HHS Alum Steve Byrne Brings Comedy Fundraiser to Pittsburgh

Since discovering his gift for making people laugh, Hampton High School alumnus Steve Byrne has forged a successful career as a comedian and actor. Though he now lives in Nashville and travels all over the world sharing his quick wit and wry humor to sell-out crowds, Steve is always pleased when he's able to bring his show home to Pittsburgh. He'll do just that this summer when he partners with the Mario Lemieux Foundation for the Third Annual Comedy Jam, a fundraising event that directly benefits the local charity dedicated to funding cancer research and supporting patients and their families.

The show is set for July 20 at the Rivers Casino, where Steve will share the stage with an impressive slate of performers, each presenting 10 minutes of comedy and a song with the show's band. The all-star line-up will include Saturday Night Live's Colin Jost along with Peter Billingsley, Gary Cannon, Bill Crawford, Joe Derosa, Joe Gatto, Joel Ozborn, and Roy Wood Jr. Hosted by Josh Adam Meyers, this year's show marks the third time Steve has called on famous friends to work with him to support the Lemieux Foundation. Explaining how the now-annual event got its start, Steve says an experience at the Mario Lemieux Fantasy Hockey Camp—one of the Lemieux Foundation's biggest fundraisers—is what inspired him to find a novel way to support the charity.

"A few years ago," explains the devoted Pens fan and one-time member of the HHS hockey team, "I was invited to perform at the camp along with Bill Burr. We told jokes at a dinner reception, and we got to skate with Mario Lemieux and a number of hall-of-famers, which was a dream come true for me." Police Information

The Hampton Township Police Department (HTPD) is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life of our residents and guests by providing the very best in law enforcement services. Thank you to the staff for helping to keep our community safe.

A summary of noteworthy incidents that occurred are listed below. These incident statistics included, but WERE NOT LIMITED TO, the following between the dates of 1/12/2024—2/13/2024:

Township Ordinance Violation

On February 12, 2024, at 12:11 p.m., HTPD and fire units were dispatched to the area of Greenwood Drive for a report of a loud bang heard by the caller and a large amount of smoke coming from the hillside. Once on scene, an open outdoor fire was located. The fire was approximately 10 feet by 10 feet in diameter and approximately 4 feet high. The fire also did not have any surrounding perimeter. The residents were advised of the township ordinance that prohibits fires any larger than 4 feet by 4 feet in diameter along with a surrounding perimeter. A garden hose was used by the resident to put the fire out. All parties involved were given a verbal warning.

Hit and Run

On February 12, 2024, HTPD were contacted for a hit and run report. The person reported that his vehicle had been struck overnight at his residence at Devlin's Point. When he left for work on this date around 6:00 a.m., he noticed minor damage.

On February 13, 2024, HTPD was advised that the driver of the vehicle that hit and ran the vehicle contacted Devlin's Point management office to provide her information. The driver was contacted by an officer via phone. It was reported that she was dropping a friend off in the parking lot of Thoroughbred Court on 2/12/2024 between 1:30-2:00 a.m., when she backed into the vehicle, causing damage to the front bumper/headlight area. She told the officer that she did not contact the police because the owner of the vehicle was not on scene and her friend did not know who the vehicle belonged to. The officer advised that she is required to exchange pertinent information with the other party involved in a collision in the Commonwealth of PA.

DUI Arrest

On February 10, 2024, HTPD participated in a joint North Hills DUI Taskforce detail. At 9:39 p.m., a traffic stop was conducted which resulted in a DUI arrest.



Scouts Spread Happiness Through Cookie Sales

It's that time of year, when the inviting scent of cookies hangs in the air, courtesy of Hampton Girl Scouts who spent much of February selling boxes of treats to customers around the township. If you missed your neighborhood scout on her rounds, no need to worry, because sales will continue through much of this month as the girls fill preorders and reorders. Troop cookie



booth sales are also underway, with local booth sales running from March 1st through March 24th. You also can directly order cookies anytime using the QR code provided here; the link will remain available until the end of the day on March 24th.

Second-grade Brownie Troop 16720 is one of several troops in

Hampton, and these youngsters have found themselves quite busy as of late. Co-leader Stephanie Moran, who also serves as Cookie Manager for the Hampton Service Unit, explains that the troop consists of 22 girls from local elementary schools, including one from Pine-Richland. Along with cookie sales, the girls have been working toward badges, with recent meetings focused on the Science of Color badge. In January, the girls created color wheels and conducted experiments, and they will complete the badge work at a future meeting when they make colorful bandanas and flower art.

"They are an awesome group of girls," Stephanie says with a smile. "We're moving into "Cookie Booth" sales this month, and we'll have booths scattered across Hampton, plus one at Ross Park Mall."

Stephanie and her team kicked off Girl Scout cookie season with an all-Hampton Service Unit Cookie Rally on January 8th. Held in the HHS cafeteria, the rally was attended by 74 Hampton

scouts who rotated through eight stations and made tools for cookie season, including goal charts, cookie menus, and beaded lanyards highlighting their goal. They also participated in games and crafts to help



them learn about the cookies, their customers, and how to make sales.

