

#### Al's Bike Drive

This is the 12<sup>th</sup> year for Al's Bike Drive and this year promises to be bigger and better than ever. Each year, Al Todd and his colleagues at Thrivent Financial raise money to buy bicycles to donate to The Marines Toys For Tots Program. Last year, a total of 1073 bikes were donated and distributed by Toys for Tots all over the southwestern PA region.

This year is a bit different because the Marines have asked to include helmets for the younger bike recipients (5-8 year olds). They have also requested some scooters and ride-on as well as over 500 bike locks. However, bikes are still the main focus of Al's Bike Drive and will comprise the majority of the donation this year. Al's group is working with Walmart in Gibsonia to purchase the bikes. The bikes will be assembled by Walmart employees and headed up by store manager Ryan Pavelchik.

Twelve years ago, Al saw a real need in the Toys For Tots program and wanted to find a way to give children a new bike for Christmas. When you donate funds directly to the Toys for Tots Program, there's a limit to what the Marines can spend on a toy. The monetary limit is \$30. Anything bigger, like a bicycle, must be donated directly. That's where Al and his team come in. Al's Bike drive supports two Marine groups who distribute the bicycles to

#### **Incredimoles** Take Over Chem Lab

smoke accompanied by "oohs" and "ahhs" from spectators—just another extraordinary day in Mr. Kenneth Kemmer's AP Chemistry class at Hampton High School. The students were celebrating National Mole Day on Wednesday, October 23, marking what many consider a high holiday for chemistry enthusiasts. Celebrated annually on this date from 6:02 a.m. to 6:02 p.m. to commemorate the mole, a measuring unit in chemistry based on Avogadro's number (6.022 x 10<sup>23</sup>), National Mole Day was officially created in 1991 to foster excitement about chemistry. Measuring the quantity of exceptionally small entities such as atoms or molecules, the mole is a unit of quantity in the same way that dozen, case, gross, and score are units of quantity.

Mole Day has become an annual event for Kemmer's senior students, effectively marking a rite of passage for many who plan to pursue careers in science. Some members of the class admit their interest was ignited three years ago when, as sophomores, they observed the demonstrations for the first time, and they're thrilled to finally be the scientists standing at the front of the classroom.

Throughout the day, the students performed a series of demonstrations for classmates and younger students as well as faculty and staff who showed up to support their scientific curiosity. After selecting their theme of The Incredimoles, the young chemists worked for weeks to perfect their presentations, all of which involved impressive chemical reactions. They explained the processes behind the experiments and discussed their real-life applications, and

even swearing to uphold the Ten Commolements. In a show of team spirit, the class wore tee shirts emblazoned with a student-Glowing liquids, flashes of fire, and bursts of swirling designed logo on the front and, appropriately, the single word science. on the back.






#### An Amazing Run for Girls Soccer



evening from many, though not all, residents. Dr. Gregory Hoeper, from the Nutri-pharmacy on Wildwood Road with almost 100 pages of research on electro-magnetic radiation from 4G technology.

Mark and Sarah Caderatte spear-headed the meeting and wanted to remind everyone that (they) are not anti-technology. We just want to make sure everything is safe before they go ahead with this. We are all for technology as long as it's safe."

This small-cell unit is being proposed by Crown Castle, a company that has been hired by Sprint. Sprint's research showed that there is a gap in the network and wants to improve its performance in the area.

The tower would reach about 33 feet high and be placed in the front yard of 2995 Haberlein Road, right across the street from Poff Elementary. The owners of the property, the Cubarney family, are adamant that they do not want the tower to go in. At the Council meeting at the community center on October 23<sup>rd</sup>, their daughter spoke on their behalf, saying, "this proposed tower has caused my parents a lot of stress and anxiety, and they are worried about their property value and the kids of Poff most of all."

Crown Castle representatives were on hand at the council meeting to answer questions and try to quell concerns. Their representative said that the tower will be in compliance with all FCC standards and that they are simply trying to "enable the services that make life enjoyable."

Resident, Chris Farmakis, stood up to speak in support of the tower. "This is the technology that's coming and we can't do anything to stop it," he said. "There is probably more radiation coming from your kids iPads and cell phones than there will be emitted from the tower."

While the Crown Castle representative did say this is a 4G tower with comparable radiation to a standard household appliance, he did not say that he could promise that it wouldn't be transformed into a 5G tower later down the road. Once the tower is installed there would be nothing to stop this from happening.

The council's position seemed to be that they do not support the installation of the tower but that their hands are tied. If Crown Castle is indeed found to be a public utility, then council has no power over the state and federal governments to stop it. And if the Pennsylvania Supreme Court (this is currently in litigation) finds that they are not a public utility and they apply for conditional usage, then the council would need a viable and legal reason to deny their request based on zoning standards. If zoning standards are met, they would have no choice but to approve.

This did not deter the residents in the room. They are motivated to find a way to post-pone this tower until more research can be done. Mark Caderatte told the council. "We'll go through the legal system, our politicians or whatever it takes to keep our kids safe."
