top team with extraordinary enthusiasm and team spirit, who apply what they have learned to improve the world.







fills and keep communities clean. Every year the amount of waste that avoids the landfill increases due to recycling. Hampton resident Meggie Spotts believes, "Recycling events are important because items can be disposed of properly, reused down the line, or the recyclables can be given a second chance." Laurie Rizzo, Owner/Editor for the Hampton News, couldn't agree more. "I am very passionate about helping to

conserve the landfills and instilling the concept into the younger generations," she says.

Al Todd, Consultant, Thrivent Financial, participates in the Recycle Rama every year with a bike drive. Todd commented, "We collected over 50 bikes through Recycle Rama. About 25 volunteers came to clean and repair the bikes so that we could donate them back into the community. We partner with several organizations and churches who deliver the bikes to underprivi-

leged families and children." Al and his team have become known as the "bicycle people." For about 5 years, they have been collecting bikes at events like the Recycle Rama in order to recycle them back into the community. It's also not unusual for people to drop bicycles at Al's office, as well!

Recycling paper is something we call all do! Have you ever driven by a paper mill? If you have, you know the smell immediately - something like rotten eggs and sulfur combined! If that isn't enough to make you think about recycling paper, keep this in mind: recycling one ton of paper saves 17 trees from being cut down! Representative Lori Mizgorski is a regular participant in the Recycle Rama. "I'm always pleased to participate in Hampton's Recycle Rama and host the paper shredding event. Every pound of paper we recycle is one pound less that ends up in a landfill. This year we recycled 8,200 pounds," advised Representative Mizgorski. Think about it- almost 70 trees saved just this year!

Also collected were 3 bulldozers full of scrap metal – including a metal swing set from another Hampton resident, Brian Bonar. Jason Reese, Rich Myros and others from Hampton Township's Department of Community Services assisted JVS Electronics with collecting TV's, computers, old VCR's, and DVD players.

The enthusiasm from the community is truly contagious; if you missed this year's event, you can be sure Recycle Rama will be back next year! If you want to start early, the GLASS recycling bins are always available next to the police station, and Mr. Todd is happy to accept bikes anytime at his office located at 1736 Ferguson Road (right next to Duncan Manor Animal Hospital) – they have a shed in the rear lot where bikes can be dropped off!

uring Remake Learning Days, several high school students shared projects they worked on this year. Two highlights were the results of impressive computer work by seniors in the Computer Science class.


Anthony diMaria and Patrick Sullivan paired up for a virtual reality (VR) workout project: Anthony handled hardware and



graders who carefully pointed out the unique features and learning opportunities in the courtyards that formerly housed old benches, overgrown planters, and gravel or concrete sitting areas. Today, thanks to creative planning focused on repurposing existing elements wherever possible—even making use of discarded turf from Fridley Field—teachers and their students experience hands-on learning in creative and engaging ways. From customdesigned nature tables, flexible seating options, and a magnetic wall to a butterfly garden (designed and maintained by students in the Junior Garden Club) and a beautiful mosaic created by students in collaboration with local artist Laura Jean McLaughin, the re-imagined outdoor spaces have elevated learning at the elementary level.

Principal Dr. Amy Kern and Enrichment Facilitator Mrs. Mary Fitzpatrick shared information on the development, planning, and execution of the project, which began in 2019. A dedicated team of educators and sponsors along with Blue Fox Landscape Design and Lady Fox Gardening transformed the courtyards into outdoor classrooms that make learning exciting; once the pandemic hit, the team was grateful to already have a plan in mo-

tion for redesigning their outdoor learning space. Thanks to grants from the HAEE, the Spectroscopy Society of Pittsburgh, Highmark, PPG, and the Central PTO, the Innovative Learning team was able to transform the courtyards with a realistic plan that would serve the elementary students while fostering partnerships with middle and high school students.

Guests next traveled up the road to Hampton Middle School where they were treated to HHS AP Computer Science and AP Research student poster presentations showcasing monthslong projects exploring a range of topics. Outside the presentation area, a group of art students offered jewelry, tote bags, and ceramics for sale to raise money for Angels' Place, a local family development program. Operating out of the art elective classes, Hampton Creates is a student-run business aimed at channeling artistic skills to create and sell unique products to raise money for charity.

Later, guests explored the middle school's special learning opportunities, including the groundbreaking HMS Studios as well as the new Learning Pavilion (featured in the Fall 2021 issue of *Hampton Magazine*). Visitors were invited to explore each studio, including the newest addition, a hydroponics section for grow-

ing herbs and spices. As the day's events concluded, it was apparent that the innovative learning spaces within the HTSD are the ideal definition of what it takes to *Remake Learning*.


