Police Log

The Hampton Township Police Department is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life of our residents and guests by providing the very best in law enforcement services. The twenty-two officers and two civilian clerks take pride in serving the community in a professional and proactive manner. Thank you to the staff for helping to keep our community safe.

A summary of noteworthy incidents that occurred are listed below. These incident statistics included, but WERE NOT LIMITED TO, the following between the dates of 7/30/2021—8/24/2021:

Water Main Break

On August 4 at 4:45a.m., Hampton Township Police were dispatched to the area of Middle Road, at Central Elementary School, for a report of a water main break. The responding officer located the water main break and notified Hampton Shaler Water Authority to respond to the scene.

On August 4 at 5:43a.m., Hampton Township Police were dispatched to the area of Mohawk Drive and Shawnee Court for a report of a water main break. Upon arrival, Hampton Shaler Water Authority was already on scene taking care of the water main break.

Hazardous Conditions/Flooding

On August 12 at 10:21p.m., Hampton Township Police were dispatched to the area of William Flinn Highway and Castletown Square for a report of a tree across the road. Upon arrival, an officer located the tree in the southbound lane of travel and was able to remove it.

On August 18 at 4:16p.m., Hampton Township Police were dispatched to the area of O'Reilly Auto Parts on William Flinn Highway for a report of a tree down. Upon arrival, officers located a tree down and blocking all four lanes of travel. Penndot was notified for removal and Fire Police assisted with traffic control until the road could be reopened.







As the zookeepers struggled in numbers, the girls helped out where they could. They were called to make zoo animal enrichment toys which promote an increase in the animals' physical and mental health levels. The girls designed and built six types of toys. "It was a tremendous experience for the girls," Blackburn said. "We spent a lot of time in Home Depot buying supplies. The girls learned how to use many power tools for the various projects."

Although the Silver Award is not as high profile as other troop awards, they have created a lot of good throughout the community. "All the troops work together cooperatively," Blackburn exclaimed. "They can earn a lot of badges while doing good for their community."

Local Physician Appointed to Medical Director

Dr. C. Thomas Brophy, DO is one of the region's few board-certified Addiction Medicine physicians and has just been appointed as full-time medical director at Ellen O'Brien Gaiser Center in Butler. Dr. Brophy's appointment enables the Gaiser Center to offer around-the-clock medical care for inpatients and this positions the center for future growth as it further integrates medication assisted treatment options into its care plans.

Brophy has been part of the Gaiser team since 2019. In addition to addiction medicine, he is board certified in emergency medicine and has treated the acute aspects of addiction in the emergency departments of local hospitals. In the outpatient setting, Dr. Brophy employs evidence-based medicine and MAT therapies on the leading edge of substance use disorder treatment to bring hope and stability to individuals combatting addiction. Brophy commented, "Since experiencing the impact of addiction in my own family, I've been committed to expanding the understanding of the neuroscience behind addiction." He added, "I'm thrilled to strengthen my relationship with the Gaiser team and expand upon the highquality care, education and support they provide for individuals and families living with addiction."

The Gaiser Addiction center is a non-profit organization, licensed by the PA Department of Health, Division of Drug and Alcohol licensing, dedicated to the treatment of addiction.

The center offers individualized evidence-based drug and alcohol treatment and education services for adults diagnosed with substance use disorders, including those with co-occurring disorders, and their families.

On August 6 at 12:49p.m., HTP were advised of a traffic accident on William Flinn Highway near Oxford Boulevard. Upon arrival, the involved parties stated they were not injured. The accident occurred when one of the vehicles attempted to make a lane change from the passing lane to the curb lane and did not see the other vehicle which then caused the collision. Students Win Big at English Festival

For the last four years, students at Blessed Trinity Academy have looked forward to participating in the Western Pennsylvania English Festival. The festival is for students in grades 4th through 12th grade and is sponsored and organized by the Western Pennsylvania Council of Teachers of English. In a typical year, the council picks 4 novels in the 4th through 6th grade division that students read during the school year. At BTA typically two books are read in class as a group and the other two

winners are announced and prizes are given. In addition there is always a keynote speaker, who is the author of one of the featured books. However, due to COVID it was in doubt whether the festival would even take place. After a later start, the council decided to pivot and host the festival virtually. Instead of four books, students had to read three. The selections included "Running Out Of Time," by Margaret Peterson Haddix

(who was also the keynote speaker), "The Science of Unbreakable Things," by Tae Keller, and "Fuzzy" by Paul Dellinger and Tom Angelberger. Doing the festival virtually meant that all of

are read on the students' own time. In May students schools all from Pittsburgh over gather at Seton La Salle High School in Mount Lebanon to participate in friendly competitions using their knowledge of the books. The competitions include 3 rounds of different trivia games, questions, and a presentation. At the end of the competition



the trivia and presentations were completed using FlipGrid and by recording themselves to submit their videos. Even though these changes presented several challenges, BTA students rose to the top of the competition.
