Police Information

The Hampton Township Police Department is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life of our residents and guests by providing the very best in law enforcement services. Thank you to the staff for helping to keep our community safe.

A summary of noteworthy incidents that occurred are listed below. The remaining December reports will be updated in March. These incident statistics included, but WERE NOT LIMITED TO, the following between the dates of 4/06/2023 - 5/11/2023:

Vehicle Accident

On 04/06/2023, HTP responded to a two-vehicle accident with no injuries or tows. The accident was said to have occurred when one vehicle was backing out of a driveway and crashed into an oncoming vehicle. Both vehicles were able to be driven from the scene.

On 4/7/2023, at 12:12 pm, HTP responded to a two-vehicle accident on Rt 8 southbound near Hampton Plaza. One vehicle was struck in the rear while stopped in the left lane waiting for an opportunity to make a left turn. Both occupants were wearing their seatbelts, and no injuries were reported. No tows were needed.

On 05/02/2023 at 9:14 pm, HTP were dispatched to Wildwood Sample Rd. for a single-vehicle accident with entrapment. The vehicle was said to have struck a telephone pole, which embedded the vehicle in wires.

Upon arrival, officers observed the vehicle had struck guide wires coming from a telephone pole but did not cause any damage to the pole itself. Duquesne Light was still notified to check the guide wires. The driver was not trapped inside the vehicle, and no live wires were involved. The driver was conscious, alert and denied any injuries. The driver stated she was driving southbound on Wildwood Sample Rd. when an oncoming vehicle drifted slightly into her lane causing her to swerve to avoid a collision. It should be noted, the roads were wet/

Student Documentary Offers Insight into Staging a Musical

Hampton schools are teeming with talent, from scholars and athletes to artists of all kinds. Some of that talent recently graced the high school stage in the spring musical, *Something Rotten*, which played to sell-out crowds before garnering multiple nominations from the Gene Kelly Awards for Excellence in High School Musical Theater. While theater-goers were treated to a polished extravaganza, few understand all it takes to put on a high school musical, and that's where junior David Poirier comes in: after months spent filming, interviewing, and editing, David created a 70-minute documentary that provides a behind-the-scenes look at staging the show.

The idea was born when David played viola in the pit orchestra for last year's production of *Into the Woods*, and he found himself enthralled by the experience and intrigued by the other groups involved. He was impressed by the interplay of the cast, crew, and orchestra as they worked for months, both independently and together, to create the show.

"After being in the pit," David recounts, "I wanted to find a way to be a part of all the different aspects that were going on. It was clear everyone in the cast, crew, and orchestra had their own voice and perspective, so I thought I'd like to try to grasp that voice and find the candid perspective of what it takes to make a musical production."

After deciding a documentary film was the best way to touch on all elements of the production, David began his journey as a first-time filmmaker by inviting other students to join in. Ninthgrader Kulthoom Fatema Dinani happily added her name to the list, offering invaluable support filming clips while David was busy in stage crew.

Reflecting on the experience, which afforded him a front-row seat to the entire musical process, David says, "It was great to be there from beginning to end, which is something I wasn't able to

do when I was in the pit. I could make my own schedule and decide where to go each day so I could stay on top of the entire process."

While David and Kulthoom did not begin this project with an eye toward awards, the film caught the eye of the Gene Kelly Awards judges, and they earned the first-ever HHS nomination for Outstanding Student Artists. In sharing news of the nomination, show director Dan Franklin praised the documentarians, proudly noting, "It was such a great idea and I'm so glad [they] ran with it!"

With a bit of virtual fanfare, David sent a link of the finalized film to all members of the company of *Something Rotten* on May 19. Just a week later, he stood on the Benedum stage with his fellow nominees at the Kelly Awards, taking in the moment with a sense of humility and pride. No Horsing Around!

Hampton Middle School sixth-grader Ellie Hetrick has always loved animals. She started leisurely riding horses at her Papa's (grandfather's) farm when she was little and began taking horseback lessons in first grade. Now she rides in local shows with Lunar Hill Equestrian, with owner/trainer Rebecca Francis. Hetrick began competing in horse shows in the fall of 2021.

Most recently, Hetrick and her horse partner Lucky Charm competed in the Western PA Quarter Horse Association's Jump Into The Show Season Hunter/Jumper Schooling Show on May 13 and 14 in Harlansburg, PA. She ribboned with two second places and a third place in the Canter Cross Rails event and two Flat Class events. The Cross Rails event involves riding through a course multiple times where the horse walks, trots, and canters and also requires jumping rails that are positioned like an X. On some runs, the rider is



judged and on others the horse is judged. The Flat Classes are similar to "Simon Says" but on a horse.

"My favorite part (about competing) is the feeling of accomplishment. It's different every time and my family gets to watch it," said Hetrick. She explained that the sport can be dangerous, and the rider needs to be prepared for any unpredictability from the horse. "You are controlling a 1,000 lb. animal with your thighs," said Hetrick. "It's really fun after you get over the nerves."

Some of the highlight performances included Mt. Joy, who broke into the Grateful Dead's *Fire on the Mountain,* The Revivalists with a high energy performance, The Head and the Heart, and Stephen Sanchez and Matt Maeson, two up-and-coming singersongwriters with a wide following.

The headliner on Saturday night was Hozier who performed his famous song *Take Me to Church* with the crowd singing right along. The weekend concluded with Jason Mraz, an artist whose career has spanned nearly three decades. Mraz did not disappoint, playing his greatest hits, making the crowd laugh with his light-hearted personality, and allowing his band, including many female musicians, to shine on stage.

WonderWorks was a well-organized, safe event with plenty of free water for the attendees, shade and places to cool off from the heat, and of-course, some amazing live music.

"At this point in my life, I probably wouldn't travel to a music festival. But to have one in my own backyard, where I can go home and sleep in my own bed in between, is impossible to pass up," said local resident, Steph Straub. "It was an awesome time."

In addition to winning Best Musical, Hampton was recognized in Budget Category IV for Best Scenic Design, Best Costume Design, Best Lighting Design and Best Dance Ensemble. Hampton senior Brooks Brady won the award for Best Supporting Actor for his portrayal of Thomas Nostradamus. The show was nominated for a total of ten awards out of 13 categories, with other nominations for Best Actor (Kai Suyama), Outstanding Student Artist (David Poirier and Kulthoom Dinani), Best Crew and Technical Execution (Budget IV), and Best Vocal Ensemble (Budget IV).

Brady accepted his award on the Benedum stage and gave a moving speech thanking his family, directors and friends for always pushing him to do his best. "When I heard my name, my legs turned to jelly. I was shocked, and yet so unbelievably honored," said Brady. When asked later about his experience, Brady added, "Getting to know so many great people both through our show and during this past week (at Kelly rehearsals) has been amazing. Being around kids who are just as passionate about theatre as I am is something truly special. I'm never going to forget it."

The opening number for the awards ceremony featured the semi-finalists and nominees for 2023. Hampton Best Actor nominee Kai Suyama, who played Nick Bottom, Best Supporting Actress semi-finalist Marissa Martinoski, who played Portia, and Brady all were part of this energetic performance. Cast members Aja Lynn and Giulia Mauro, in turn, sang and danced in the moving finale with students from all 32 participating GKA schools.


