Every year, HHS Band Director Chad Himmler and his team of fellow teachers and parent volunteers lead the high school's marching band students on a trip to participate in a parade and explore the region. For just the second time in HHS marching band history, this year's group

boarded buses bound for Louisville, Kentucky, to march in the Pegasus Parade, the cornerstone event of the Kentucky Derby Festival. The parade was held on Sunday, April 28, with the theme of *Celebrating Derby 150*.

In selecting parades to consider for

the annual trips, Chad and his team take great care to avoid conflicts with events such as the spring musical, prom, AP testing, Keystone testing, the Gene Kelly Awards, and color guard competitions. They also search for opportunities that

Blue Light Police Week

The idea started with changing the bulb on a lamppost. It quickly became a symbol of the Hampton community coming together to honor and remember Sgt. Robert Kirsopp for his 25 years of dedicated service to Hampton Township. National Police Week was May 12-18th so it was a perfect time to light up Hampton in blue.

The Hampton Township Police Department (HTPD) is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life of our residents and guests by providing the very best in law enforcement services. Thank you to the staff for helping to keep our community safe.

A summary of noteworthy incidents that occurred are listed below. These incident statistics included, but WERE NOT LIMITED TO, the following between the dates of 4/21/2024—5/10/2024:

SCAM

On May 10, HTP were notified of a "CATFISHING" type scam. A resident reported that he decided to purchase a vehicle that he found on Facebook Marketplace, and he messaged the seller who requested a deposit of \$150.00 to come see the vehicle. After sending the deposit via Chime he went to the address provided and the people who lived there were not selling any vehicles.

The resident was advised to contact CHIME and try to retrieve his \$150. It was explained that the suspects did not use their true names and how "CATFISHING" scams work.

DUI ARREST

On May 5, a HTP officer was dispatched to the area of Ferguson Road and Wyland Avenue for a report of a single vehicle accident with unknown injuries. The officer arrived on scene and located a single vehicle off the roadway of Ferguson Road against a guardrail and tree. Contact was made with the operator who denied injury. While speaking with the operator outside of the vehicle, the officer smelled the odor of an alcoholic beverage coming from the operator's person. Based on the field sobriety tests the operator

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was placed under arrest for suspicion of DUI. The vehicle was towed by Leo's Towing.

VEHICLE ACCIDENT

On April 1, HTP were dispatched to the intersection of Route 8 and Craighead Road, for a vehicle accident. Upon arrival, a rear end collision was observed. The accident was said to have happened when Unit 1 was traveling behind Unit 2 northbound on Route 8 and Unit 2 stopped to turn left onto Craighead Road. Unit 1 stated that when both vehicles were in transit, another vehicle in front of him switched into the right lane. At that time, he saw Unit 2 waiting to turn left onto Craighead Road and was unable to stop in time and crashed into Unit 2. Shaler Hampton EMS was on scene and evaluated one driver. Hampton Fire units arrived on the scene and cleaned up the MS4 portion of this accident. Both vehicles were towed to Zang's Towing.

On April 28, HTP were dispatched to the intersection of Cedar Ridge Rd. and Middle Rd. for the report of an accident involving a motorcycle. Upon arrival, contact was made with both occupants of the motorcycle and confirmed that the female passenger was injured. The motorcycle operator stated that he was travelling north on Middle Rd and as he made the right hand turn onto Cedar Ridge

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have not been offered for at least three years, and, once they've created a list of possibilities, Chad completes applications and sends audition videos of the band's most recent field shows and parade performances. In assessing possible parades for 2024, the team identified the Pegasus Parade as the ideal location for this year, confident that the students would find the itinerary enjoyable.

Stretching for 17 blocks down a spectator-lined street in the heart of Louisville, the parade stepped off under sunny skies, ushering in Derby Week to celebrate the 150th Run for the Roses. "The audience was very large and enthusiastic, which was very nice," Chad reports. "The Pegasus Parade is a little longer than most parades," he continues, "with a length of 1.7 miles plus the distance in the staging area; when it was over, we had marched about 2.3 miles after playing our parade song 27 times. This parade," he adds, applauding the perseverance of his students, "included many notable people involved in the Kentucky Derby in addition to floats and some stand-still celebrity performances; consequently, it was a long parade. Combine that with the 84-degree temperature, and it was definitely a test of endurance."

