## **Police Log**

The Hampton Township Police Department is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life of our residents and guests by providing the very best in law enforcement services. The twenty-two officers and two civilian clerks take pride in serving the community in a professional and proactive manner. Thank you to the staff for helping to keep our community safe.

A summary of noteworthy incidents that occurred are listed below. These incident statistics included, but WERE NOT LIMITED TO, the following between the dates of 8/24/2021—9/24/2021:

DUI

On September 11 at 9:10p.m., Hampton Township Police were dispatched to the area of William Flinn Highway and Wildwood Road Extension for a report of an intoxicated driver. An officer located the vehicle traveling at a high rate of speed and saw both tires cross over the double yellow line. A traffic stop was initiated near Zang's Auto Body. Upon approaching the vehicle, the officer could immediately detect on odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from the vehicle. Officers requested the driver submit to Standard Field Sobriety Tests. Based on the totality of the circumstances, the driver was placed under arrest for suspicion of DUI.


### Aquinas Academy Seniors Recognized for Scholastic Excellence



### Kazemi and Liebro Honored by Hampton Township School District

HTSD recognized two high school seniors, Kiana Kazemi and Lindsay Liebro, during the October 4 School Board meeting for their outstanding achievements in academics and arts.

During the meeting, Kiana presented an overview of her AP Research paper entitled, "Decision Making and Rationality: Adults and Teenagers in the Prisoner's Dilemma," that was recently published in the peer-reviewed academic journal The Young Researcher. Her paper was one of 17 papers chosen for publication in Volume 5 from over 200 submissions.

The following is an abstract of her paper: "Human decision -making is largely analyzed by the field of behavioral game theory; however, little research has been done to compare adults' and teenagers' decision-making in game theory scenarios. A comparison of the two age groups could help future research-

In 1997, the PIAA and WPIAL launched the program entitled "SPORTSMANSHIP: The Only Piece Missing is You". The purpose of the program is to promote sportsmanship in the schools and to reward those schools that best demonstrate the elements of good sportsmanship.

### Talbots Are Hounding Their Best Season in Football Program History

The Hampton Talbots have concluded the regular season with a 10-0 record and look to have their best season in program history heading into the playoffs. The Talbots already clinched the Greater Allegheny Conference before their last two regular-season games; both were decisive victories. Hampton has taken down opponents with relative ease; they won eight of their ten games by more than 20 points.

Historically, the Hampton football program has been on the outside looking in. The Talbots won the section in 1988, 2001, 2005, 2014, and now 2021, but have been irrelevant amongst other WPI-AL powerhouses. Hampton never reached the WPIAL championship and compiled a 6-34 record from 2016 through 2019 when they competed in 5A. But the program came to a complete turnaround after a solid 5-3 season in 2020. The Talbots' success in the 2021 season is similar to the success they had 20 years ago. In 2001, Hampton went a perfect 9-0 in the regular season but lost to West Allegheny in the WPIAL quarterfinals. West Allegheny went on to win the 2001 3A PIAA Championship that year, led by quarterback Tyler Palko (Palko was the Pitt Panthers starting QB for the 2004 season during their Big East Championship and Fiesta Bowl bid).

Head coach Jacque DeMatteo is in his 22nd season head coaching WPIAL football (Shaler 2000-2007, Hampton 2008-Present), and the 2021 Hampton football team may be the most talented group of players that he's coached. The Talbots have scored 381 points on offense (38.1/ pg) and only surrendered 111 points on defense (11.1/pg). Christian Liberto and Brock Borgo are succeeding in the ground game, while Matt DeMatteo's connection to Benny Haselrig brings a solid aerial attack on offense. On defense, Jayden Resch and the team's resilient defensive line are forcing 3-and-outs and turnovers against the opponent.

Currently, Hampton is ranked #4 in the entire state by MaxPreps "PA Class AAAA rankings." However, five of the top six 4A teams in the state come from the WPIAL: Belle Vernon, Thomas Jefferson, Hampton, McKeesport, and Aliquippa. Hampton may have an uphill battle to win the WPIAL, but they can certainly get it done with their continued momentum. The Talbots have a packed senior class, looking to make the most out of this year's great start. Getting to play at Heinz Field for the WPIAL Championship has been the dream for every football player growing up in Western Pennsylvania.

On Halloween weekend, Hampton ended their regular season with a 48-14 home victory over Mars. The Talbots haven't defeated the Route 8 rival Mars since 2009 and have been 0-11 since then. Hampton took advantage of their opportunity to end the streak and finish the regular season undefeated.