All the girls' hard work is aimed at raising funds to support their troop, two separate sleepover events (one at Oglebay Resort and a second at the North Park scout cabin), and a local charity. Last year, after a particularly enlightening field trip, the girls selected Sara's Pets and Plants in Sharpsburg as their charity; to select this year's charity, the scouts will vote—using the learned badge skill of democracy—on the local charities/nonprofits that have most inspired them in the past year.

Wastewater Treatment Facility Construction Nears the Halfway Mark

On a cold, windy day in January, all five Hampton Township Council members and new Municipal Manager Ryan Jeroski donned their parkas, hats, and boots to set out on a tour of the construction zone at the new wastewater treatment facility. The tour was led by Environmental Services Director James Degnan, who provided background information and an overview of the plan before leading the group on a walkthrough. Though council mem-Carolynn Johnson Dr. (President), Bethany Blackburn (Vice-President), and Julie Fritsch have toured the facility a few times since the groundbreaking in 2022, this was the first opportunity for the two newest members of Council—Alfred Midgley IV and Daniel Sciulli—to see the facility firsthand.

"Construction is moving along quite well," Dr. Johnson reports. "After touring the project a couple of times before, we've now hit an interesting phase; it's getting to the point now where you can see the buildings taking shape. So," she goes on, "when you're looking at the plan, you can actually see where things are being built. It's definitely starting to come to life."

After a multitude of pandemic-related delays during the initial planning phases of the project, the team is pleased to see that things are currently moving along quite smoothly. Now approximately halfway through construction, the project is well on schedule despite some short-term concerns.

Dr. Johnson explains, "We've been very fortunate; there were several times when we thought we were going to have supply issues and yet we were able to get in the needed materials on time. Of course, we're hoping that will continue."

Another positive aspect of the project is that former Municipal Manager Chris Lochner, who was deeply involved in the initial phases, has agreed to stay on as a consultant until the construction is completed.

"Chris has been involved with this from the beginning," Dr. Johnson says, "so he's intimately familiar with the planning and all of the players. We are extraordinarily fortunate that he has agreed to do so. This is the largest capital improvement project that the township has ever undertaken, so to have that kind of continuity is definitely going to be very valuable as we move forward."



Everything You Ever Needed to Know About Acquiring a Permit

As the Planning Director for Hampton Township, I understand that educational outreach is an important part of my job. To that end, I am happy to write a short column for the Hampton News to explain permitting and land-use topics and answer frequently asked questions.

One question I get asked often is, "What things need a permit in Hampton?" The short answer is, Hampton requires a permit for most types of exterior changes to your property. This includes some types of grading work, installing paving larger than 400 square feet, keeping certain animals (such as chickens, horses, or bees), and constructing various types of structures. Permits, while they may be inconvenient, serve to protect the value of your property, your neighbors' properties, and the community at large. They also help to protect certain types of vulnerable environmental areas, as well as areas of private and public utility lines and infrastructure.

When it comes to the question of whether your specific project will require a permit, it's best to just contact the Permitting Office to ask. Different types of structures have different regulations, and circumstances may dictate whether a permit is needed. However, here is a list of common structures that DO require a permit in Hampton:

Fences

Sheds

Decks

Garages

Hot Tubs

Pools

Carports

Pavilions/Pergolas

Walls

Roofed play structures

Please note, that this article is certainly not a complete listing of all types of regulated activities. So, as I said above, please contact the Permitting Office if you plan on making an exterior change to your property and we can help you determine if a permit is needed.

Medical Debt Relief included in Shapiro's budget proposal

Recently, Gov. Josh Shapiro addressed members of the legislature, providing us with his budget proposals for fiscal year 2024-25 and including the Medical Debt Relief Program that I authored and championed.

Last year, I introduced the Medical Debt Relief Act (H.B. 78) with state Reps. Donna Bullock, D-Phila.; Tarik Khan, D-Phila.; Bridget Kosierowski, D-Lackawanna, and Nick Pisciottano, D-Allegheny. My legislation, and Gov. Shapiro's proposal, would establish the Medical Debt Relief Program within the Department of Health to

discharge the medical debt of eligible Pennsylvanians by contracting with a medical debt relief coordinator. It would also require hospitals to inform patients of their financial assistance programs and help patients apply when eligible

While the Medical Debt Relief Act legislation passed in the PA House of Representatives on a bipartisan basis, it has yet to receive a vote in the Senate. Now, with Gov. Shapiro's proposal, we have the opportunity to appropriate \$4 million to alleviate up to \$400 million in medical debt in collections in Pennsylvania.

As an emergency physician, I once treated a woman who delayed breast cancer treatment due to her medical debt. As a result, the cancer spread, and she died. By alleviating medical debt, we ensure patients have access to health care, aid providers with struggling finances, and reduce the financial burdens that affect all of us.

With more than 10% of Pennsylvanians having an average of \$1,473 in medical debt in collections, this burden prevents them from accessing health care, in addition to contributing to financial strains. Alleviating medical debt would be a win for all Pennsylvanians, and I am thrilled to work with Gov. Shapiro to make this a reality.