In addition to the parade, the students enjoyed a range of other activities while on the trip, including attending a performance of the musical "Six" in Cincinnati as well as a day at Kings Island amusement park. They also visited the Churchill Downs museum and were able to see the racetrack from the front row of seats.

A particular highlight from the trip occurred on the first day, when the group stopped for lunch. Chad shares, "The students enjoyed a surprise flash mob performance from an Ohio State University pep band prior to lunch on our first day. Michael

Bacasa, a 2022 Hampton graduate and current member of the OSU marching band, put together a group of about 25 band members to surprise our students. In fact," he adds, "the lunch at Ohio State was received so well, we've decided to stop at Notre Dame next year for dinner as we travel to Chicago for the St. Patrick's Day parade."

As the school year winds down and the marching season officially comes to a close, Chad is quite pleased to have experienced his second trip to the Pegasus Parade with this particular group: "We had 123 students out of 139 who chose to participate on the trip," he reports, "and they did a great job both in and out of performance. They conducted themselves well and represented Hampton High School with aplomb, and," he adds with pride, "they were a pleasure to travel with."

Long-time Hampton resident Ron Verdi is running his way into his 70th year. Verdi competed in the 2024 Pittsburgh full Marathon, his 35th, and placed 2nd in the 65-69 age bracket. "Some young kid that was 66 beat me," joked Verdi. His love of running began when he went into the service, the 82nd Airborne Division, where they ran every morning.

Verdi continues to run 3-4 times a week, either at North Park or at the new running trail in Hampton. He completed every Hampton Park survey to get a running trail in Hampton and former Municipal Manager Chris Lochner told him it would be the last thing he did so he didn't have to move it or change it. Lochner delivered on his promise.

"I'm excited about October, when I turn 70, to run on

the week of my birth-day," said Verdi. He will run the marathon in Emerald Isle, NC or in Nashville, TN and will be able to say he ran marathons in four decades; his 40's, 50's, 60's and 70's. "It has a lot to do with attitude. It's good for the mind, the body and the soul," said Verdi. He typically



clocks 35 miles a week but when marathon training, he runs about 50 miles a week. "I listen to my body and just put one foot in front of the other."

Verdi enjoys running with his running group, City of Bridges Run Club, and new members are welcome. Interested runners can find them online at https://www.cityofbridgesrunclub.com or on Facebook. When asked his favorite part of running, he said it is all of the great people he has met over the years. Verdi has been running with some friends for 20 years, spent time running with his son when he was younger, and completed the Niagara Falls marathon with his daughter where they started in the US and ran over the border to Canada.

Verdi is retired from the Post Office and works 4 hours a night at the North Branch of CCAC. He loves spending time with his family; his wife Cindy, son Brian, daughter-in-law Katie, granddaughters Sylvia and Hazel, daughter and son-in law Lisa and Ryan McHugh, and his granddaughter Eleanor, who all live in Hampton.



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Where Are They Now?

2017 Grad Making a Mark on the Local Music Scene

In 2010, when then-fifth grader Ann Hodos took to the stage for the first time in the Wyland Elementary talent show, she revealed a secret: she could sing! Fast forward to today, and the 2017 HHS alum is the lead singer of the band The Altered Egos, a group that's quickly gaining a following in the region as they regularly play venues like The Hard Rock Cafe and Jergel's. The lead guitarist and founder of the band just so happens to be Ann's dad, Eric, a former financial executive who left corporate America to explore entrepreneurial dreams; aside from the band, Eric is opening a coffee shop and he recently published the first in a series of children's books titled *The Evening Before the Morning*

of the Kitty Kat Parade. Together, Ann and Eric are a literal dynamic duo who chase their dreams with fierce determination.

Ann's music aspirations began as a youngster when she took piano lessons and, soon after that, voice lessons. The joy she found in singing led Ann to explore opportunities for performing, beginning with the stages in Hampton's schools. She credits the district's music and theatre departments with supporting her love of music, both vocal and instrumental.

You know, you grow up in these places and you always imagine yourself on those stages, and when it becomes within your grasp, it's fun to think about."

As for now, The Altered Egos have a packed schedule of shows, and they recently completed work with Sunset Place Recording Studio on their first album of original songs. 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Imagine you're told that your services are no longer needed at your place of work. Then, you discover you cannot seek similar employment with a new institution in your area for up to two years because your signature on a piece of paper vacated that right.

This is a real dilemma facing health care workers throughout Pennsylvania due to restrictive covenants (i.e. non-competes). Not only does such a constraint affect the livelihood and finan-

cial stability of essential health care workers and their families, but patients are also left completely in the dark as to the sudden disappearance of their doctors and are forced into what could turn into a long and arduous process in finding a new physician.

That's why I've collaborated with state Rep. Dan Frankel, majority chair of the PA House Health Committee, on H.B. 1633, which would ban non-competes in Pennsylvania. The bill passed the House 150-50 and now heads to the state Senate for consideration.

As a physician-legislator, I know that non-competes unnecessarily restrict patient access to the clinician of their choice and make our state a less-desirable place

for health professionals to practice. Pennsylvania is also one of only a handful of states without a law on the books to deter noncompetes. I call upon the members of the state Senate to do what's best for both health care workers and their patients and move H.B. 1633 a step closer to becoming law.

Increasingly, I hear from pharmacies (especially our small, local pharmacies) that reimbursements no longer cover what it costs them to purchase drugs, let alone what it costs them to dispense prescriptions to their customers. These challenges mean that pharmacies run the risk of not being able to stay open—and for those independent, local pharmacies that our families have relied on for generations, the risks are even higher.

To help protect our small businesses, I've joined my colleagues Senator Judy Ward and Senator Tina Tartaglione in co-sponsoring Senate Bill 1000, which would regulate Pharmacy Benefit Managers (PBMs). Rep. Rob Mercuri: Returning Surplus Funds to Taxpayers Promotes Growth & Fiscal Responsibility

Pennsylvania's state Legislature finds itself in a unique situation as we prepare for the annual budget. Led by House Republicans' fiscally responsible approach and the hard working taxpayers across PA, the Commonwealth's Rainy Day Fund and General Fund surplus have grown into a record sum, totaling more than \$12 billion. By the end of the 2023-24 fiscal year, the balance of the Rainy Day fund alone is projected to be at least \$6.4 billion, well over 10% of annual tax revenues.

In moments of surplus, it is often tempting for government officials to come up with new ways to spend and new programs to establish in order to project sense of accomplishment to voters and constituents. However, the flaw in this argument and line of thinking is what often plagues expensive governments - the recurring cost of maintenance for new programs and in efficiency of government in providing goods and services to the public. Rather than allowing offi-

cials to exploit these funds as it so often done, leading to unsustainable, future expenditures, I have introduced legislation to directly refund more of the taxpayers' hard-earned

House Bill 2282 would establish the 2024 Taxpayer Dividend Program, which provides a one-time dividend to taxpayers who filed their 2023 Personal Income Tax returns in a timely manner. The dividend would come from a portion of the surplus and could return up to \$1,000 per taxpayer. This initiative can be achieved while protecting the statutory goal of keeping 6% of the General Fund revenues in the Rainy Day Fund to keep fiscal responsibility at the forefront, while supporting taxpayers instead of more inefficient government overhead.

This rebate would go a long way in helping our families combat rising costs on essentials, groceries and gas. Our families know best how to spend their money, and their investment will drive economic growth. This is a significant but responsible action we can take to help our taxpayers and is a win-win for Pennsylvanians. I look forward to working to keep our state budget fiscally responsible and delivering this win for the taxpayers of our Com-



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


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
